## 2015-2016 Technical Assistance Special Project: Diagnostic Center, Northern California and West Contra Costa Unified School District-Autism Project – Steve Collins

In order to address the needs of the increasing number of students identified with autism in our district, the Special Education Department embarked this year on a collaborative project with the Diagnostic Center of Northern California to increase the use of the Evidenced-Based Practices (EBPs) in our district classrooms for educating students with autism. The EBPs are 27 research supported practices identified as effective by the National Professional Development Center on Autism Spectrum Disorder for the treatment of children and adults with autism. The Diagnostic Center-North project with the district was initiated by Assistant Director of the Diagnostic Center-North (DCN), Ann England in collaboration with SELPA Director, Steve Collins and Director, Eric Peterson from the district. It is based on a "Trainer of Trainers" model whereby Diagnostic Center-North staff are training district program specialists and district lead teachers that have students with severe autism in their classrooms who will in turn train other district teachers in using the EBPs effectively. As a state agency, the Diagnostic Center-North provides its consultation services at no charge to the district.

The focus of the project for the 2015-2016 school year is to support the lead teachers in their classrooms in implementing the most critical EBPs for their students. This includes supporting the teachers in implementing the STAR curriculum for students with autism which includes the Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA) instructional method-EBPs of pivotal response training, discrete trial training and teaching functional routines. The second focus of the project is to support the WCCUSD Special Education Leadership Team of program specialists and administrators so that they can sustain the implementation of evidence-based practices and disseminate them throughout other special education programs in WCCUSD.

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Lead teachers participating in the project are Kali Baylen (Ellerhorst), Glicel Tamonang (Sheldon), J. Maria Perez (Highland), and Philmosa Geldore (King). The district program specialists participating in the project are Rosalind Brown, Maria Gomez, and Kira Walsh. Diagnostic Center-North program specialists providing coaching under this project are Virginia Sanchez-Salazar and Shannon Johns. The principals at the school sites (David Ranch, Melissa Sigars, Armando Torres, and Jeff Carr) have also been very supportive of the project and day to day implementation.

The project includes weekly coaching visits by Diagnostic Center-North program specialists to the classrooms of lead district teachers. Coaches provide support to teachers based on the practices of adult learning theory. District program specialists also attend the teacher coaching sessions so that they can learn how to take the place of the Diagnostic Center-North coaches after the project ends. There are also bi-monthly meetings at the Diagnostic Center-North to review project progress and make any necessary modifications which include Diagnostic Center-North staff, the district program specialists and Director, Eric Peterson.

### Community Engagement-Full Service Community Schools – Wendell Greer

The Department of Justice's Office for Victims of Crime, has awarded funding to the California School Based Health Alliance and local community partners Bay Area Community Resources, YMCA of the East Bay, and Contra Costa Health Services to more deeply integrate traumainformed care throughout nine WCCUSD schools beginning in the 2016-17 school year. The Young Men's Empowerment Collaborative funding will be used to focus specifically to promote justice and healing among boys and young men of color in West Contra Costa County who have been victims of violence. Goals of the program include: increasing identification and screening of survivors; creating effective response to violence through trauma-focused cognitive behavioral therapy, restorative justice, and parent/family care plans focused on healing; integrating traumainformed care throughout WCCUSD school based health centers; and transforming classroom environments through teacher training to recognize trauma survivors, respond effectively, and refer for appropriate services. The project is currently in the planning phase through June. The planning team is conducting focus groups to get feedback on project goals and objectives through meeting with students, teachers, administrators, parents and community partners. Program implementation will begin in the 2016-17 school year and support DeAnza High School, DeJean Middle School, El Cerrito High School, Greenwood Academy, Helms Middle School, Hercules High School, Kennedy High School, Pinole Valley High School, and Richmond High School. ### Amendment to Vicenti, Lloyd & Stutzman (VLS) Contract – Lisa LeBlanc

On March 16, 2016 the Board tabled the request to increase the VLS contract from \$127,010 to \$150,219 for work performed as part of the Phase I Risk Assessment. The amendment request represents an increase of \$23,209. The Board recommended that the item be brought back to the next Clay Investigation Subcommittee meeting for further discussion. There are no scheduled meetings of the subcommittee at this time as there are limited discussion items until the forensic audit progresses further; however, a meeting will be scheduled prior to fiscal year end, if needed, to address this item.

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## District's Lighting Upgrades Featured in California Energy Commission Blog – Marcus Walton

The District's Prop. 39 energy conservation efforts were featured in the California Energy Commission Blog this week. Energy Conservation Manager Julio Arroyo discussed the lighting upgrades that took place at Richmond High School and Collins, Grant, Lake, and Hanna Ranch elementary schools, saving the District an estimated \$160,000 per year.

Each goal has a free text box where respondents can include any additional actions and services they would like to see added to the goal. The final section of the survey invites respondents to provide general demographic information about themselves.

Page one of the two-page survey includes links to the LCAP District Infographic, LCAP Review, LCAP Executive Summary, Site Matrix of Services, and Approved LCAP so that stakeholders can easily access any information they may need to submit their feedback.

Construction of the new pedestrian overcrossing is anticipated to be complete in the fall of 2016. This work will require some nighttime full closures of eastbound and westbound I-80, and additional notification will be provided when these closures are scheduled.

# **Empowering Students to Promote Healing From Trauma in West Contra Costa County**

### **Violence & Trauma in West Contra Costa**

The city of Richmond provides a dramatic illustration of the health and social disparities that impact young men of color. Richmond is located in the western portion of Contra Costa County, which is a large and socioeconomically diverse county located on the east side of the San Francisco Bay. Violence is an overwhelming problem in the western portion of Contra Costa County, specifically in the greater Richmond area. The FBI's Preliminary Annual Crime Statistics for 2010 cited the region as having the third highest rate of violent crime in California.

#### A School-Based Health Solution

West Contra Costa Unified School District has a school-based health center (SBHC) at each of its six high schools and will be opening new SBHCs at its alternative high school and two middle schools. The nine SBHCs in West Contra Costa all provide comprehensive services directly on school campuses including primary medical care, mental health care, youth development programs, and preventive services such as health education.

### **Promoting Healing Among Boys & Men**

The Young Men's Empowerment Collaborative (YMEC) will promote justice and healing among boys and young men of color in West Contra Costa County who have been victims of violence. YMEC will scale up evidence-based, trauma-informed practices across schools in this community.

YMEC will target youth aged 12-18 years and achieve the following goals:

- Increase the portion of young male survivors of violence who are identified by expanding screening and by adopting outreach strategies specifically focused on young men.
- Create an effective response to violence for young men of color through individual Trauma-Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy, Restorative Justice, and parent/family care plans focused on the healing process.

- Integrate trauma-informed care throughout all nine West Contra Costa SBHCs to respond more effectively to the needs of young male survivors.
- Transform classroom environments to foster academic success among young male survivors of violence by training teachers to recognize trauma survivors, respond effectively, and refer them for appropriate services.

### A Path to Community Health

### Phase 1: Planning

- Develop collaborative structure.
- Gather input and create final YMEC demonstration plan.
- Conduct training to educate stakeholders on the effects of trauma and violence.

### **Phase 2: Implementation**

- Maintain collaborative structure.
- Build staff capacity to expand evidence-based practices.
- Conduct school-wide screenings.
- Conduct outreach to young men exposed to violence and trauma.
- Expand evidenced-based practices: Trauma-Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (TF-CBT) and Restorative Justice.
- Implement trauma-informed practices in the classrooms.

Districts must make any budget revisions within 45 days of approval of a collective bargaining agreement.

Districts are also required to disclose non-voter approved debt and self-insured workers' compensation claims.
