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
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engaged while working at computer stations where they downloaded *PowerPoint* presentations filled with documents, maps, and other types of information.

"Students used those documents to show the relationship between the North and the South before the Civil War," explained Mr. Pollock.

"Students were getting help to understand the sectionalism that existed before the war. They each received four DBQ questions used to cite in their essay using MLA format."

Mr. Pollock's objective is always to prepare students for the intensive culture of academic and career pursuits at the post-secondary level. Students in his classes are consistently challenged to interpret primary source data—practicing the same **Common Core State Standard** skills that they will be expected to utilize in university courses and professional environments.

"[Pollock's] teaching style is personality driven. He really creates a community in his classroom with him as the band-leader. It's actually pretty advanced. It's social-learning based," says Special Education teacher Ms. Binder.

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
