#### \* C.4 NCLB District Corrective Action

#### Comment:

A cornerstone of the 2001 No Child Left Behind (NCLB) Act is the accountability system of school and district improvement. The school improvement system is based on a five-year timeline; the district improvement system is based on a **three-year timeline**. Both systems function in a similar way with schools or districts advancing along a continuum of sanctions each year when all adequate yearly progress (AYP) targets are not met. If a school or district in improvement makes all AYP targets in a single year it remains in place. To exit improvement a school or district must meet all AYP targets for two consecutive years.

WCCUSD has a total of 42 AYP targets to meet each year. The District originally entered the improvement continuum in 2004-05, then made AYP in 2005-06 remaining in year 1. In 2006-07 and 2007-08 some of the targets were missed and the district advanced along the continuum entering year 3, Corrective Action.

At the November 2008 meeting, the State Board of Education invoked the following corrective actions for WCCUSD and 49 other districts:

- Institute and **fully implement** a new curriculum that is based on the state academic standards.
- Contract with one of the 38 state-approved District Assistance and Intervention Teams (DAITs) to receive targeted support in improving student performance.
- Revise the district's Local Educational Agency (LEA) Plan to address and improve the practices that led to the PI Year 3 identification by March 9, 2009 (an extremely short/aggressive timeline).

#### \* E.2 Establishment of a WCCUSD Youth Commission

#### Comment:

The Board and District could gain a great deal of insight into how to improve school operations, create better learning environments and get valuable feedback from high school students by creating a Youth Commission. A Youth Commission could mirror the role of the Board and provide leadership opportunities and training for WCCUSD students. This proposal sets out to create a youth commission to advise the WCCUSD Board of Directors and staff. This commission would consist of between 10-15 students ranging in grades from Middle to High School. The purpose of the commission would be to get a student perspective on a variety of issues facing the district.

Membership on the commission would be open to students from schools throughout the district. Commissioners would apply to serve and would be appointed by the Commission and confirmed by the School Board. Commissioners would serve terms for at least one school year. Commissioners could serve multiple terms subject to the discretion of the Commission and the governing procedures governing length of terms. As the Commission starts out, the School Board could appoint a planning committee of students whose charge it would be to develop the policies and procedures of the board in their first year, including but not limited to membership criteria, attendance requirements, role and duties of the commission, and governing procedures.

Commission members could meet once or twice a month as dictated by their governance procedures (by-laws) and would participate in meetings with agendas, minutes, and governing procedures such as Roberts Rules of Order (to be determined by the commissioners).

A WCCUSD staff person would be identified to serve as a liaison for supporting the needs of the commissioners. School Board members and other volunteers could also serve as liaisons to the Commission. The commissioners would also be provided with training to support their leadership

development. Leadership topics could include how to run a meeting, the role of leaders and public officials, budget management, organizing events, and fundraising just to name a few. Commissioners would also be eligible to represent the WCCUSD at conferences, events, community meetings, and trainings.

While advisory in its nature the Commission would be separate and autonomous from the School Board and be able to make its own determination and rulings. The Commission could also weigh in on any matter before the Board and/or could bring forward other items or positions for Board consideration. The Commission could have a separate budget provided by the Board when funds are available but the Commission would also be able to raise and manage its own funds with support from the WCCUSD's accounting staff. The Commission would be able to work closely with individual student councils, reach out to members of the WCCUSD student body, and organize events and programs for the overall WCCUSD student body and general community.

The Commission could take up issues such as but not limited to:

Improving School Safety
Promoting student morale and pride
Reducing the drop out rate
Engaging parents
School closures
Conflict resolution and preventing fights
Curriculum and academic recommendations
Menu recommendations
Facility recommendations
Sporting, Entertainment, and Social Programming for students
Reducing the achievement gap

<u>Recommendation:</u> That the Board authorize the initiation of a WCCUSD Youth Commission and empower a representative group of high school students to develop the charge and operating parameters for the group.

# \*CI G.13 Ratification of "Piggyback" Contract with Mt. Diablo USD for Spectrum's Encore! Student Information Services (SIS) for Special Education

Diablo conducted a public bid process and had referenced other school districts in the state which, under law, may then award contracts as a "piggyback" on the Spectrum contract. Construction is currently underway on the first phase of work on the reconstruction of the Dover Elementary School. The District is currently under contract for temporary playground work, site preparation and limited utilities in the area of the new 2-story classroom/Administration building. Work is nearly complete on this project, however, due to delays in final approval for the main construction contract documents, it is necessary to add scope to the current contract which will allow the site to drain and remain accessible during potential weather. The proposed scope of work in this Phase II Sitework contract is well beyond the 10% current contract change order level, and is a cardinal change to the work, which makes a separate bid and award appropriate. The work in this second phase sitework has been prepared by HY Architects and their Civil Engineering consultants to provide for drainage improvements and paving in the two parking areas adjacent to the proposed new building.

The District conducted a public bid for the project. Bids were received on December 9, 2008. Seven Contractors submitted bids. They are as follows: Bay Cities Paving \$86,000; Suarez/Munoz \$84,950; JDB Construction \$113,525; Trinet Construction \$77,000; WR Forde \$108,900; Bruce Carone \$94,325; Evans Brothers \$85,944. The lowest responsive, responsible bidder is Trinet Construction at \$77,000.

This item is being presented prior to the expiration of the 5 working day Bid Protest period. In consideration of this timing, and in order to expedite the project, the Board's action will be to authorize staff to issue the Notice of Award effective at the end of the Bid Protest period to the lowest responsive, responsible bidder. This award by staff will then be brought back for ratification at a future meeting.

**Recommendation:** Authorize staff to issue Notice of Award at the end of the bid protest period, to the lowest responsive, responsible bidder.

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### <u>INTRODUCTION</u>

The West Contra Costa Unified School District has contracted with Davis Demographics & Planning, Inc. (DDP) to update and analyze demographic data relevant to the District's facility planning efforts. The scope of contracted work includes: mapping the District, address matching the current student file, developing and researching pertinent demographic data, identifying future residential development plans and developing a ten-year student population projection. DDP will then assist the District in developing solutions for housing future student population. Additionally, this study was prepared to assist the District's efforts in evaluating future site requirements and attendance area changes.

The purpose of this report is to identify and inform the District of the trends occurring in the community; how these trends may affect future student population; and to assist in illustrating facility adjustments that may be necessary to accommodate the potential student population shifts. The District can then use this information to better plan for the need, location and timing of facility or boundary adjustments.

The **Sources of Data** section details where the two sources of data, geographic and non-geographic, are collected and how each data item is used in the student population projection model.

The **Projection Methodology** section discusses in detail how the factors used in the study were calculated and why they were used. These factors include: the calculation of incoming kindergarten classes, additional students from new housing (referred to as student yield), the effects of student mobility, and a detailed review of planned residential development within the District.

The **District Student Resident Projection Summary** section reviews the Fall 2008/09 student resident projection results. Included in these sections are a district wide student population projection summary and a projected resident student population summary for each existing attendance area and study area.

While reading this report, it is important to remember that this is a snapshot of current and potential student population based upon data gathered in Fall 2008/09. Population demographics change, development plans change, funding opportunities can change, District priorities can change, and therefore, new projections and adjustments to the overall Master Plan will continue to be necessary in the future.

# **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

Davis Demographics & Planning, Inc. (DDP) is assisting the West Contra Costa Unified School District (District) to plan for future student population changes. As part of this effort, the District requested a 10 year forecast through fall 2018/19. This report contains the results of this student population study. Factors such as current and historical student data trends, birth trends and estimates, as well as planned residential development have been taken into consideration.

It is important to remember that this projection is based upon residence of the current and future students as opposed to actual enrollment at each campus and is designed to alert the District as to when and where student population shifts will occur. For a detailed accounting of the enrollment at each school along with insight into the current inter-district and intra-district transfer patterns, please review the attendance matrix (Section Three – Attendance Matrices).

The W.C.C.U.S.D. experienced growth in the late 1990s and early 2000s due to previous increases in elementary school enrollment caused by increased births in the 1980's. After continued decline in births from 1990 to 1997 elementary school enrollment had stabilized in the late 1990s and started to decline after 2002. Consequently, the W.C.C.U.S.D. has experienced declining enrollment as the larger classes currently in the system graduate and are replaced by smaller incoming classes. Births in the district have shown a slight increase and stabilization after 1998 (2003s K class). As the students from the recent birth matriculate through the system we may see an increase in elementary level student population and eventual increases at the secondary level.

The overall K-6 resident student population in the W.C.C.U.S.D. is expected to decline slightly over the 10-year projection timeframe. Currently the K-6 resident student population of 16,789 may decrease to as low as 16,658 but, for the most part will stay within 50 students (plus or minus) of the of the 2008/09 count. Most of the individual attendance area projected resident student counts will stay fairly stable to the current number of resident students. However, a few areas may see an increase or decreases due variations in the current kindergarten class size.

The Coronado E.S. and the Madera E.S. attendance areas had larger than usual kindergarten classes for 08/09. If this trend continues (it most likely will in the Madera area) we can expect an increase in the K-6 resident student population. Conversely the Chavez E.S, Ford E.S., Grant E.S. and Nystrom E.S. attendance areas experienced a smaller than usual kindergarten class for 08/09. This trend may lead to a decrease in the resident student population. A decline in resident students may also occur in the Lincoln E.S. attendance area due to large upper grade classes graduating and being replaced by smaller lower grade classes.

The overall 7-8 resident student population in the W.C.C.U.S.D. is expected to remain very stable over the 10-year projection timeframe. Currently the 7-8 resident student population is 4,169 and should continue to be around the 4,200 level in the projection timeframe. The only exception is in the 2014/15 school year when the 7-8 student population may reach a high of 4.339. Most of the individual attendance area projected

resident student counts will remain stable. However, The DeJean M.S. and Helm M.S. attendance areas are projected to decrease while the Portola E.S. area is showing an increase.

The DeJean M.S. attendance area is projected to decline from the current count of 531 resident 7-8 students to a low of 393 resident students in the 2018/19 school year, the decline seen in the Helms M.S. area is not as steep, going from 601 to 519. These declines appear to be caused by the mobility rate for grades 2-8 being lower than the other middle school areas. Both the DeJean M.S. and Helms M.S. areas have a negative mobility in each grade between the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> grades. Conversely the Portola M.S. attendance area is projected to increase from 404 resident students in the 2008/09 school year to 605 students in the 2018/19 school year. This is caused by relatively small upper grade classes graduating on and being replaced by larger lower grades matriculating through the system.

The overall 9-12 resident student population in the W.C.C.U.S.D. is expected decline annually until the 2014/15 school year and then increase until the end of the projection timeframe. Currently the 9-12 resident student population of 8,640 may decrease to a low of 8,095 in the 2014/15 school year but is expected to rebound to 8,373 resident students by the 2018/19 school year. This decline is due to relatively larger 9<sup>th</sup> -12<sup>th</sup> grade classes being replaced by smaller 5<sup>th</sup>-8<sup>th</sup> grade classes.

There is no one trend for the high school attendance areas. The El Cerritos H.S., Hercules H.S. and Kennedy H.S. attendance areas are all projected to increase by the 2018/19 school year. The El Cerritos H.S. area is anticipated to have the largest increase of approximately 130 9-12 resident students. Meanwhile, The DeAnza H.S., Pinole Valley H.S. and Richmond H.S. attendance areas are projected to decline by 2018/19. The Richmond H.S. attendance area is showing a 256 9-12 resident student decrease by the end of the projection time frame.

Planned residential development data is collected to determine the number of new residential units that will be built over the ten-year projection timeframe. After extensive research it was determined that there are only a small number of planned residential units in the works at this time. There is, however, sufficient land and potential for fairly extensive housing projects in the future. A review of the development situation should be conducted annually along with an updated student population projection study.

This is the second student population projection report prepared for the W.C.C.U.S.D. by DDP. At this time DDP does not see any significant changes in this projection compared to the previous analysis. After a few more years of decreasing enrollment DDP anticipates stabilization and leveling off of enrollment at all grade levels.

# **METHODOLOGY**

#### 1 - SOURCES OF DATA

# A - Geographic Map Data

Five geographic data layers were updated for use in the ten-year student population projections:

- 1. Street Centerline Database
- 2. Study Areas
- 3. Schools
- 4. Students Historical and Current
- 5. Future Residential Development

#### 1) Street Centerline Data

DDP has licensed a digital street centerline map of the School District from SANGIS. The street database has associated attributes that contain, but are not limited to, the following fields: full street name, address range and street classification

The main function of the streets is in the geo-coding process of the student data. Each student is address matched to the streets by their given address. The geo-coding process places a point on the map for every student in the exact location of student residence. This enables DDP to analyze the student data in a geographic manner.

Another vital utilization of the digital street database is in the construction of study areas. Freeways, major streets and neighborhood streets are used as boundaries for the study areas.

#### 2) Study Areas

Study areas are small geographic areas and the building blocks of a school district; they are similar to neighborhoods. Study areas are geographically defined following logical boundaries of the neighborhood, such as freeways, streets, railroad tracks, rivers, etc. Each study area is then coded with the elementary, junior high and high school that the area is assigned to attend. By gathering information at the study area level, a school district can closely monitor growth and demographic trends in particular regions and spot potential need for boundary changes or new facilities.

#### 3) Schools

The District provided school facility location information to DDP for the purpose of mapping the District facilities.

#### 4) Student Data

a. Historical Student Data - Historical enrollment is used to compare past student population growth and trends as well as the effects of mobility (move-in, move-out from existing housing) throughout the District. DDP utilized the 4 previous years' (2004/05, 2005/06, 2006/07 and 2007/08) address matched students as historical data.

**b. Current Student Data** - A student data file representing the enrollment approximately for October 1<sup>st</sup>, 2008 was geocoded this geocoded student file was summarized by grade level and by study area is used as a base for enrollment projections. Existing students were categorized by study area through the address matching process that locates each student within a particular area based upon their given address. The projections run each of the next ten years from fall 2009/08 through fall 2018/09.

The Student Accounting Summary (Table 1) indicates the total student enrollment as of October 1<sup>st</sup>, 2008 and the number of student used in the ten year student population projections. The projection model is based upon student residence and excludes students residing outside of the District's boundaries, students unable to be address matched and special education students (special education students usually attend a school that services their particular need) and independent study students.

# 5) Future Residential Development

Planned residential development data is collected to determine the number of new residential units that will be built over the ten-year timeframe of the student population projections.

### B - Non-Geographic Data

Two basic sets of non-geographic data were compiled and reviewed for use in the ten-year student population projections by residence:

- 1. Births by Zip Code
- 2. Mobility Factors

1) Births by Zip Code Data - Birth data by postal zip code was obtained from the California State Department of Health for the years 1991-2007 and roughly correlated to the West Contra Costa Unified School District. Past changes in historical birthrates are used to estimate incoming kindergarten student population from existing housing.

**2)** Mobility Factors - Mobility refers to the increase/decrease in the migration of students within the District boundaries (move-in/move-out of students from existing housing). Mobility, similar to a cohort, is applied as a percentage of increase/decrease among each grade for every year of the projections

# 2 – PROJECTION METHODOLOGY

The projection methodology used in this study combines historical student population figures, past and present demographic characteristics, and planned residential development to forecast future student population at the study area level. District-wide projections are summarized from the individual study area projections. These projections are based on where the students reside and their school of residence. DDP utilizes the actual location where students reside, as opposed to their school of enrollment, in order to provide the most accurate estimate of where future school facilities should be located. The best way to plan for future student population shifts is to know where the next group of students will reside. The following details the methodology used in preparing the student population projections by residence.

### **Projections Timeframe**

Projections are usually calculated out seven (7) to ten (10) years from the date of projection for several reasons. The planning horizon for any type of facility is typically around five years. Seven to ten years are sufficient to adequately plan for student population shift and facility reorganization. It is a short to mid term solution for planning needs. Projections beyond Ten Years are based on speculation due to the lack of reliable information on birthrates, new home construction, economic conditions, etc.

At the Districts request DDP completed a Ten Year Student Population Projection.

#### Why Projections are Calculated by Residence

Typically, school district projections are based on enrollment by school. However, this method is inadequate when used to locate future school facility requirements, because the location of the students is not taken into consideration. A school's enrollment can fluctuate due to variables in the curriculum, program changes, school administration and open enrollment policies. These variables can skew the apparent need for new or additional facilities in an area.

The method used by DDP is unique because it modifies a standard cohort projection with demographic factors and actual student location. **DDP bases it's projections on the belief** that school facility planning is more accurate when facilities are located where the greatest number of students reside.

The following details the methodology used in preparing the student population projections.

- <u>1) Progression</u> Each year of the projections, 12<sup>th</sup> grade students graduate, and continuing students progress through to the next grade level and kindergarten students start schools. This normal progression of students is modified by the following factors:
- **2)** Incoming Kindergarten Live birth data, reported to the California State Department of Health, by the resident postal zip code of the mother is used to project the base incoming kindergarten class. Additional kindergarten students may be added from future

development. DDP uses birth data by zip code so, if need be, a different birth factor can be applied to various areas of the District.

Incoming kindergarten classes, for existing homes, are estimated by comparing changes in past births and birthrates. Table 2 shows the total births for each zip code in the West Contra Costa Unified School District from 1994 to 2006. Future kindergarten classes (2009-2018) are estimated by multiplying the existing kindergarten class (2008) by the ratio of the projected year's births to the 2003 births. Assuming that the Fall 2008 kindergarten class was born in 2003, DDP compared the total births in 2003 to the total births in 2004 to determine a factor for next year's kindergarten class (Fall 2009). Similarly, 2003 was compared to 2005 (Fall 2010 K class), 2003 to 2006 (Fall 2011 K class) and 2003 to 2007 (Fall 2012 K class).

DDP used birth data from the zip codes 94530, 94547, 94564, 94801, 94803, 94804, 94805 and 94806. There were 3,281 births in the baseline year of 2003. With the exception of 2005 the subsequent years all show an increase in reported births. This suggests an increase in future kindergarten students compared to the 2008/09 K class enrollment.

3) Student Mobility Factors - Student mobility factors further refine the ten-year student population projections. Mobility refers to the increase/decrease in the migration of students within the District boundary (move-in/move-out of students from existing housing). Mobility, similar to a cohort, is applied as a percentage to each grade for every year of the projections.

A net increase or decrease of zero students over time is represented by a factor of 100% (1.0). A net student loss is represented by a factor less than 100% (1.00) and a net gain by a factor greater than 100% (1.00) (see example).

Example:

100 9th grade students in fall 2008

X .959 (10th Grade mobility Adams M.S. Area...)

= 95.9 10th Grade students in Fall 2009

Having historical student data categorized by study area is extremely helpful in calculating accurate Student Mobility Factors. DDP was able to utilize the last five years' (Fall 2004, 2005, 2006, 2007 and 2008) student data. The data was organized into four yearly groups and then changes in the individual grades were examined. For example, a comparison was made for the Fall 2004 K student population to the Fall 2005 1st grade students. This comparison was also conducted for the Fall 2005 & Fall 2006, Fall 2006 & Fall 2007 and the Fall 2007 & Fall 2008 students.

Using historic student data by study area allows DDP to calculate and apply unique mobility factors to various portions of the district. The W.C.C.U.S.D. has various neighborhood compositions and density. DDP originally created mobility factors by middle school attendance area. Upon examination it was determined that the projections would be more accurate if those areas were broken down even further. Interstate 80 was used to split some of the middle school attendance area into east and west portions. Mobility was then applied by these areas.

4) Planned Residential Development —Planned residential development data is collected to determine the number of new residential units that will be built over the ten-year timeframe of the student population projections. The units projected to be built within the next ten years will have the appropriate Student Yield Factor, Table 4, applied to them to determine the number of new students planned residential development will yield.

This data was obtained through discussions with district staff, the major developers within the district boundaries, the local cities planning departments, the planning department of Contra Costa County and various other agencies. A database map of the planned residential development was created, including, when available, project name, location, housing type, total number of units and estimated move-in dates (phasing schedule). Projected phasing is based upon occupancy of the unit and is used to help time the arrival of students from these new developments.

In the student population projection by residence DDP includes all approved and tentative tract maps in addition to any planned or proposed development that possibly will occur within the projection timeframe. The planned residential development information and phasing estimates is a snapshot of the District at the time of this study. All of the information may change and should be updated annually.

<u>5) Student Yield Factors – Ten-Year Projections -</u> Closely related to the planned residential development units are Student Yield Factors. The Student Yield Factors, when applied to planned residential development units, determine how many additional students will be generated from new construction within the District.

### 3 - APPLYING THE VARIABLES TO GENERATE THE PROJECTIONS

The following paragraphs summarize how DDP uses the factors to determine the student population projections. Remember that these projections are based on residence.

The West Contra Costa Unified School District has been broken up into 401 study areas and each study area is coded for the elementary, middle school and high school attendance area in which it fall. The residential projections are calculated at the study area level. This means that DDP conducts 401 individual projections that are based upon the number of students residing in each study area.

The first step in running these projections involves listing the number of students that live in a particular study area by each individual grade (kindergarten through 12<sup>th</sup> grade). The current student base (Fall 2008/09) is then passed to the next year's grade (2008's K become 2009's 1<sup>st</sup> graders, 2008's 1<sup>st</sup> graders become 2009's 2<sup>nd</sup> graders, and so on). After the natural progression of students through the grades is applied, then Birth Factors are multiplied by the current kindergarten class to generate a base for the following year's kindergarten class.

Next, a Mobility Factor is applied to all grades. Again, these factors take into account the natural in/out migration of students throughout the District.

The last essential layer applied to the projections deals with additional students from planned residential development. This is a simple calculation, again conducted at the study area level, where the estimated number of new housing units for a particular year is multiplied by the appropriate Student Yield Factors. For example, if 100 single family detached (SFD) units are to be built in a specific study area in a given year, then you would multiply this number (100) by the SFD K-6 student yield factor (.210) and the resulting number of students (21.0) is divided evenly among the seven grades.

To finish generating the projections by residence, the same process is conducted for each of the 401 study areas. Once the projections have been run at the study area level, then it is simple addition to determine projections for each of the District's attendance areas or for a district-wide summary. For example, the student population projections for Hercules High School are simply the summary of all of the study areas that make up this specific attendance area (see Sections Four for the projections of each school attendance area). The District Summary for the projections (Section Two) is a total summary of all 401 study areas, which excludes all of the students that attend a District school but live completely outside of the District's boundaries, special education students and independent study students. These out of district, special education students and independent study students are factored back into the projections by simply adding the existing totals in at the bottom of the projections. (Please see the Attendance Matrices in Section Three for a breakdown of the out-ofdistrict, special education students and independent study students by school.) DDP adds the current total out-of-district and unmatched students, special education students and independent study students to each year of the projections because there is no way to accurately forecast the residence of these students in the future.

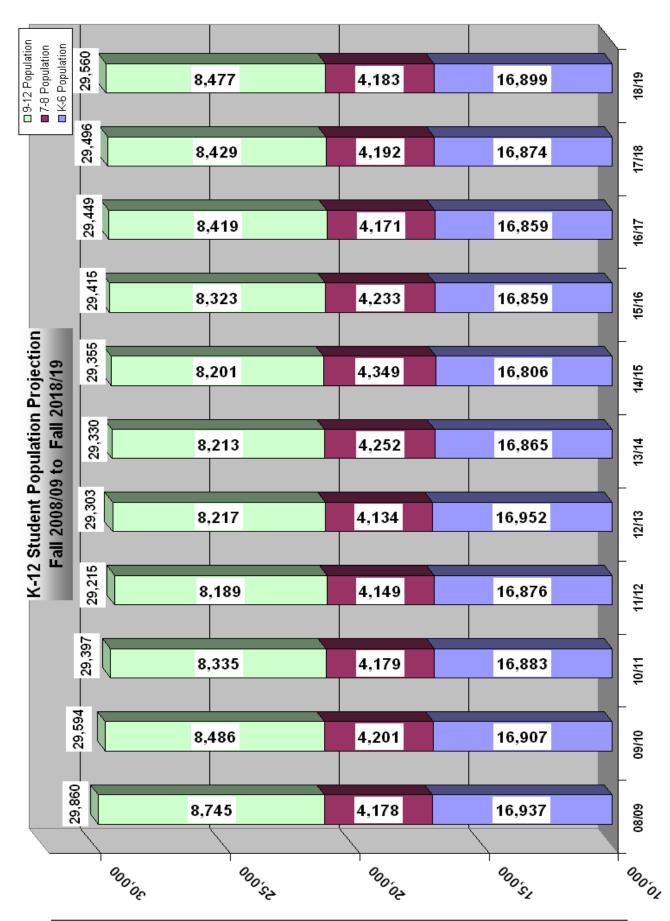
### TEN-YEAR PROJECTION SUMMARIES

Finally, the student population is projected out ten years for each of the study areas and for the entire West Contra Costa Unified School District. The District Wide projection summaries enable the District to see a broad overview of future student population and what impact this population will have on existing facilities. The study area listings enable the District to monitor student population growth or decline in smaller geographic areas within the District.

At any point in time, study areas and their projected resident students can be shifted between schools to assist in balancing enrollment changes. Together, these projection summaries present the means to identify the timing of student arrivals and overall facility requirements, as well as location in order to accommodate the District's expected population shift.

### ATTENDANCE MATRIX

Three attendance matrices have been included to provide a better understanding of where students reside and where they attend school. Remember, DDP projections are based upon where the students reside, not where they attend school. DDP uses the actual location where the students reside, as opposed to their school of enrollment, in order to provide the most accurate prediction of future facilities adjustments. Therefore, since the projections are based upon where the students reside, the figures used as a base for each school's resident projection may differ from the actual reported enrollment for each school.

These attendance matrices act as a check and balance for student accounting. They show where the students reside (in what School of Residence) based upon our address matching capabilities and what school they attend (School of Attendance) based upon data in the student file supplied by the District. The inclusion of these matrices is essential to showing how the students used in the projections match up to the District's records of enrollment for each school. The best way to plan for future facilities changes is to know where the next group of students will be residing, not necessarily which school they are currently attending.

### **READING THE MATRIX**

Looking at the K-6 Attendance Matrix on the following page, let's begin with Bayview as an example. Following down the first column with the Bayview heading, there are 456 students that attend Bayview and reside in the Bay view attendance area... Continuing downward, 2 students attend Bayview but reside in the Castro attendance area. Next the matrix shows that 1 student attend Bayview but resides in Chavez's attendance area, and so on.

The row "Out of District" refers to students who live completely outside of the West Contra Costa Unified School District, but attend one of the District's schools. There are no Out of District students attending Bayview. "Unmatched" refers to students not geocoded due to address problems. There are no unmatched students attending Bayview. "Total Students Attending" shows the total number of students enrolled each school regardless of where they reside, and reflects the District's enrollment counts for each school. There are a total of 563 students attending Bayview Elementary School.

The next step is to read across the matrix, beginning with the Bayview attendance area row. We know that 456 represents the total number of students who reside in the Bayview Attendance area and attend Bayview. The next column, Castro, refers to the number of students who reside in the Bayview attendance area but attend Castro. There are currently 2 students residing in the Bayview attendance area but attend Castro Elementary School

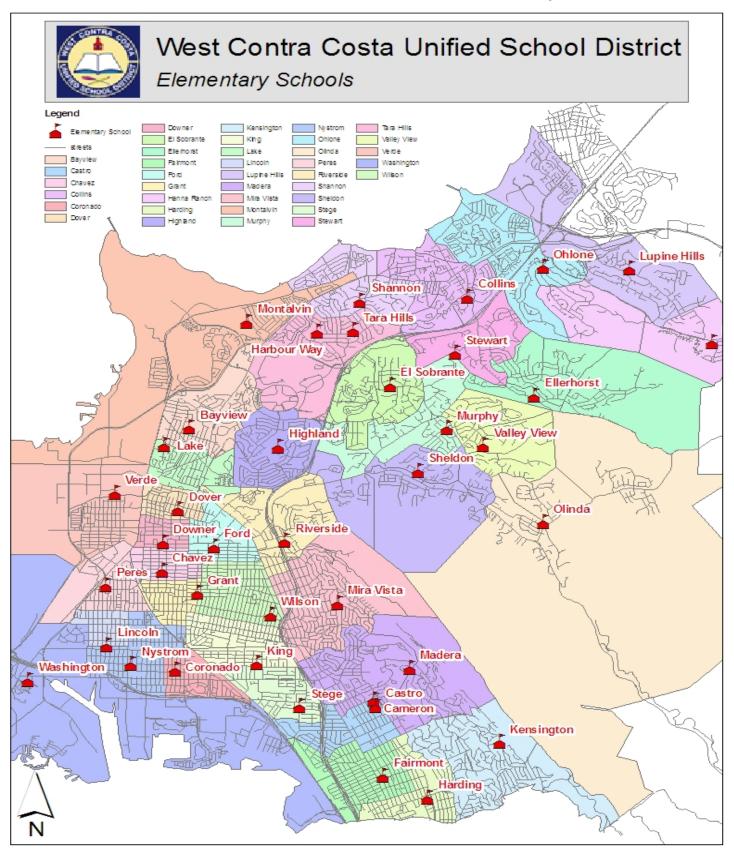

## **ELEMENTARY SCHOOL ATTENDANCE AREA PROJECTIONS**



### Overview of the Elementary School Attendance Area Projections

The overall K-6 resident student population in the W.C.C.U.S.D. is expected to decline slightly over the 10-year projection timeframe. Currently the K-6 resident student population of 16,789 may decrease to as low as 16,658 but, for the most part will stay within 50 students (plus or minus) of the of the 2008/09 count. Most of the individual attendance area projected resident student counts will stay fairly stable to the current number of resident students. However, a few areas may see an increase or decreases due variations in the current kindergarten class size.

The Coronado E.S. and the Madera E.S. attendance areas had larger than usual kindergarten classes for 08/09. If this trend continues (it most likely will in the Madera area) we can expect an increase in the K-6 resident student population. Conversely the Chavez E.S, Ford E.S., Grant E.S. and Nystrom E.S. attendance areas experienced a smaller than usual kindergarten class for 08/09. This trend may lead to a decrease in the resident student population. A decline in resident students may also occur in the Lincoln E.S. attendance area due to large upper grade classes graduating and being replaced by smaller lower grade classes.

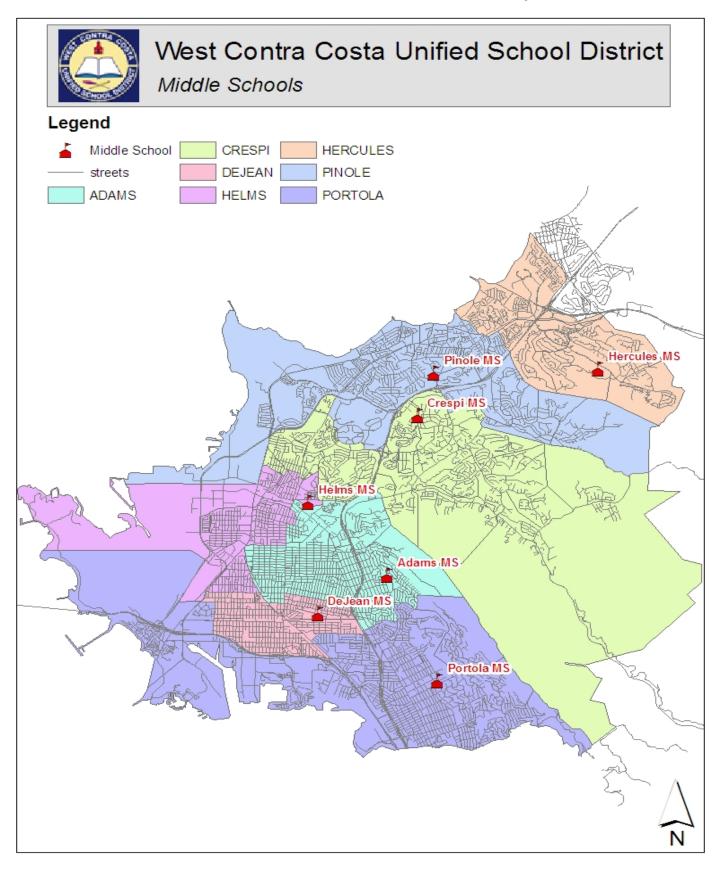

### Overview of the Middle School Attendance Area Projections

The overall 7-8 resident student population in the W.C.C.U.S.D. is expected to remain very stable over the 10-year projection timeframe. Currently the 7-8 resident student population is 4,169 and should continue to be around the 4,200 level in the projection timeframe. The only exception is in the 2014/15 school year when the 7-8 student population may reach a high of 4.339. Most of the individual attendance area projected resident student counts will remain stable. However, The DeJean M.S. and Helm M.S. attendance areas are projected to decrease while the Portola E.S. area is showing an increase.

The DeJean M.S. attendance area is projected to decline from the current count of 531 resident 7-8 students to a low of 393 resident students in the 2018/19 school year, the decline seen in the Helms M.S. area is not as steep, going from 601 to 519. These declines appear to be caused by the mobility rate for grades 2-8 being lower than the other middle school areas. Both the DeJean M.S. and Helms M.S. areas have a negative mobility in each grade between the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> grades. Conversely the Portola M.S. attendance area is projected to increase from 404 resident students in the 2008/09 school year to 605 students in the 2018/19 school year. This is caused by relatively small upper grade classes graduating on and being replaced by larger lower grades matriculating through the system.

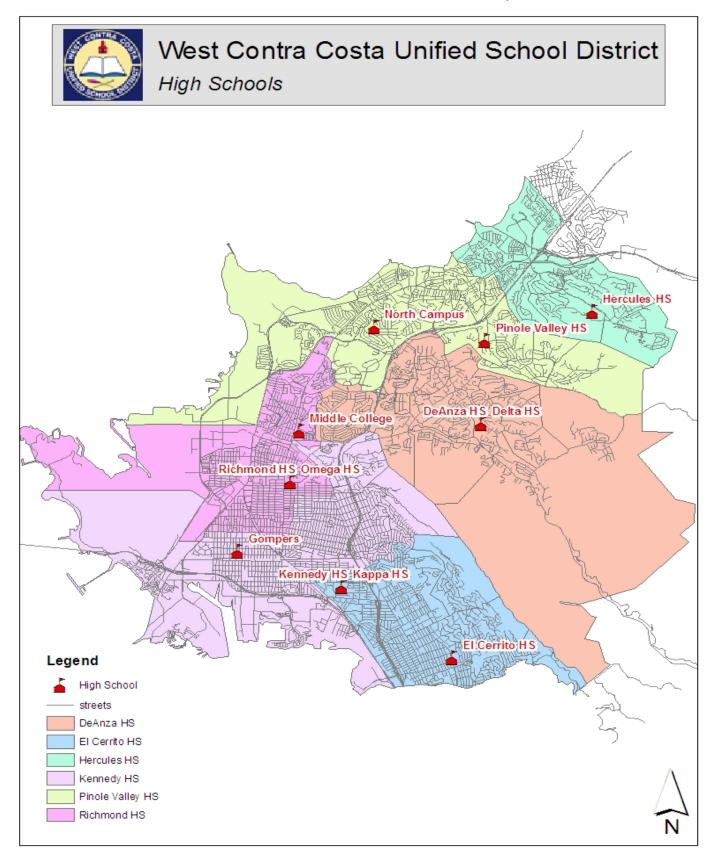

### Overview of the High School Attendance Area Projections

The overall 9-12 resident student population in the W.C.C.U.S.D. is expected decline annually until the 2014/15 school year and then increase until the end of the projection timeframe. Currently the 9-12 resident student population of 8,640 may decrease to a low of 8,095 in the 2014/15 school year but is expected to rebound to 8,373 resident students by the 2018/19 school year. This decline is due to relatively larger 9<sup>th</sup> -12<sup>th</sup> grade classes being replaced by smaller 5<sup>th</sup>-8<sup>th</sup> grade classes.

There is no one trend for the high school attendance areas. The El Cerritos H.S., Hercules H.S. and Kennedy H.S. attendance areas are all projected to increase by the 2018/19 school year. The El Cerritos H.S. area is anticipated to have the largest increase of approximately 130 9-12 resident students. Meanwhile, The DeAnza H.S., Pinole Valley H.S. and Richmond H.S. attendance areas are projected to decline by 2018/19. The Richmond H.S. attendance area is showing a 256 9-12 resident student decrease by the end of the projection time frame.

**Subject:** Establishment of a WCCUSD Youth Commission

### **Background Information:**

The Board and District could gain a great deal of insight into how to improve school operations, create better learning environments and get valuable feedback from high school students by creating a Youth Commission. A Youth Commission could mirror the role of the Board and provide leadership opportunities and training for WCCUSD students. This proposal sets out to create a youth commission to advise the WCCUSD Board of Directors and staff. This commission would consist of between 10-15 students ranging in grades from Middle to High School. The purpose of the commission would be to get a student perspective on a variety of issues facing the district.

Membership on the commission would be open to students from schools throughout the district. Commissioners would apply to serve and would be appointed by the Commission and confirmed by the School Board. Commissioners would serve terms for at least one school year. Commissioners could serve multiple terms subject to the discretion of the Commission and the governing procedures governing length of terms. As the Commission starts out, the School Board could appoint a planning committee of students whose charge it would be to develop the policies and procedures of the board in their first year, including but not limited to membership criteria, attendance requirements, role and duties of the commission, and governing procedures.

Commission members could meet once or twice a month as dictated by their governance procedures (by-laws) and would participate in meetings with agendas, minutes, and governing procedures such as Roberts Rules of Order (to be determined by the commissioners).

A WCCUSD staff person would be identified to serve as a liaison for supporting the needs of the commissioners. School Board members and other volunteers could also serve as liaisons to the Commission. The commissioners would also be provided with training to support their leadership development. Leadership topics could include how to run a meeting, the role of leaders and public officials, budget management, organizing events, and fundraising just to name a few. Commissioners would also be eligible to represent the WCCUSD at conferences, events, community meetings, and trainings.

While advisory in its nature the Commission would be separate and autonomous from the School Board and be able to make its own determination and rulings. The Commission could also weigh in on any matter before the Board and/or could bring forward other items or positions for Board consideration. The Commission could have a separate budget provided by the Board when funds are available but the Commission would also be able to raise and manage its own funds with support from the WCCUSD's accounting staff. The Commission would be able to work closely with individual student councils, reach out to members of the WCCUSD student body, and organize events and programs for the overall WCCUSD student body and general community.

Improving School Safety
Promoting student morale and pride
Reducing the drop out rate
Engaging parents
School closures
Conflict resolution and preventing fights
Curriculum and academic recommendations
Menu recommendations

Sporting, Entertainment, and Social Programming for students
Reducing the achievement gap

### **Recommendation:**

That the Board authorize the initiation of a WCCUSD Youth Commission and empower a representative group of high school students to develop the charge and operating parameters for the group.

### BP 5116.1 Students

Intradistrict and Interdistrict Enrollment

Intradistrict Open Enrollment

The Governing Board desires to provide enrollment options that meet the diverse needs and interests of district students. The Superintendent or designee shall establish procedures for the selection and transfer of students among district schools in accordance with law and Board Policy.

The parents/guardians of any student who resides within district boundaries may apply to enroll their child in any district school, regardless of the location of residence within the district.

### **Enrollment Priorities**

- 1. If a district school receiving Title I funds are identified for program improvement, corrective action or restructuring, all students enrolled in that school shall be provided an option to transfer to another district school or charter school. (20 USC 6316)
- 2. If while on school grounds a student becomes a victim of a violent criminal offense, as defined by the State Board of Education, or attends a school designated by the California Department of Education as persistently dangerous, he/she shall be provided an option to transfer to another district school or charter school. (20 USC 7912; 5 CCR 11992)
- 3. The Superintendent or designee may approve a student's transfer to a district school that is at capacity and otherwise closed to transfers upon finding that special circumstances exist that might be harmful or dangerous to the student in the current attendance area, including, but not limited to, threats of bodily harm or threats to the emotional stability of the student.

To grant priority under these circumstances, the Superintendent or designee must have received either: (Education Code <u>35160.5)</u>

- a. A written statement from a representative of an appropriate state or local agency, including but not limited to a law enforcement official or social worker, or a properly licensed or registered professional, including, but not limited to, a psychiatrist, psychologist or marriage and family therapist
- b. A court order, including a temporary restraining order and injunction

4. Priority may be given to siblings of students already in attendance in that school. For all other applications for enrollment outside a school's attendance area, the Superintendent or designee shall use a random, unbiased selection process to determine who shall be admitted whenever a school receives admission requests that are in excess of the school's capacity. (Education Code 35160.5)

### 5. Specialized Schools or Curricula

Any senior high school students may request to attend a school outside his/her attendance area for a specific curriculum offering that is not offered as his/her school of residence. Prerequisites may be necessary for enrollment in certain courses. Information on programs is available at each high school.

### 6. Bilingual Education

Any qualified English Learner (EL) student may apply for a transfer to a designated school with a bilingual program.

### 7. Special Education

Any student receiving special education services will follow the same enrollment options, policies and regulations established for regular education students and will be granted in accord with district enrollment priorities and based on availability of space.

### 8. Continuing Students

An elementary through senior high school student may continue at a school provided if the parent/guardian moves after the school year has already begun provided the parent/guardian submits a Transfer Application requesting to remain at that school.

### 9. Intradistrict Moves

A student who moves from one school's attendance area to another must obtain a Transfer of Pupil form from their last school of attendance prior to their enrollment in the new school of residence.

A student who moves during the summer after the records have been transferred from elementary to middle/junior high or middle/junior high to senior high, must obtain a Transfer of Pupil form from the high school the student would have attended had the family not moved.

When the parent/guardian of a student requests a Transfer of Pupil form to attend WCCUSD school, written documentation (see Verification Requirements for Resident Enrollment) must be presented to the sending school administrator before the Transfer of Pupil form is issued. The received school may check, also, to verify the new student's address.

### 10. Displaced Residents

A student may be re-directed to another school if there is no space available at his/her grade level at the school of residence. The student will be placed on a waiting list at his/her school of residence and may return when space becomes available. A redirected student may elect to remain at the receiving school.

### 11. Transferees from a Detainment Facility

The district shall accept for credit any course work satisfactorily completed by students while detained in a juvenile court school or county or state operated institution.

Transfer applications must be received by March 14 for the 2009-10 school year and in subsequent years by December 30 for students entering grades 7-12 and by February 1 for students entering grades K-6. Late applications will be considered only to the extent that space is available.

A random, unbiased selection process will be used to select students to fill the spaces that are available and a waiting list shall be established to indicate the order in which applicants may be accepted if more openings occur.

Enrollment decisions shall not be based on a student's academic or athletic performance, except that existing entrance criteria for specialized schools or programs may be used provided that the criteria are uniformly applied to all applicants. Academic performance may be used to determine eligibility for, or placement in, programs for gifted and talented students. (Education Code <u>35160.5</u>)

The Superintendent or designee shall inform applicants by mail as to whether their applications have been approved or denied, by March 30 for grades 7-12 and May 15 for grades K-6. If the application is denied, the reasons for denial shall be stated.

Applicants who receive approval must confirm their enrollment within two weeks of the mailing of the notification. Failure to respond will result in the denial of the request.

Once a student is enrolled, they have priority for enrollment the following year. The parent or guardian of the student must, however, apply for readmission prior to February 1 for grades K-6 and December 30 for grades 7-12. A student may be subject to displacement due to excessive enrollment for the following school year. However, students will not be displaced once their school year has begun. Parents must be notified if students are to be returned to their attendance area school prior to June.

No student currently residing within a school's attendance area shall be displaced by another student transferring from outside the attendance area. (Education Code <u>35160.5</u>)

Any complaints regarding the selection process shall be submitted to the Superintendent or designee in accord with the Uniform Parent Complaint Procedure.

### **Appeals**

Transfer decisions may be appealed by sending concerns in writing to the Transfer Office. Appeals will be reviewed by the administrators with overall responsibility for the elementary and secondary division.

### Harmful or Dangerous Special Circumstances

Any decision to grant priority for attendance outside a student's current attendance area because of harmful or dangerous special circumstances may be based upon the following:

- 1. A written statement from a representative of an appropriate state or local agency, including but not limited to a law enforcement official, social worker, or properly licensed or registered professional psychiatrist, psychologist, marriage, family and child counselor, or other professional.
- 2. A court order, including a temporary restraining order or injunction.

Upon making such a finding, the Superintendent or designee may approve the student's transfer to a district school that is not at capacity and otherwise closed to transfers.

### **Notifications**

Notifications shall be sent to parents/guardians (i.e. parent newsletters, student handbooks) at the beginning of each school year describing all current statutory attendance options and local attendance options available in the district. Such notification shall include: (Education Code 48980)

- 1. All options for meeting residency requirements for school attendance
- 2. A description of the procedure for application for alternative attendance areas or programs and the appeals process available, if any, when a change of attendance is denied
- 3. A district application form for requesting a transfer.
- 4. The explanation of attendance options under California law as provided by the California Department of Education.

### **Intradistrict Permits**

To remain on an Intradistrict Agreement the student and parent must agree to the following conditions:

- 1. The student will maintain a minimum attendance rate of 95% for each grading period. Exceptions may be granted with medical verification.
- 2. The student will attend school on time and have no truancies or unexcused absences during the year.
- 3. The student will maintain appropriate school behavior as outlined in the Student Handbook and Code of Conduct. If a student commits an offense that is subject to suspension under Education Code Section 48911 and District Policy 5116.1, the student may be returned to the home school at the end of the term of suspension.

### Interdistrict Attendance

The Governing Board recognizes that students who reside in one district may choose to attend school in another district and that such choices are made for a variety of reasons.

The Board desires to communicate with parents/guardians and students regarding the district's educational programs and services.

**Interdistrict Attendance Permits** 

Upon request by students' parents/guardians, the Superintendent or designee may approve interdistrict attendance permits with other districts on a case-by-case basis to meet individual student needs.

The Superintendent or designee may approve interdistrict attendance permits for the following reasons:

1. To meet the child care needs of K-8 students.

Such students may be allowed to continue to attend district schools only as long as they continue to use a child care provider within district boundaries.

- 2. To meet a child's special mental or physical health needs as certified by a physician, school psychologist, or other appropriate school personnel
- 3. When a student has a sibling(s) attending school in the receiving district, to avoid splitting the family's attendance
- 4. To allow a student to complete a school year when his/her parents/guardians have moved out of the district during that year
- 5. To allow students to remain with a class graduating that year from an elementary, junior, or senior high school
- 6. To let high school seniors attend the same school they attended as juniors, even if their families moved out of the district during the junior year

- 7. When the parent/guardian provides written evidence that the family will be moving into the district in the immediate future and would like the student to start the year in the district
- 8. When a student will be living out of the district for one year or less
- 9. When recommended by the School Attendance Review Board or by county child welfare, probation, or social service agency staff in documented cases of serious home or community problems which make it inadvisable for the student to attend the school of residence
- 10. When there is valid interest in a particular educational program not offered in the district of residence
- 11. To provide a change in school environment for reasons of personal and social adjustment

The interdistrict attendance permit shall not exceed a term of five years and shall stipulate the terms and conditions under which interdistrict attendance shall be permitted or denied. (Education Code 46600)

The Superintendent or designee may deny interdistrict attendance permits because of overcrowding within district schools or limited district resources.

### **Interdistrict Agreements**

Interdistrict attendance agreements can be considered only when the class enrollment in the district will permit the addition of out-of-district students, and when there is no financial burden to the district. However, once the interdistrict attendance agreement is entered into, it may not be revoked during the specified period of the agreement due to district overcrowding.

Interdistrict requests must be submitted at the beginning of each school year, and approval will be contingent upon continued space availability in the school or district. Interdistrict agreements are for the district, not for individual school sites. West Contra Costa Unified School District students will be given a priority for enrollment in attendance area schools. Second priority shall be given to students residing within the district who apply for Open Enrollment agreements to attend other schools of choice.

The Superintendent or designee shall notify the parents/guardians of a student who is denied interdistrict attendance regarding the process for appeal to the County Board of Education as specified in Education Code 46601. (Education Code 46601)

Students who are under consideration for expulsion or who have been expelled may not appeal interdistrict attendance denials or decisions while expulsion proceedings are pending, or during the term of the expulsion. (Education Code 46601)

All permits shall be reviewed annually. If the conditions of the permit have changed, the permit may not be renewed.

# Providing Leadership for California's School Districts and County Offices of Education

### ABOUT THE DELEGATE ASSEMBLY

CSBA's Delegate Assembly is a vital link in the Association's governance structure. The Delegate Assembly sets the general policy direction for the Association. Working with local districts, county offices, the Board of Directors and Executive Committee, Delegates ensure that the Association reflects the interests of school districts and county offices of education throughout the state.

The Delegate Assembly is made up of approximately 270+ Delegates who are elected by local board members in 21 geographic regions throughout the state. Some geographic regions have been further divided into subregions. Exofficio members of the Delegate Assembly with all privileges of membership include members of CSBA's Board of Directors, past presidents of CSBA and the immediate past

president of the California County Boards of Education (CCBE).

Delegates serve two-year terms beginning April 1. They meet twice a year to conduct business, and may also meet with the other Delegates and the Director within their region. Furthermore, they participate in CSBA events and they maintain contact with local boards in their region.

### **CSBA** GOVERNANCE

Delegates and Directors are CSBA's key governance links. They enable the Association to serve California's more than 1,000 school districts and county offices of education and its more than 5,000 locally elected school board members.

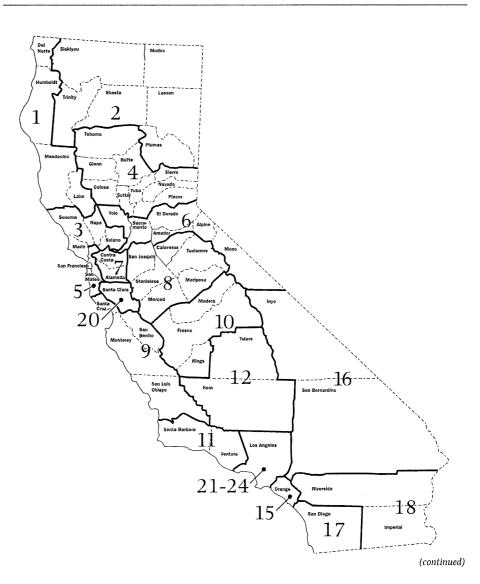

### BECOMING A DELEGATE

### **QUALIFICATIONS**

To be eligible to serve on CSBA's Delegate Assembly, a board member must:

- be a trustee of a district or county office of education that is a current member of CSBA: and
- be a trustee of a district or county office of education within the geographic region or subregion which the Delegate will represent.

### TERM OF OFFICE

The term of office for each Delegate is two years and begins on April 1. Within each region, approximately half of the Delegates are elected in even-numbered years and half in odd-numbered years.

### APPOINTMENTS TO THE DELEGATE ASSEMBLY

Districts with an ADA of 30,000–39,999 may appoint one Delegate. Additional appointments may be made as follows:

40,000–99,999 ADA: two Delegate seats

100,000–299,999 ADA: three Delegate seats

300,000 ADA or higher: seven Delegate seats

These districts also may participate in the nomination and selection of the other Delegates from that region or subregion.

### NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS

#### Nominations

Nominations for Delegate Assembly seats are made each year between the last Friday in October and January 7.

A board member must be formally nominated by a board in the region or subregion and may be nominated by his or her own district or county office. The nomination is an action that is taken in a public board meeting and requires a majority vote. A board may nominate as many individuals as it wishes. Nominees must sign a confirmation that they are willing to serve. It is critical that nominations and biographical sketch forms be delivered to the CSBA office, faxed or postmarked on or before January 7: late nominations and biographical sketch forms will not be accepted.

#### ELECTIONS

Ballots are mailed by February 1 to each district or county board within the region or subregion which has a vacancy. Ballots must be delivered to the CSBA office or postmarked by March 15 in order to be accepted. Ballots may not be faxed.

Voting for Delegates is an action of the entire board rather than individual board members: therefore, it is done at a public meeting and requires a majority vote. Each board may vote for as many persons as there

are positions to be filled within the region or subregion. The ballot will indicate how many positions are available. For example, if the terms of four Delegates are expiring, each board may vote for up to four persons. County boards vote only for the county seat within the region.

### TIMELINE FOR DELEGATE ELECTIONS

Last Friday in October–Jan. 7	Nominations and biographical sketches are submitted by local boards.
Feb. 1-March 15	Local boards vote and return ballots to CSBA.
April 30	Closing date for any run-off election held in regions or subregions with a tie vote.
By May 11	Final results are distributed to the CSBA membership.
May Delegate Assembly	Seating of new Delegates.

# ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF DELEGATES

Delegates set the general policy direction and fulfill a critical governance role within the Association. They communicate the interests of local boards to CSBA's Board of Directors, Executive Committee and staff. Delegates give policy and legislative direction through the adoption of the Policy Platform every two years and the adoption of other policy statements as needed. They also speak on issues and provide direct advocacy on behalf of the Association.

Delegates play an important communications and support role within their region. They also elect the Association's officers and Board of Directors. The authority and primary duties of Delegates are contained in the CSBA Bylaws.

## DELEGATES' ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

Primary responsibilities of Delegates include:

- providing a link to other public officials at the local, state and national levels:
- providing a communications link between local board members and the regional Director;
- attending all Delegate Assembly meetings;
- adopting the Policy Platform which guides the Association's policy and political leadership activities;
- as needed, adopting policies and positions to supplement the Platform;
- providing testimony and input on critical issues;
- electing the officers, Board of Directors and Nominating Committee members;
- adopting the Association's Bylaws:
- serving on committees, task forces and focus groups; and
- supporting the Association's activities and events.

He also requests membership and conference attendance for the National Association of Latino Elected and Appointed Officials and the Celebration Educational Opportunities for Hispanic Students. Expenses including registration, fees, travel, food and lodging are estimated to total approximately \$3,500. Funds for Board travel and conference are budgeted and there is sufficient funding within that budget.

### **Recommendation:**

That the Board authorize member Antonio Medrano to attend training and conferences.
