*CI C.5 2008-2009 Consolidated Application for Funding Categorical Aid Programs, Part II

Comment:

The Consolidated Application is the vehicle used by the California Department of Education to gather routine data regarding categorical programs and compliance with NCLB requirements.

Part I is submitted each June and serves as the District's application for categorical funding for the following academic year for both public and non-public schools. This report also includes a summary of participation in the NCLB Supplemental Educational Services (SES) program and the choice option. Expulsion, suspension and truancy data, as well as progress towards meeting the Highly Qualified Teacher and Highly Qualified Paraprofessional requirements are included.

Part II is submitted at the end of January. It contains information, in specified programs, related to entitlements, allocations, carryover, number of participants, and legal assurances of compliance, as required by State and Federal statute. A copy of the document is available for review at the Administration Building and at the State and Federal Programs office located at the Seaview Campus.

*CI C.7 Certificated Provisional Internship Permit (PIP) Request(s)

Comment:

The Provisional Internship Permit (PIP) was created in response to the phasing out of emergency permits and became effective on July 1, 2005. It allows an employing agency to hire an individual who has not yet met the subject matter competence requirement needed to enter an internship program. Prior to requesting a PIP, the employing agency must verify that a diligent search has been made, and a fully credentialed teacher cannot be found. The PIP is issued for one (1) year and is renewable one time only provided the teacher has taken all appropriate subject matter examinations, but has not yet passed those tests.

*CI C.9 Ratification and Approval of Engineering Services Contracts

Comment:

Contracts have been initiated by staff using previously qualified engineering, architectural, or landscape architectural firms to assist in completion of the referenced projects. Many of the firms are already under contract and the staff-initiated work may be an extension of the firm's existing contract with the District. Public contracting laws have been followed in initially qualifying and selecting these professionals.

*CI C.10 Ratification and Approval of Negotiated Change Orders

Comment:

Staff is seeking ratification of Change Orders on the following current District construction projects: DeAnza High School Fieldhouse; DeAnza High School Demolition & Sitework; Hercules Middle High School Fields, and Pinole Middle School New Gym & Classroom Projects. Change Orders are fully executed by the District upon signature by the Superintendent's designee. Board ratification is the final step required under state law in order to complete payment and contract adjustment.

In addition to normal ratification, approval of the noted Change Orders for the DeAnza High School Fieldhouse; DeAnza High School Demolition & Sitework; and Pinole Middle School New Gym & Classroom projects are required by the Board, with special findings as noted below, because these are in excess of the Public Contract Code limit of 10% of the original contract value. In accordance with Public Contract Code 20118.4, the Board, by approving and ratifying these Change Orders, finds that it would have been futile to publicly bid the work in question because of the tight time frames to complete this work without affecting the operations of the District, and that the public is best served by having this work completed by the contractor on the project.

*CI C.12 Transition Learning Center ("TLC") Access Ramps Replacement Project Award of Contract

Comment:

The District has received funding for the replacement of damaged wood ramps to the existing modular buildings at TLC. These access ramps will be removed and replaced at seven buildings on the North Campus site of TLC. The Seville Group ("SGI") has prepared bid specifications for the project. A public bid process was completed for the project. Bids were opened on January 27, 2009. Four Contractors submitted bids. They are as follows: Coast Side Associates \$39,620; ERA Construction \$38,150; BHM Construction \$37,483; and Streamline Builders \$33,000. The lowest responsive, responsible bidder is Streamline Builders at \$33,000.

This item is being presented prior to the expiration of the five working day Bid Protest period. In consideration of this timing, and in order to expedite the project, the Board's action will be to authorize staff to issue the Notice of Award effective at the end of the Bid Protest period to the lowest responsive, responsible bidder. This award by staff will then be brought back for ratification at a future meeting.

<u>Recommendation:</u> Authorize staff to issue Notice of Award upon successful completion of the Bid Protest period.

*CI C.13 Award of Contract for Testing and Inspection Services for Measure J Schools: Ford, Dover, and King

Comment:

The District is ready to start construction on the first elementary school renovations under the Measure J Bond Program. As a part of any school construction project, the Division of State Architect ("DSA") requires materials testing and inspection during the course of the work. The Structural Engineer of Record and the Architect of Record for the King, Dover and Ford Elementary projects have indicated in the plans and specifications for their projects which items require testing and inspection. The District has issued a Request for Proposals, advertised the process, held a pre-proposal conference, and is entertaining firms which are reviewing all of the plans and specifications for the project. The proposals are due on January 29, 2009. Staff will bring a recommendation for award to the meeting of February 4, 2009.

Comment: The DeAnza High School Fieldhouse project is nearing comple	etion. The exterior finish of the building is

The DeAnza High School Fieldhouse project is nearing completion. The exterior finish of the building is a mix of stucco and brick, which is the overall finish for the future new campus providing an appropriate educational building aesthetic for the facility. Concerns have been raised regarding graffiti removal from natural brick surfaces. Staff has reviewed and discussed these concerns with the Board's Facilities Subcommittee. It has been determined that it would be important to apply an anti-graffiti coating to the brick surfaces. This was not included in the original bid documents. Seville Group, the District's Program Manager, has prepared a bid package using the product specified and included in the El Cerrito HS project. The project for the application of the anti-graffiti coating is currently out for public bid. The bids are due to be opened on February 3, 2009. Staff will bring a recommendation for award to the meeting of February 4, 2009.

This item is being presented prior to the expiration of the five working day Bid Protest period. F. <u>ACTION ITEMS</u>

* F.1 Charter School Facilities Preliminary Offer to Leadership Public Schools

Comment:

At the meeting of January 21, 2009, the Board directed staff to modify the proposed Charter School Facilities Preliminary Offer to Leadership Public Schools ("LPS") and prepare a new offer for placement at the Kennedy High School campus. Since that meeting, staff has reviewed options for placement at the site and engaged in dialogue with both Leadership and Kennedy staff to consider the proposal. The resultant of those planning meetings was a consensus of both staffs that the proposed offer of facilities at Kennedy High School for the 2009/2010 school year would cause an extreme hardship to the respective educational programs. Pursuant to the provisions of Proposition 39, LPS would be obligated to vacate district facilities in the event that they did not accept the District's offer for 2009/2010. Both groups are requesting the Board to reconsider the action. This would allow additional time for planning and preparation, giving the District and its Charter partner time to develop an appropriate shared facilities model at the Kennedy High site. Both LPS and the District have jointly agreed to waive the statutory deadline of February 1st for the preliminary offer, in anticipation that the Board would agree to reconsider. The Charter School Facilities Preliminary Offer to Leadership Public Schools for the Nystrom Temporary Campus is attached.

<u>Recommendation:</u> Reconsider previous action and authorize staff to submit Charter School Facilities Preliminary Offer to Leadership Public Schools for placement at the Nystrom Temporary Campus for the 2009/2010 school year. Direct staff to initiate a planning process for the 2010/2011 school year to place LPS at the Kennedy High School campus.

* F.2 Public Hearing Regarding Request for Bond Waiver

Comment:

The West Contra Costa Unified School District Board of Education will hold a public hearing to review and consider adoption of Resolution No. 59-0809 Requesting the State Board of Education to Waive West Contra Costa Unified School District Measure J Bonding Limit, as provided by Education Code Sections 15106 and 15270. The public hearing, pursuant to Education Code 33050(a), will be held at a regular board meeting that begins at 6:30 p.m. on February 4, 2009, at Pinole Valley High School, Cafeteria, Pinole, CA 94564.

The purpose of the waiver will be to permit the District to issue all the remaining authorized Measure J bonds for modernization and construction related projects.

Interested persons wishing to comment on the proposed waiver request may be heard at the public hearing, or may submit written comments and questions to the Office of Business Services no later than February 3, 2009.

The documentation for the Bond Waiver is available for review at 1108 Bissell Avenue, Richmond.

F.3 Resolution No. 59-0809 Requesting the State Board of Education to Waive West Contra Costa Unified School District Measure J Bonding Limit

Comment:

The Education Code provides that bonds of a unified school district may be issued in amounts up to a statutory bonding limit of 2.5% of the district's assessed valuation, as calculated by the county assessor. The District's outstanding bonds from all ballot measures currently total approximately \$636 million, compared to an estimated bonding capacity of \$676 million. The District has remaining Measure J bonding authorization of \$210 million. To issue these bonds within the statutory bonding limit would require an unknown delay until assessed valuation can grow or outstanding bonds can be paid down in a sufficient amount. Delaying issuance of the remaining bonds will drive the building program seriously off schedule, and increase costs significantly.

The State Board of Education has the power to waive certain provisions of the Education Code, and has waived the bonding limit for other school districts (including the District in 2002). Measure J included a statement to the voters informing them that the District would likely seek a waiver of the statutory bonding limit. If the State Board grants the waiver, staff estimates that issuance of the bonds would cause the District's debt to be at 3.15% of total assessed valuation, and that debt would be above the 2.5% bonding limit until approximately 2012-2013, depending on actual growth in property values in the District. Bonds would be issued such that the property tax rate would not exceed the promise to the voters and the Proposition 39 limit of \$60 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation. The Bonds would be issued during the summer of 2009.

Preceding adoption of this resolution, the Board will conduct the requisite public hearing, scheduled during the February 4th meeting, following notice to the public. This resolution will authorize District staff to

submit the waiver request to the State Board, and to work with them as required to document and support the request.

* F.4 Resolution No. 60-0809 Approving Behavioral Intervention Plans [Hughes Bill] Mandated Cost Claim Settlement and Agreement to Waive Future Claims

Comment:

The Behavioral Intervention Plans [Hughes Bill] Mandated Cost Claim Settlement settles the test claim CSM-4464 initiated by San Diego Unified School District, Butte County Office of Education, and San Joaquin County Office of Education, and the related Sacramento Superior Court case, Case No. 03CS01432, regarding reimbursement for costs associated with behavioral intervention plans required by the Hughes Bill statute and regulations under state law. If approved, it ends a fourteen-year dispute with the State of California regarding funding for state behavioral intervention plan requirements that are in excess of federal law. The settlement provides reimbursement for past costs associated with behavioral intervention plans and certain funding for ongoing costs. The Legislature's obligation to fund the settlement is contingent on 85% of all districts, county offices of education, and special education local plan areas constituting 92% of statewide ADA waiving their rights to file additional mandated cost claims on the current Hughes Bill statute and regulations.

In the resolution, the Board (1) approves the settlement which will bring the District approximately \$14.85 per 2007-08 ADA annually for the six-year period beginning 2011-12 through 2016-17, the SELPA approximately \$8.85 per December 2007 special education pupil count in 2009-10 and approximately \$10.92 per ADA (ongoing) for the SELPA as part of the AB 602 funding formula, beginning in 2009-2010, and increasing by COLA and ADA growth in subsequent years; (2) agrees to waive its ability to file future mandated cost claims on the Hughes Bill statute and regulations as currently worded; and (3) directs the District's authorized representative to sign the Waiver to implement this action.

* F.5 Resolution No. 61-0809 Temporary Borrowing Between Funds

Comment:

Due to concerns regarding the status of cash at the State level and the possibility that the normal flow of State deposits may be delayed, staff is recommending that the District set in place a contingency plan for cash flow purposes at the local level. Should the need arise, this resolution permits the school district to temporarily borrow cash between funds at the County Treasurer in order to insure that a particular fund does not carry a negative cash balance.

If the State Controller were to defer the deposits for our District, as has been proposed, our regular deposits would be cut in half in February. The deposits would then be restored in April and July. The District has implemented cost containment measures in an effort to preserve cash and avoid the need for temporary borrowing. Ms. Kronenberg, Mr. Medrano, Mr. Thurmond, Student Representative Shem (advisory vote only) and President Miles voted yes, with no abstentions and Mr. Ramsey absent. Motion carried 4-0-0-1.

E.6 Temporary Relocation for Portola Middle School and Adams Middle School

Bill Savidge provided a brief presentation regarding the relocation of Portola Middle School and Adams Middle School and presented options and cost considerations.

Superintendent Harter discussed how the options presented would interface with the school closure scenarios and clarified that the recommendation for the board was to authorize staff to develop preliminary plans, estimated costs and comprehensive schedules for the relocation of Portola and Adams Middle Schools.

Public Comment:

Robert Brower discussed how the CEQA process weighed into the proposed plans.

Christina Slamon commented on the various choices presented and recommended postponing the decision until completion of the school closure decisions.

Joanna Pace thanked Superintendent Harter and staff for the community meetings and said she advocated keeping a middle school at Portola.

Robert Studdiford spoke against having this as an action item.

Miné Ternar Kal said the safety of the children comes first, and asked the Board to take into consideration the best interest of special needs students.

Board Comment:

Mr. Thurmond inquired about the timing of mobilizing a relocation for Portola students. Mr. Savidge responded and spoke about the need for engaging in a CEQA study for El Cerrito High School.

Background Information:

Ford Elementary School has been relocated to the temporary campus at the Downer site. The next step in the reconstruction of the school is hazardous materials abatement, demolition of existing buildings, utility work and building pad preparation. Sally Swanson Architects has prepared a bid package for the Increment 1 work on the Ford site including all of this work.

The District conducted a public bid process for this project. Bids were received on January 20, 2009. Nine Contractors submitted bids. They are as follows: Trinet Construction \$1,161,000; Peak Engineering \$1,091,042; Silverado Contractors \$944,862; Parc Services S912,749; Evans Brothers \$846,350; North Bay Construction \$818,990; Ghilotti Brothers \$798,900; OC Jones and Sons \$736,100; and, Bay Cities Paving and Grading \$697,000. The lowest responsive, responsible bidder is Bay Cities Paving and Grading at \$697,000. This cost is substantially below the estimated construction cost and budgeted amount for this work.

This item is being presented prior to the expiration of the 5 working day Bid Protest period. In consideration of this timing, and in order to expedite the project, the Board's action will be to authorize staff to issue the Notice of Award effective at the end of the Bid Protest period to the lowest responsive, responsible bidder. This award by staff will then be brought back for ratification at a future meeting.

WHEREAS, California's more than 6 million students deserve the highest quality education; and

WHEREAS, The Legislature and Governor already imposed \$2.8 billion in education cuts in September 2008, resulting in significant reduction of essential programs and services to students that are integral to their success; and

WHEREAS, These cuts have resulted in teacher layoffs and increased class sizes statewide, not to mention a further erosion of the support system for students provided by thousands of classified and paraprofessional staff that have also been laid off; and

WHEREAS, The Legislature and the Governor propose to cut schools even further in the middle of the current school year, compounded by deep cuts in 2009-10, resulting in districts having \$1,500 less per student than they need to maintain programs and services for students of two years ago; and

WHEREAS, Very broad fiscal flexibility is essential for maximum local decision-making and would allow districts to prioritize during the budget crisis; and

WHEREAS, The Governor's budget plan also illegally manipulates Proposition 98, the state's minimum school funding law, to permanently cut at least \$7 billion from California's students, in violation of the California Constitution; and

WHEREAS, Further budget reductions to education are fundamentally inconsistent with the state's goal of improving student achievement, at a time when our students are making progress toward meeting rigorous state and federal education standards; and

WHEREAS, The budget problem was not created by our students and fixing it should not come at the expense of their educational progress and success;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Governing Board of the West Contra Costa Unified School District adamantly opposes further cuts to education funding and urges the Legislature and Governor to immediately solve the budget crisis with a balanced approach that includes revenue increases; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Governing Board of the West Contra Costa Unified School District supports broad local budget flexibility to help school districts prioritize the resources they have to best serve the needs of their students.

PRELIMINARY OFFER OF FACILITIES

Dear Mr. Faustine:

The West Contra Costa Unified School District ("District") has received the September 30, 2008 written request for facilities by Leadership Public Schools Richmond Charter School ("Leadership" or "Charter School") for the 2009-2010 school year. The Board of Trustees ("Board") of the District has considered the request of the Charter School for provision of a reasonably equivalent District facility under the terms of Proposition 39, its implementing regulations (Ed. Code, § 47614; Cal. Code Regs., tit. 5, § 11969.1 et seq.), and applicable case law. In accordance with District Policy, the District makes this preliminary offer of facilities.

5 CCR § 11969.9(f) states as follows:

On or before February 1, the school district shall prepare in writing a preliminary proposal regarding the space to be allocated to the charter school and/or to which the charter school is to be provided access. At a minimum, the preliminary proposal shall include (1) the projections of in-district classroom ADA on which the proposal is based, (2) the specific location or locations of the space, (3) all conditions pertaining to the space, including a draft of any proposed agreement pertaining to the charter school's use of the space, and (4) the projected pro rata share amount and a description of the methodology used to determine that amount. The district shall also provide the charter school a list and description of the comparison group schools used in developing its preliminary proposal, and a description of the differences between the preliminary proposal and the charter school's facilities request as submitted pursuant to subdivision (b).

Following is the District's preliminary offer of facilities to the Charter School for the 2009-2010 school year:

1) <u>Description of Facilities</u>: The District will make available to the Charter School facilities at the "Leadership Public School Temporary Campus," located adjacent to the campus of Nystrom Elementary School at South 10th Street, Richmond, California, beginning with the 2009-2010 school year. The facilities, which the Charter School first occupied in January 2009, consist of the following:

Building Group A:

5 Classrooms (including Biology Classroom) @ 960 Square Feet each 1 Administrative Office @ 542 Square Feet

Building Group B:

6 Classrooms @ 960 Square Feet each

1 RSP Classroom @ 663 Square Feet

1 Art Classroom @ 835 Square Feet

6 Offices

Building Group C:

4 Classrooms & 960 Square Feet each

1 Science Classroom @ 960 Square Feet each

1 Biology Classroom @ 960 Square Feet each

1 Girls' Toilet

1 Storage Room

Building Group D:

2 Classrooms @ 960 Square Feet each

1 Media Library Classroom @ 960 Square Feet

1 Cafeteria

Building Group E:

2 Computer Classrooms @ 960 Square Feet each Boys' Toilet Girls' Toilet

A site plan depicting the above-listed facilities is attached as Exhibit A.

As part of the Master Facilities Plan update, the District will house the Charter School at the Temporary Campus Site pending the demolition of the building holding the Gompers Continuation School and the construction of a new facility at that site.

Funding has not yet been secured for this project, and there is no current timetable for its completion.

2) Comparison Group Schools:

In accordance with the methodology set forth in 5 C.C.R §11969.3(a), the comparison group schools for Leadership are Richmond High School, Kennedy High School and De Anza High School.

The above-described facilities meet the reasonable equivalence requirement set forth in Proposition 39 and 5 C.C.R §11969.3(a) with reference to the capacity and condition of the comparison group schools, since the Charter School's facilities consist of new construction and also includes the following non-classroom and specialized classroom space: 1 administrative space, 6 office spaces, Biology Classrooms (2), Art Classroom, RSP Classroom, 2 Computer Classrooms, Media Library Classroom and Science Classroom. The Charter School shall also have continued use of the auditorium, gymnasium and fields at Martin Luther King Park.

4) <u>ADA Assumptions</u>:

The Charter School's Request for Facilities identifies a projected total classroom ADA of 320, and a total in-District classroom ADA of 313, for the 2009-2010 school year. Pursuant to 5 C.C.R. § 11969.9(d), the District, on December 1, 2008, sent a letter to the Charter School objecting to its ADA projections and providing a projection of 300 ADA for the 2009-2010 school year. A true and correct copy of this letter is attached as Exhibit B.

The District's offer meets and exceeds the capacity standards set forth in 5 C.C.R. 11969.2(b) according to the District's loading standards. The District is offering no less than 17 classrooms, and 7 specialized teaching spaces, for the Charter School's projected in-District ADA of 300 students.

5) Pro Rata Share:

The District will waive the pro-rata share set forth in Education Code section 47614 since the pro rata share has historically yielded only nominal sums, and is cumbersome and time-consuming to calculate. It is not in the District's interests at this point to compute such a fee. The District is not waiving the right to collect this fee, or agreeing to any interpretation of the Education Code that would prevent the District from collecting the pro rata share under Education Code section 47614. The District will collect an oversight fee of 3% as set forth in Education Code section 47614, as well as the Charter School's share of the State Loan Repayment (\$____/ADA for 2009-2010), as well as special education encroachment (\$____/ADA for 2009-2010.)

6) <u>Conditions:</u>

The Charter School's use and occupation of the facilities is conditioned upon payment of the 3% oversight fee under Education Code section 47613. (The District will also collect the Charter School's share of the State Loan Repayment, as well as special education encroachment, as identified in the previous paragraph.) The Charter School will also be required to execute the attached Facilities Use Agreement. (5 CCR § 11969.9(f)(3).) The Charter School will be required to comply with all of the obligations set forth under Proposition 39 and its implementing regulations, including but not limited to the requirement that it assume responsibility for "[t]he ongoing operations and maintenance of facilities and furnishings and equipment" at the site, and "shall comply with school district policies regarding the operations and maintenance of the school facility and furnishings and equipment." (5 C.C.R. § 11969.4)

7) <u>Location Preference/Differences from Facilities Request:</u>

The District notes that the Charter School's September 30, 2008 facilities request states that "the charter school desires to continue locating its facility in the temporary campus adjacent to Nystrom Elementary." This facilities offer complies with the location preference. Therefore, the District has met the requirement set forth in Education Code section 47614(b) that "[t]he school district shall make reasonable efforts to provide the charter school with facilities near to where the charter school wishes to locate." There are also no differences between the Charter School's Facilities Request and the District's offer. (5 CCR § 11969.9(f))

Under 5 C.C.R. § 11969.9(g), the Charter School "shall respond in writing to the school district's preliminary proposal made pursuant to subdivision (f), expressing any concerns, addressing differences between the preliminary proposal and the charter school's facilities request pursuant to subdivision (b), and/or making counter proposals," on or before March 1, 2009.

The State Board of Education has the power to waive certain provisions of the Education Code, and has waived the bonding limit for other school districts (including the District in 2002). Measure J included a statement to the voters informing them that the District would likely seek a waiver of the statutory bonding limit. If the State Board grants the waiver, staff estimates that issuance of the bonds would cause the District's debt to be at 3.15% of total assessed valuation, and that debt would be above the 2.5% bonding limit until approximately 2012-2013, depending on actual growth in property values in the District. Bonds would be issued such that the property tax rate would not exceed the promise to the voters and the Proposition 39 limit of \$60 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation. The Bonds would be issued during the summer of 2009.		
Preceding adoption of this resolution, the Board will conduct the requisite public hearing, scheduled during the February 4th meeting, following notice to the public. RESOLUTION REQUESTING STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION TO WAIVE DISTRICT'S BONDING LIMIT.

WHEREAS, this Board of Education (the "Board of Education") of West Contra Costa Unified School District (the "District"), located in the County of Contra Costa (the "County"), California, duly called and an election was regularly held in the District pursuant to Chapter 1.5 of Part 10 of Title 1 (commencing with Section 15264) of the Code, on November 8, 2005, at which a bond proposition summarized as follows was submitted to the electors of the District:

"To continue repairing all school facilities, improve classroom safety and technology, and relieve overcrowding shall the West Contra Costa Unified School District issue \$400 million in bonds at legal interest rates, with annual audits and a citizens' oversight committee to monitor that funds are spent accordingly, and upon receipt of a waiver of the District's statutory debt limit from the State Board of Education, if required?"

and

WHEREAS, at least 55% of the votes cast on said proposition ("Measure J"), which is the requisite voter approval threshold, were in favor of issuing said bonds; and

WHEREAS, at the request of the District, the Board of Supervisors of the County has previously issued the West Contra Costa Unified School District General Obligation Bonds, Election of 2005, Series A, in the aggregate principal amount of \$70,000,000, and the West Contra Costa Unified School District General Obligation Bonds, Election of 2005, Series B in the aggregate principal amount of \$120,000,000; and

WHEREAS, an aggregate principal amount of \$210,000,000 of bonds remains unissued pursuant to Measure J; and

WHEREAS, Section 15270(a) of the Code provides, in pertinent part, that a unified school district may only issue bonds approved by a 55% vote that, in aggregation with any other outstanding bonds of the district, do not exceed 2.5% of the taxable property of the District as shown by the last equalized assessment of the County; and

WHEREAS, Section 15106 of the Code similarly provides, in pertinent part, that a unified school district may only issue bonds that, in aggregation with other outstanding bonds of the district issued pursuant to Section 15270, do not exceed 2.5% of the taxable property of the District as shown by the last equalized assessment of the County; and

WHEREAS, Section 15270(a) of the Code also provides that bonds approved by a 55% vote may only be issued if the tax rate levied to pay all of the bonds approved at such election will not exceed \$60 per year per \$100,000 of taxable property when assessed value is projected by the District; and

WHEREAS, based on the current amount of outstanding bonded indebtedness of the District, the current assessed valuation of property within the District, the facilities needs of the District, the expected cost increases associated with delay in issuing the unissued Measure J Bonds and completing the bond projects, and other factors, this Board of Education has determined that it is necessary and desirable to issue and sell all of the remaining Measure J Bonds in order to complete needed school facilities construction and renovation projects within the District, and

WHEREAS, based on the current equalized assessment of the County, issuance of all of the unissued Measure J Bonds would cause the total amount of bonds of the district to exceed the applicable bonding limit provisions of Section 15270(a); and

WHEREAS, Sections 33050 and following of the Code authorize the governing board of a school district to request the State Board of Education (the "State Board") to waive all or part of any section of the Education Code or any regulation adopted by the State Board that implements a provision of the Education Code, subject to certain exceptions; and

WHEREAS, the bonding limit provisions of Sections 15270(a) and 15106 are not listed as exceptions to Sections 33050 and following, and, therefore, may be waived by the State Board upon proper and sufficient application; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Measure J, voters have authorized the Board of Education to seek the waiver herein contemplated under Section 33050 and have approved the issuance of Measure J Bonds upon such a waiver; and

WHEREAS, the Citizens Bond Oversight Committee of the District has been provided information regarding the proceedings undertaken by the District in connection with the request for waiver described herein; and

WHEREAS, the District, pursuant to applicable law, posted, distributed or published a public notice, including the date, time, location and subject of a public hearing, inviting public testimony regarding the request for waiver described herein; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education held a duly noticed public hearing on February 4, 2009, during which the public was afforded the opportunity to testify regarding the same; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 33050(d) of the Code, prior to the submission of the request for waiver described herein, the District intends to provide an opportunity for the exclusive representative or representatives of the employees of the District to participate in the development of the waiver request; and

WHEREAS, on November 14, 2002, the State Board has previously granted the District a waiver regarding the bonding limit provisions of Section 15106 with respect to bonds of the District issued pursuant to voter authorizations in 1998, 2000 and 2002; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education deems that it is necessary and desirable to request the State Board to waive the bonding limit of Section 15270(a), but not the tax rate limit of Section 15270(a), and the bonding limit of 15106, if applicable, with regard to the unissued Measure J Bonds, pursuant to Sections 33050 and following, according to the terms and in the manner hereinafter set forth;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF WEST CONTRA COSTA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT DOES HEREBY RESOLVE, DETERMINE AND ORDER, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Recitals. All of the above recitals are true and correct.

Section 2. Waiver Request. The Board of Education hereby respectfully requests that the State Board waive the bonding limit of Section 15270(a), but not the tax rate limit provisions of Section 15270(a), and the bonding limit of 15106, if applicable, with regard to the District's authorized but unissued Measure J Bonds.

Section 3. Further Action: The Superintendent, or his designee, is hereby authorized and directed to prepare and submit, as soon as practicable hereafter, a General Waiver Request consistent with Section 2 hereof, to the California Department of Education for consideration and action by the State Board; provided that, prior to the submission of such request, the Superintendent, or his designee, provides an opportunity for the exclusive representative or representatives of the employees of the District to participate in the development of the waiver request. In addition, the Superintendent, or his designee, is hereby authorized and directed to provide such additional information and materials to the State Board as may be requested, and to take any such other action as the Superintendent may deem necessary to accomplish the purposes of this Resolution.

RESOLUTION NO. 60-0809 APROVAL OF BEHAVIORAL INTERVENTION PLANS [HUGHES BILL] MANDATED COST CLAIM SETTLEMENT AND AGREEMENT TO WAIVE FUTURE CLAIMS

WHEREAS, the Commission on State Mandates ("the Commission"), in a test claim known as the Behavioral Intervention Plans [Hughes Bill] Mandated Cost Claim, has determined that, since 1993, there are unfunded state mandates exceeding the federal requirements in the following seven (7) components of the Hughes Bill Statute and Regulations (California Education Code section 56523 and California Code of Regulations, title 5, sections 3001, subdivisions (c), (d), (e), (f), and (aa), and 3052): special education local plan area ("SELPA") plan requirements, development and implementation of behavioral intervention plans, functional analysis assessments, modifications and contingent behavioral intervention plans, development and implementation of emergency interventions, prohibited behavioral intervention plans, and due process hearings;

WHEREAS, these state mandates remain required components of the Hughes Bill Statute and Regulations;

WHEREAS, final claiming instructions for the Behavioral Intervention Plans Mandated Cost Claim were never adopted by the Commission due to various disputes that arose with the State;

WHEREAS, the State's Department of Finance disputes that any of the identified Behavioral Intervention Plans Mandated Cost Claim mandates qualify for state reimbursement because it contends they are required by federal law, and therefore the State has filed a lawsuit with the Sacramento Superior Court, case No. 03CS01432, to contest the Commission's decision in the Behavioral Intervention Plans Mandated Cost Claim;

WHEREAS, the Test Claimants believe that the identified mandates require new programs and increased levels of service in excess of federal law, and are therefore unfunded state mandates, and therefore the Test Claimants oppose the court action filed by the State challenging the Commission's decision;

WHEREAS, this litigation could thwart resolution of these matters for a number of years;

WHEREAS, to avoid the cost and uncertainty of further litigation, to alleviate the uncertainty regarding the Hughes Bill Statute and Regulations funding, and to expedite the resolution of this long-pending mandate claim, the State and the Test Claimants ("Parties") have determined to compromise and settle the claims set forth in the Behavioral Intervention Plans Mandated Cost Claim;

WHEREAS, the Parties have negotiated a settlement agreement ("Agreement"), which provides \$520 million as general fund reimbursement for past costs associated with the Hughes Bill Statute and Regulations, allocated as follows:

- \$510 million to school districts based on 2007-08 P-2 average daily attendance ("ADA") (about \$14.85 per ADA annually for six years, beginning in 2011-12, or for a lesser period at the State's discretion should the State choose to accelerate payment of such reimbursement);
- \$1.5 million to county offices of education in 2009-10 based on December 2007 county special education pupil count, about \$35.06 per pupil, with no county office of education receiving less than \$5,000;
- \$6 million to SELPAs in 2009-10 based on December 2007 special education pupil count, about \$8.85 per pupil, with no SELPA receiving less than \$10,000; and
- \$2.5 million in 2009-10 for administrative costs incurred in pursuing the Claim;

WHEREAS, the settlement further provides \$65 million as a permanent increase to the AB 602 funding base for special education programs and services beginning in 2009-10, resulting in each SELPA's funding rate increasing by about \$10.92 per ADA, with this amount increasing by the cost of living adjustment and ADA growth in subsequent years;

WHEREAS, by approving this settlement the West Contra Costa Unified School District will receive approximately \$2,496,000 in discretionary funding for retroactive reimbursement, \$416,000 over six-years in equal installments, unless the State, in its discretion, accelerates payment of such reimbursement, and the West Contra Costa SELPA will receive approximately \$39,000 in discretionary funding for retroactive reimbursement;

WHEREAS, the West Contra Costa Unified School District and SELPA, in exchange for the foregoing financial settlement, must waive rights to file any further mandate claims arising from the Hughes Bill Statute and Regulations, or to benefit from any new Hughes Bill Statue and Regulations claims filed, unless the Hughes Bill Statute and Regulations change;

WHEREAS, if for some reason the settlement process is not completed, the Waiver will not take effect;

WHEREAS, the Governing Board of the West Contra Costa Unified School District also serves as the Governing Board of the West Contra Costa SELPA;

WHEREAS, the Governing Board of the West Contra Costa Unified School District and SELPA has reviewed the Notice to LEAs Re: Pending Settlement of the Behavioral Intervention Plans [Hughes Bill] Mandated Cost Claim and the required Waiver; and

WHEREAS, the District and SELPA administrative staff, having reviewed the terms of the pending settlement, recommends that the Governing Board approve the settlement and agree to waive rights to file mandated cost claims arising from the Hughes Bill Statute and Regulations in the future or to benefit from such claims unless the Hughes Bill Statute and Regulations change;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Governing Board of the West Contra Costa Unified School District, sitting also as the Governing Board of the SELPA, approves the terms of the pending settlement of the Behavioral Intervention Plans Mandated Cost Claim, agrees to waive its rights regarding claims as set forth in the attached Waiver both with respect to the school district and with respect to the SELPA, and authorizes the Superintendent [or Associate/Assistant Superintendent (as appropriate)] to sign the required Waiver on behalf of both entities and to deliver it as requested by no later than February 28, 2009, and to complete any other administrative task necessary to effectuate this decision.

WAIVER

This Waiver is entered into on February 4, 2009 by the West Contra Costa Unified School District, hereinafter "LEA," to fulfill one of the terms of the Settlement and Release Agreement for the Behavioral Intervention Plans Mandated Cost Claim ("Agreement").

A. Known Claims

With respect to section 56523 of the California Education Code and the California Code of Regulations, title 5, sections 3001, subdivisions (c), (d), (e), (f), and (aa), and section 3052 as those sections read on or before July 1, 2008, (collectively "the Hughes Bill Statute and Regulations"), LEA hereby knowingly and voluntarily waives the rights set forth under article XIIIB, section 6, of the California Constitution, sections 17500 through 17630 of the California Government Code, and sections 1181 through 1189.11 of Title 2 of the California Code of Regulations. By signing this Waiver, LEA hereby acknowledges that LEA forever gives up its right to file any mandated cost claim regarding the Hughes Bill Statute and Regulations, and/or to pursue any filed claim regarding that statute and regulations, and/or to benefit from such a claim, including any claim regarding the following programs and services:

- 1. Special education local plan area plan requirements pursuant to California Code of Regulations, title 2, sections 3001, subdivision (c), and 3052, subdivision (j), as these sections read on July 1, 2008;
- 2. Development and implementation of behavioral intervention plans pursuant to California Code of Regulations, title 2, sections 3001, subdivisions (c), (d), (e), and (f), and 3052, subdivisions (a), (c), (d), (e), and (f), as these sections read on July 1, 2008;
- 3. Functional analysis assessments pursuant to California Code of Regulations, title 2, sections 3001, subdivisions (d) and (f), and 3052, subdivisions (b), (c), and (f), as these sections read on July 1, 2008;
- 4. Modifications and contingent behavioral intervention plans pursuant to California Code of Regulations, title 2, section 3052, subdivisions (g) and (h), as these sections read on July 1, 2008;
- 5. Development and implementation of emergency interventions pursuant to California Code of Regulations, title 2, sections 3001, subdivisions (c) and (d), and 3052, subdivision (i), as these sections read on July 1, 2008;

- 6. Prohibited behavioral intervention plans pursuant to California Code of Regulations, title 2, sections 3001, subdivision (d), and 3052, subdivision (l), as these sections read on July 1, 2008; and
- 7. Due process hearings pursuant to California Code of Regulations, title 2, section 3052, subdivision (m), as this section read on July 1, 2008.

LEA further acknowledges and concedes that the amount that is required to be appropriated for the purpose of satisfying the STATE's minimum funding obligation to LEAs pursuant to article XVI, section 8, of the California Constitution shall not be required to be increased, to any extent, by payment of the retrospective amounts described in Paragraph II.B. of the Agreement, and by signing this Waiver LEA forever gives up its right to contend otherwise.

B. Unknown Claims

- 1. LEA expressly waives the application of California Civil Code section 1542 regarding mandated cost claims under California Education Code section 56523 and California Code of Regulations, title 5, sections 3001, subdivisions (c), (d), (e), (f), and (aa), and 3052 as those sections read on or before July 1, 2008.
- 2. LEA certifies that it has read the following provisions of California Civil Code Section 1542:
 - "A general release does not extend to claims which the creditor does not know or suspect to exist in his favor at the time of executing the release, which if known by him must have materially affected his settlement with the debtor."
- 3. LEA understands that it is agreeing that California Civil Code section 1542 does not apply to this Waiver. LEA understands and acknowledges that the significance and consequence of this waiver of California Civil Code section 1542 is:
 - a. LEA may have additional claims arising or occurring up to the date of this Waiver of which it is not now aware;
 - b. LEA may not make a further demand for any such claims;
 - c. LEA may not receive any benefit(s) from any such claims that may be filed by other claimants; and
 - d. LEA extends its waiver to include now unknown and/or later discovered claims.

C. Exemptions

LEA signs this Waiver with the understanding that it does not prohibit LEAs from filing mandated cost claims to the extent that the Hughes Bill Statute and Regulations are amended or added or changed in any way after July 1, 2008.

D. Advice of Attorney

LEA warrants and represents that it has reviewed and understands the Notice to LEAs Re: Pending Settlement of the Behavioral Intervention Plans Mandated Cost Claim ("the Notice") and this Waiver, and that it has been advised to seek legal advice from the attorney of its choice regarding the Notice and this Waiver. LEA acknowledges and represents either that it relied upon legal advice from its attorney in executing this Waiver or that it chose not to rely upon legal advice from its attorney in executing this Waiver. LEA further acknowledges and represents that, in executing this Waiver, it has not relied on any inducements, promises, or representations other than those stated in the Notice and Waiver.

E. <u>Contingency of Waiver</u>

LEA understands that this Waiver is binding only if the preconditions to the full implementation of the Settlement Agreement are satisfied. Those preconditions are set out in Section C of the Notice and Section II.A. of the Agreement, and are, in brief: (1) at least 85% of all LEAs sign this Waiver, including school districts and county offices of education who served student populations accounting for 92% of the P-2 2007-08 ADA; (2) the parties seek a superior court ruling that the settlement is final and binding on all LEAs; and (3) legislation is enacted appropriating the necessary funding and placing ongoing funding in statute.

SUBJECT: Donations

The recent community meetings surrounding school closure have increased interest among parents and community stakeholders in providing funds through donations to the school district.

Donations to particular schools and particular programs are a regular part of each board agenda. These funds are collected through the district office and placed in accounts for the purpose stated by the donor. The district currently has a set of locally restricted accounts to account for the proceeds and expenses related to these funds. They are not part of the unrestricted general fund – or "operating fund" of the district. In general, donations are purposed for the improvement of student programs.

Staff has been contacted by Brant Fetter, a parent, who wishes to establish a bank account to collect donations on behalf of the district. Mr. Fetter has approached Mechanics Bank, members of the Board and fellow parents to facilitate the donations. The solicitation and purpose of the donation effort has been provided by Mr. Fetter and is attached.

In order for the donations to be tax deductible, the account must be in the name of a charitable organization or the school district. Mechanics Bank currently has four accounts open for the District to receive donations in the areas of Athletics, Libraries and Books, Music and Parcel Tax Alternative. The accounts were established in answer to community requests to provide donations for the district's potential program cuts prior to the passage of the parcel tax. These accounts have been essentially dormant since the 2005-06 school year, with some small deposits received in the interim.

The Board has two policies, based upon state law, which guide the receipt and disposition of donations in the district, board Policy 1321 and 3290 (attached). Education Code 51521 indicates that persons soliciting funds on behalf of the school district should have board approval, except if all funds are delivered to a public school.

If the Board wishes to approve the use of a district bank account for donations with the solicitation and purpose as stated, it should be noted that the donations become subject to the rules and laws governing all funds of the district. The Board may agree to the donor direction on how to distribute the funds, but retains the funds themselves as funds of the district. The accounts held in the name of the district must have authorized signatory by district employees, designated by the Board.

Board Policy 1321

... The Governing Board recognizes that student participation in fund-raising activities for the schools and nonprofit, nonpartisan charitable organizations can help develop a sense of social responsibility in students, enhance the relationship between the school and community, and contribute to the improvement of the school program.

Whether solicitations are made on behalf of the school or on behalf of a charitable organization, students shall not be barred from an event or activity because they did not participate in fund-raising. Potential donors, including parents/guardians and members of the community, should not be unduly pressured to contribute to the school system or charitable organizations. Staff is expected to emphasize the fact that donations are always voluntary...

Board Policy 3290

- ... Before accepting a gift, the Board shall consider whether the gift:
 - 1. Has a purpose consistent with the district's vision and philosophy.
 - 2. Begins a program which the Board would be unable to continue when the donated funds are exhausted.
 - 3. Entails undesirable or excessive costs.
 - 4. Implies endorsement of any business or product.

The Board shall carefully evaluate any conditions or restrictions imposed by the donor in light of district philosophy and operations. If the Board feels the district will be unable to fully satisfy the donor's conditions, the gift shall not be accepted...

Education Code 51521

...No person shall solicit any other person to contribute to any fund or to purchase any item of personal property, upon the representation that the money received is to be used wholly or in

part for the benefit of any public school or the student body of any public school, unless such person obtains the prior written approval of either the governing board of the school district in which such solicitation is to be made or the governing board of the school district having jurisdiction over the school or student body represented to be benefited by such solicitation, or the designee of either of such boards...

Neighborhood School Rescue Fund

Brant Fetter, Parent

Why?

Our communities have been surprised by a move by the state trustee to take over the West Contra Costa School District. We've approved capital improvement money for the district but not operating costs. The state is running a colossal, and can't and will not help us.

This could also be called the "overlooked bills" fund drive. The problem is that we've passed bonds and measures to improve the infrastructure, but the district has not been given enough money to pay salaries and other bills. Just one affect on the budget are that tax revenues have dropped due to decreased values of properties.

Did you know that 23% of schools in West Contra Costa County are high performing schools that have a positive effect on property values? In the current, proposal for school closures there are 5 high performing schools to be closed bring the total of high performing in West Contra Costa County down to 11%. This will negatively affect ALL property values in the county, and hurt our children.

The district and the member cities and communities are working hard to organize funds and plans to save our neighborhood schools slated for possible closure. One part of this is just good 'ole donations. The hope is that if the State Trustee sees community participation as part of these solutions, there's a higher likelihood that we'll save the schools. We can generate over a million dollars by having everyone in the district donate just a little.

What the rest of us can do!

If each resident in our district donated \$1 to \$5 per person, we can raise a large amount of funds to help save our schools and property values in the county.

How is the money collected?

I propose that the WCCUSD Board approve the setup and use of an account for this purpose. (the Account) I propose that online donations go directly to the Fund. The best place for the online donations is the WCCUSC website. Mechanics bank uses a third party credit card processor that takes a small percentage. Cash and checks are collected by families of each school going out into their own neighborhoods and visiting their local businesses. Each family gives funds to the head of the PTA, or an appointed Teacher per school, and they are given a receipt for the cash. Each representative from the PTA or appointed Teacher deposits the funds to the Account. A running status/amount of the fund is shown on the District website.

What organization holds the money?

How is the money distributed?

I propose the full amount of the fund be given to the West Contra Costa School District for operating costs. The funds would be distributed to each school according to the number of students they have as a percentage of the total number of students attending in the district.

If the board members or the Staff would like to counter with a better or more fair distribution method, the community would welcome their input.
