*CI C.6 Ratification and Approval of Engineering Services Contracts

Comment:

Contracts have been initiated by staff using previously qualified consulting, engineering, architectural, or landscape architectural firms to assist in completion of the referenced projects. Many of the firms are already under contract and the staff-initiated work may be an extension of the firm's existing contract with the District. Public contracting laws have been followed in initially qualifying and selecting these professionals.

Recommendation: Ratify and approve contracts

Fiscal Impact: Total for this action: \$1,066,100. Funding sources as noted.

*CI C.7 Ratification and Approval of Negotiated Change Orders

Comment:

Staff is seeking ratification of Change Orders on the following current District construction projects: TLC Ramps; El Cerrito HS New Campus; El Cerrito HS Admin/Theater; and TLC Fence and Gates. Change Orders are fully executed by the District upon signature by the Superintendent's designee. Board ratification is the final step required under state law in order to complete payment and contract adjustment.

In addition to normal ratification, approval of the noted Change Order for Ford Elementary Temporary Housing; DeAnza HS Demolition & Sitework; DeAnza High School Fieldhouse; and Mira Vista Elementary Lower Play Yard is required by the Board, with special findings as noted below, because these are in excess of the Public Contract Code limit of 10% of the original contract value. In accordance with Public Contract Code 20118.4, the Board, by approving and ratifying these Change Orders, finds that it would have been futile to publicly bid the work in question because of the tight time frames to complete this work without affecting the operations of the District, and that the public is best served by having this work completed by the contractor on the project.

Recommendation: Ratify negotiated Change Orders as noted

Fiscal Impact: Total ratification and approval by this action: \$201,198.18.

*CI C.8 Coronado Elementary Portables Replacement Contract Award

Comment:

The District has received funding from the state Emergency Repair Program ("ERP") to replace two seriously deteriorated modular buildings at the Coronado Elementary School site. WLC Architects is providing architectural and engineering services for the project. The District needs to purchase the two buildings. Subsequently, the District will bid out the construction, utilities, and miscellaneous work needed to complete the replacement at the site.

The action proposed by this award will be a "piggyback" contract award to the modular building vendor, Mobile Modular Management Corporation. The Franklin McKinley School District has conducted a public bid process and has referenced other school districts in the state which, under law, may then award contracts as a "piggyback" on the Franklin McKinley contract. This contract award is for the new modular buildings, modifications to interiors as required by program, transportation, and installation at the site. This award is needed at this time to allow for lead time in the preparation of the modular buildings. Installation is anticipated to be completed during summer 2009.

<u>Recommendation:</u> Award contract to Mobile Modular Management Corporation under the terms of the Franklin McKinley School District Piggyback Contract

Fiscal Impact: \$117,321. Funded from the Emergency Repair Program ("ERP").

*CI C.9 Dover Elementary New Campus Construction Project Award of Contract

Comment:

The next step in the reconstruction of Dover Elementary School is to complete the main campus construction. This work includes three phases of construction for all new classroom buildings, support

spaces, a new multi-purpose room, playgrounds, soccer field, parking and drop-off areas, and other site work and site furnishings. The work also includes demolition of existing campus buildings, including demolition and replacement of 23 portables.

HY Architects has prepared plans and specifications for the Dover project. The District conducted a public bid of the project. Bids were opened on Tuesday, April 14, 2009. Nine Contractors submitted bids. They are as follows: Overaa Construction \$25,615,000; Arntz Builders \$22,847,622; BRCO Constructors \$22,375,000; Wright Construction \$21,999,000; SJ Amoroso \$21,877,000; Lathrop Construction \$21,835,000; West Bay Builders \$21,691,000; Alten Construction \$21,491,000; and Zovich and Sons \$21,475,000.

Subsequent to the bid opening, and within the time allotted in the contract documents, a bid protest was received from the second low bidder, Alten Construction. Alten alleged several irregularities with Zovich and Sons' bid regarding missing signatures and corporate seals. In addition, Alten noted that Zovich failed to list two subcontractors needed to complete the work. Legal counsel for both firms responded and clarified the issues further—for example, one of the subcontractors was listed. District staff reviewed the issues with legal counsel. After full consideration, it is recommended that Zovich's bid be declared non-responsive for its failure to properly execute the required signature on the Non-Collusion Affidavit and for its failure to list a subcontractor for the stucco lath and plaster work. While the Board could technically waive multiple defects, it is recommended that the Board declare Zovich's bid non-responsive. As such, Alten Construction at \$21,491,000 is the lowest responsive, responsible bidder.

Recommendation: Award contract to lowest responsive, responsible bidder

Fiscal Impact: \$21,491,000. Funded from the Measure J Bond.

*CI C.10 Pinole Valley High School Windows Replacement Project Award of Contract

Comment:

The District has received funding under the state's Emergency Repair Program ("ERP") for replacement of older, deteriorated windows at the Pinole Valley High School site. This project includes removal and replacement of 17 windows identified as priority health and safety concerns on the site.

The District is currently conducting a public bid process for this project. Bids are scheduled to be opened on May 4, 2009. Staff will bring a recommendation for award to the meeting of May 6, 2009.

This item is being presented prior to the expiration of the five-day bid protest period established by the District. In consideration of this timing, and in order to expedite the project which has a very short timeline for completion, the Board's action will be to authorize staff to issue the Notice of Award effective upon the resolution of the bid protest period, to the lowest responsive, responsible bidder. This award by staff will then be brought back for ratification at a future meeting.

*CI C.13 Waiver of California High School Exit Exam (CAHSEE) for Two West Contra Costa Unified School District Special Education Students

* D.1 Recognition of Richmond High School Student Blanca Zepeda

Comment:

The Student Principal for the Day program at Richmond High School began in July 2007, when Sam Hill, School Community Worker, suggested the idea to Principal Ramos, who then gave Mr. Hill the go ahead to develop the idea. Mr. Hill in conjunction with SRO Danny Harris, developed the selection criteria for the program which is open to any student maintaining a GPA of 3.0 or higher, and who

submits a letter of recommendation and a one-page essay on why the student wants to be principal for the day. The student then attends to an interview conducted by Leadership students, Officer Harris and Mr. Hill. The final selection is completed by Officer Harris.

Ms. Blanca Zepeda has been selected as Student Principal at Richmond High School, where she will shadow Principal Julio Franco throughout the day on May 26, 2009. Ms. Zepeda arrived in the United States when she was eleven years old. She is the oldest of three children. After living in other areas of California, her family moved to Richmond where she attended Grant Elementary School, Helms Middle School, and then Richmond High School. Ms. Zepeda has always been active in social improvement. At Richmond High she is the Student Body President and a member of the marketing group for the school's garden. She was Lieutenant Governor for KIWINIS 32nd District. She assisted Youth Together in organizing a 150 student protest to Sacramento where students spoke with state representatives regarding budget cuts to education. She also tutors on Saturdays for Metas at Contra Costa College. Ms. Zepeda was recently awarded a \$10,000 scholarship as a Coca-Cola Scholar, one of 252 chosen out of 75,000 applicants, and had the opportunity to receive her award in Atlanta.

Ms. Zepeda's summer sessions at both Brown and Princeton best illustrate her initiative. She used Google's search features to find scholarship opportunities for summer sessions out of state. With the help of one of her teachers, she applied to both programs and was accepted. Instead of focusing on just one experience last summer, she managed to attend both, leaving one program a few days early so that she could begin the second summer program.

These teachers of excellence share a profound passion for instilling a love of learning in our diverse students so that they can attain their goals and realize their dreams. Janelle Salvador is a student at Hercules Middle High School who works in a Special Education classroom on campus to support students in achieving their goals.

D.3 Recognizing WCCUSD Teachers of the Year Don Wilson and David Flores

Comment:

In 1972, California began recognizing outstanding teachers, establishing the Teachers of the Year Program. This program is open to all teachers in public and private schools who teach pre-kindergarten through twelfth grade. Contra Costa County has participated in the program since its beginning.

Mr. Donald Wilson and Mr. David Flores have been selected as WCCUSD's 2009-2010 Teachers of the Year. Both teachers have been submitted for the county-level competition.

Mr. Wilson, who came to Pinole Valley High School in 1993, is an educator who has repeatedly proven to be a teacher of the highest caliber and an outstanding representative of the teaching profession. He is widely recognized by peers, parents, and especially students, as a teacher who consistently ensures that all students in his care achieve at the highest level and are fully prepared to be successful in college and later life. The administration and staff at Pinole Valley High School look up to Mr. Wilson as a model teacher who actively engages students in learning through dynamic lessons. His enthusiasm for teaching makes learning engaging and exciting for his students, who are eager to praise his classes. He is fully student centered in his work and sets high expectations that students consistently rise to. In addition, he frequently serves as a mentor to newer teachers and guides them in developing successful teaching skills that assist them in engaging students with the same enthusiasm he does.

Mr. Wilson has also been Coordinator of the School to Career program at Pinole Valley High School for many years. In this area he has developed an exemplary program that has involved hundreds of students in experiences that prepare them for both college and the work force. He collaborates with local businesses to create job shadowing experiences and internships for students. The impact this has on the college work and career choices of students is immeasurable.

Mr. Donald Wilson has been selected as one of five finalists in the Contra Costa County Teacher of the Year Program. If selected as County Finalist, Mr. Wilson will go on to be considered for California State Teacher of the Year.

Mr. David Flores is a sixth grade teacher at Grant Elementary School who serves a student population that consists of over 75% English Learners in an area highly impacted by poverty and the many stresses found in the inner city. Mr. Flores consistently provides his students with a strong and diverse education that focuses on moving all students to proficiency in both academics and English language development. He is respected by students, teachers and parents and is an outstanding choice to represent Contra Costa County in the California Teacher of the Year program.

Mr. Flores is a model teacher who actively engages students in learning through dynamic lessons. He is known for bringing in a variety of outside resources to supplement his teaching. Visitors this year have included the Mayor of Richmond who talked about how city government operates. Mr. Flores is highly skilled at differentiating instruction so that the needs of every student are fully addressed, while high levels of academic rigor are maintained. In addition, Mr. Flores is skilled in building strong links between the classroom and home and provides multiple means for parents to be involved in their children's education.

Congratulations to Mr. Wilson and Mr. Flores on attaining this recognition and their commitment to excellence in education.

* F.3 Resolution No. 79-0809: Declaration to Hire 30-Day Substitutes on CBEST Waivers

Comment:

There is a statewide shortage of qualified substitutes. The requirement that each 30-day substitute CBEST waiver request be approved by the Board of Education before the waiver request is submitted has been relaxed by the Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CCTC). Instead, they will require a governing board to declare that the district has hired teachers from the substitute pool to implement the Class Size Reduction Program and is now experiencing difficulty in recruiting individuals who qualify for the 30-day Substitute Teaching Permit. This declaration need be approved only once for all CBEST waivers requested in 2009-2010. This item may not appear on the consent calendar for the governing board meeting. Our district will continue to recruit and search for fully credentialed teachers while using this assignment option.

G. **DISCUSSION ITEMS**

* G.1 Initiation of District Mentoring Program

Comment:

This proposal is intended to help with reducing the drop out rate at WCCUSD and for helping the district retain more of its students. With drop out rates estimated to be as high as 40% in some years, we know that additional efforts are needed to help all WCCUSD students remain in school and get the preparation they need to have a bright future. School Districts throughout California and the United States struggle with drop out issues and WCCUSD would benefit from working closely with other districts throughout the region and the state. It has been widely reported that students who drop out of high school are more likely to have negative outcomes such as difficulty being engaged in the workforce, or increased likelihood of being impacted by crime and violence. It is the intent of this proposal to help all WCCUSD students remain in school and get preparation for bright futures in post secondary education, vocational training, or other opportunities that will help those students develop marketable skills.

At the heart of this proposal is the premise that the best way to prevent students from dropping out is to insure that every student is accounted for at all times. Put another way, students in WCCUSD would be known by name by WCCUSD staff, volunteers, family members, and partners, and each student would

have a success plan for achieving a bright future. This proposal sets out to develop a way to meet such outcomes.

This proposal seeks to chart a course where every student at the high school level will be known by name and to have a documented success plan. The proposal calls on WCCUSD staff and partners to develop a success plan for each high school age student in the district and to help connect those students to resources and experiences that will help students achieve their future success. This proposal also emphasizes the importance of strong tracking systems that allow WCCUSD staff and partners to keep track of the whereabouts of students and other activities to support overall retention. (Student success goals could be coming to school daily, improving grades, attending college seminars, working in an internship, etc.)

The following examples highlight how the program might work.

The Principal and school staff establish a database for tracking the whereabouts of each student for the duration of that student's tenure at the school. If the student stops coming to school or transfers, information related to that students whereabouts would be updated in the database.

The Principal and school staff convene a meeting with local volunteers who would be interested in working with students. These could be volunteers from local businesses, local government agencies, non profit agencies and others who are willing to help students develop bright futures.

The Principal and school staff convene a meeting with each student in which the student develops a yearly goals plan that relates to some future goal that student has for his/her future. The student and staff highlight who will do what to reach the goals (responsible parties) in those plans and how the student will get help towards his or her future goals.

For all intents and purposes, this approach could be piloted in one high school, then expand to other high schools and then middle schools as the details of implementation get worked out. Potential partners could include the local chamber of commerce, local government agencies, parent groups, and local non profits.

A steering committee of interested parties should be developed to guide and support the work of the effort and to insure that there is accountability in implementation. This group could also start out by examining relevant trends in truancy and drop out issues and establish annual benchmarks for retention or reducing drop out rates. By adopting this concept proposal the WCCUSD Board of Directors directs staff to develop additional plans for moving such a concept forward for implementation.

<u>Recommendation:</u> That the Board discuss the proposal and determine the next step(s) in supporting the retention of high school students in school.

D. AWARDS, RECOGNITIONS, AND REPORTS

D.1 Recognition of Middle College High School as a 2009 California Distinguished School

Mr. Greer thanked and congratulated Cari Tam and the 307 students and 17 certificated and classified employees at Middle College, which he said was the only secondary site in our district and one of five in the county that received the California Distinguished School Award. He thanked Contra Costa College for their support and contribution.

Board Comment:

Mr. Ramsey said he was proud and excited that the school is being recognized. He acknowledged Principal Hattie Smith for her excellent work.

Mr. Medrano commended the students and praised their self motivation and quality of their work.

Ms. Kronenberg spoke about her recent visit to Middle College saying it is a spectacular operation with very high level curriculum. She wished congratulations to all.

Mr. Thurmond said the Board is very proud of all the students, staff and families. He said that Middle College is one of the District's greatest assets.

President Miles expressed congratulations to Middle College and noted that some of her former students have graduated from the school.

D.2 Grand Jury Report No. 0907

Ms. Gamba introduced this item saying that in 2008-09 the Contra Costa County Grand Jury conducted an inquiry regarding health care benefits with different types of districts throughout Contra Costa County. She said that the findings made it clear that governmental agencies, including West Contra Costa USD, do not and will not have the financial ability to sustain the plans that are currently in place. She said that the Government Code requires a response which is due June 1, 2009. Ms. Gamba said she is preparing a response for Board approval at the May 20 Board meeting.

Board Comment:

Mr. Medrano spoke about his service on the Contra Costa County Grand Jury six years ago when they faced the same issue all over the state and said the time has come to address the problem.

Ms. Kronenberg said the issue has grown to such an enormous size and this report underscores how this is a statewide issue that every governing board must address.

Mr. Thurmond inquired about the actuarial estimates and how the actual costs are determined.

Ms. Gamba responded and explained that the Governmental Accounting Standards Board adopted a standard for all governmental agencies which requires the District to put this liability before the public.

Mr. Thurmond inquired about the number of years of service required for eligibility for retiree benefits and how the benefits work with other programs like Medicare.

Superintendent Harter responded that the District is part of CalPERS and pays the costs of health benefits for retired employees plus their dependents up to age 65 when Medicare begins and the District pays a supplement. He continued that employees hired before January 1, 2007 require five years of service and those employed subsequently require 10 years of service for eligibility.

D.3 Budget Report Updates

Superintendent Harter provided an introduction to the budget report and said the situation is tenuous and complex and includes many significant unknowns about the budgeting process and our financial situation. He provided a brief overview of estimates. He stressed that California is underfunding schools.

Ms. Gamba provided a brief budget update and indicated she will do so at each Board meeting as the information is updated. She announced a budget town hall meeting at DeJean Middle School, Saturday April 25. She spoke about the May 19 ballot initiatives which, if they fail, would leave the budget subject to major revisions in June. She said support for ballot initiatives is not strong at this time, and the legislative analyst office predicts even lower revenues.

Public Comment: Mike Wasilchin said that Local One members have taken less money in salary each year to maintain retiree health benefits that were negotiated with the District. He asked to be copied on the response to the Grand Jury report.

Board Comment: None

D.4 Standing Reports

Committee Reports:

Mr. Ramsey reported on the Facilities Subcommittee, and said the district will receive funding for El Cerrito High School earlier than anticipated. He added that the Bond program is healthy and thriving and that the Dover project came in lower than projected, potentially providing revenue to add a substantial amount of work.

Mr. Ramsey reported on the Ivy League Connection and provided an update on activities with Yale University and recognition from the City of Hercules.

Richard Leung reported on Local One and commented on classified salaries in comparison to other districts and taking cuts in wages in exchange for benefits. He spoke about substitutes who are ineligible for benefits and being fair and equitable when it comes to management.

Charles Cowens reported on the Community Budget Advisory Committee. He said the next meeting is April 23 and that the discussion will include the presentation style for the actual budget, expenditures at the site level and improving student tracking systems vs. random sampling.

Mr. Thurmond reported on the District Safety Committee. He said a benchmark will be set to create a plan for reducing safety incidents on a year to year basis and to provide annual reporting to set goals for reducing safety and violence incidents throughout the District. He also spoke about plans to provide more support for students experiencing mental health challenges or who might be around violent situations as a way of preventing safety

incidents from occurring. He said at the next meeting on May 13 the focus will be around helping students find summer jobs.

Mr. Medrano provided a summary of the Facilities Subcommittee Meeting that occurred on April 8 which included discussion about project schedule, concerns of equity throughout the District, security fencing, the emergency repair program, traffic concerns in El Cerrito and anti-graffiti coating.

Superintendent Harter recognized community members who recently passed away.

Mr. Medrano spoke in remembrance of Don Lewis and his concern for social justice.

President Miles spoke about Don Lewis and Bill Young and thanked the families of all the lost loved ones.

Ms. Kronenberg spoke of Don Lewis and his service to the community.

Ms. Romeo said this item was not acknowledged in the agenda readjustment so there should be a motion and second to pull the item.

MOTION: Mr. Ramsey moved to pull Item E.2 from the agenda. Mr. Medrano seconded. Ms. Kronenberg, Mr. Medrano, Mr. Ramsey, Mr. Thurmond, Student Representative Tam (Advisory Vote Only) and President Miles voted yes, with no abstentions and no absences. Motion carried 5-0-0-0.

E.3 Request to Address the Board on the Gooden Family Scholarship Fund Scholar Project Recipients

Ruth Kleinman of the Gooden Family Scholarship Fund described the Fund's mission to assist low income high school students in the WCCUSD who demonstrated academic success to be accepted into four year colleges. She described how the scholar program works. Five of the seven students who successfully completed the program introduced themselves, announcing the colleges they were accepted to and financial aid they received.

Board Comment:

Mr. Thurmond congratulated all the students on their accomplishments. He thanked Ms. Kleinman and Mr. Gooden for their support of district students.

Mr. Ramsey congratulated the students and recognized one student who is also part of the Ivy League Connection program. He thanked Mr. Gooden for his work.

Mr. Medrano congratulated the students and Mr. Gooden, saying he is very proud of the students and their successes.

C.11 Approval of Sabbatical Leave Requests for 2009-2010

Public Comment: Jill Wolkenfeld

At the request of President Miles, Ms. Romeo explained that contract provisions provide for up to ten sabbaticals per year and require the teacher to submit a proposal for either one half or a full year. During the sabbatical a teacher is entitled to one half their salary plus paid benefits.

MOTION: Mr. Ramsey moved approval of Item C.11. Mr. Thurmond seconded. Ms. Kronenberg, Mr. Medrano, Mr. Ramsey, Mr. Thurmond, Student Representative Tam (Advisory Vote Only) and President Miles voted yes, with no abstentions and no absences. Motion carried 5-0-0-0.

C.16 Pinole Middle School Building A Demolition Project Award of Contract

Public Comment:

Brent Bates of Asbestos Management Group of California, Inc. said he was the lowest bidder on this project, but his bid was rejected as non-responsive for failure to sign the bid form. He asked that the Board to allow him to correct the form and accept his bid, rather than staff's recommendation. He cited California case law that supported the Board's discretion to accept his bid, even though it was not signed.

Mr. Fay commented that the bid protest time period passed.

Mr. Bates responded he only learned this morning that staff declared his bid non-responsive.

President Miles asked Ms. Romeo what options the Board has regarding this item. Ms. Romero said the Board could make a motion to approve or disapprove, or someone could make a motion with a second and a vote to put it on a future agenda.

Mr. Ramsey spoke in favor of staff's recommendation and said it was not wise to wait on a coordinated project. He said this had been a fair and open process and spoke against setting a precedent of making exceptions.

Mr. Savidge provided clarification and said staff's recommendation is consistent with past practice. He cautioned against waiving the defect.

Mr. Thurmond requested discussion on the motion. He asked for clarity on what the lack of signature truly means and whether the bid could be valid if signed at a later time?

Deidre Sakai, the District's Legal Counsel, responded 'no' and offered clarification.

Mr. Thurmond inquired further about the significance of the unsigned bid. Ms. Sakai responded and expressed concern about waiving a defect and the effect that would have on future bidding processes.

Mr. Thurmond inquired about the case law raised by Mr. Bates. Ms. Sakai spoke of another case which indicated that no one case could force a Board to make a waiver.

Ms. Kronenberg inquired about the consequences of re-bidding and the timeframes involved.

Mr. Savidge responded there would be an approximate delay time of one month and stressed the fact this project was sequenced with other projects.

Mr. Thurmond inquired about the quality of work promised and how that ranked to other bids. He also inquired about the involvement of local firms in this work.

Mr. Savidge said the bid documents did not address the quality of work. He said the District's local hiring consultant indicated all bidders completed a good faith hiring effort in the local hiring process.

MOTION: Mr. Medrano moved to approve Item C.16 Pinole Middle School Building A Demolition Project Award of Contract (Demo Masters). Mr. Ramsey seconded. A roll call vote was taken. Ms. Kronenberg, Mr. Medrano, Mr. Ramsey, Student Representative Tam (Advisory Vote Only) and President Miles voted yes, Mr. Thurmond voted no, with no abstentions and no absences. Motion carried 4-1-0-0.

C.23 Resolution No. 84-0809: In Support of May 19 Ballot Measures

Mr. Medrano spoke in favor of all items referring to support by Richmond Vision and other community organizations and moving approval.

Mr. Ramsey seconded.

Mr. Thurmond spoke of making a motion to vote on measures individually and said he opposes 1D and 1E. He asked for more discussion about what each item means prior to endorsing them.

Mr. Ramsey said he agrees with Mr. Medrano, that this is a process and not about piecemeal. He said the Board has to work as a collective voice with constituent groups to make an impact.

Ms. Romeo said there is a motion on the table to accept the resolution before going to another motion.

MOTION: Mr. Medrano moved to approve Item C.23. Mr. Ramsey seconded. A roll call vote was taken. Ms. Kronenberg, Mr. Medrano, Mr. Ramsey and President Miles voted yes, Mr. Thurmond voted yes on 1A, 1B, 1C and 1F and abstained on 1D and 1E (no vote), Student Representative Tam (Advisory Vote Only) abstained and no absences. Motion carried 4-1-0-0.

F.1 Resolution No. 78-0809: Authorization to Eliminate Classified Positions and Layoff Classified Employees

Ms. Romeo asked the Board to adopt this resolution to eliminate classified positions due to lack of funding and/or lack of
work. She explained that the layoffs were in primarily four categories related to: school closures the Board previously
took action on; categorically funded positions which ties into Tiered III flexibility; some general fund reductions; and
collapsing of classes related to special education.

Public Comment: Charles Rachlis, Rick Alexander, Margaret Browne, Marcus Mitchell, Joan Strasser, Robert Studdiford, Michael Wasilchin, Jill Wolkenfeld, Richard Leung

Board Comment:

Mr. Thurmond said he continues to support cuts straight across the board.

Ms. Kronenberg said she would support a motion to eliminate the positions listed except for the four community outreach positions.

Ms. Romeo advised that the Board could approve the motion as stated by Ms. Kronenberg.

MOTION: Ms. Kronenberg moved approval of Item F.1 absent the four School Community Outreach positions. Mr. Medrano seconded. A roll call vote was taken. Ms. Kronenberg, Mr. Medrano, Student Representative Tam (advisory vote only) and President Miles voted yes, Mr. Ramsey and Mr. Thurmond voted no, with no abstentions and no absences. Motion carried 3-2-0-0.

F.2 K-3 Class Size Reduction Program (CSR)

Ms. Gamba said that this item is being brought back before the Board with an additional option for consideration. She said staff is recommending a savings of \$4 million.

Dover Elementary New Campus Construction Project Award of Contract

Background Information:

Subject:

The next step in the reconstruction of Dover Elementary School is to complete the main campus construction. This work includes three phases of construction for all new classroom buildings, support spaces, a new multi-purpose room, playgrounds, soccer field, parking and drop-off areas, and other site work and site furnishings. The work also includes demolition of existing campus buildings, including demolition and replacement of 23 portables.

HY Architects has prepared plans and specifications for the Dover project. The District conducted a public bid of the project. Bids were opened on Tuesday, April 14, 2009. Nine Contractors submitted bids. They are as follows: Overaa Construction \$25,615,000; Arntz Builders \$22,847,622; BRCO Constructors \$22,375,000; Wright Construction \$21,999,000; SJ Amoroso \$21,877,000; Lathrop Construction \$21,835,000; West Bay Builders \$21,691,000; Alten Construction \$21,491,000; and Zovich and Sons \$21,475,000.

Subsequent to the bid opening, and within the time allotted in the contract documents, a bid protest was received from the second low bidder, Alten Construction. Alten alleged several irregularities with Zovich and Sons' bid regarding missing signatures and corporate seals. In addition, Alten noted that Zovich failed to list two subcontractors needed to complete the work. Legal counsel for both firms responded and clarified the issues further—for example, one of the subcontractors was listed. District staff reviewed the issues with legal counsel. After full consideration, it is recommended that Zovich's bid be declared non-responsive for its failure to properly execute the required signature on the Non-Collusion Affidavit and for its failure to list a subcontractor for the stucco lath and plaster work. While the Board could technically waive multiple defects, it is recommended that the Board declare Zovich's bid non-responsive. As such, Alten Construction at \$21,491,000 is the lowest responsive, responsible bidder.

Recommendation: Award contract to lowest responsive, responsible bidder

The Student Principal for the Day program at Richmond High School began in July 2007, when Sam Hill, School Community Worker, suggested the idea to Principal Ramos, who then gave Mr. Hill the go ahead to develop the idea. Mr. Hill in conjunction with SRO Danny Harris, developed the selection criteria for the program which is open to any student maintaining a GPA of 3.0 or higher, and who submits a letter of recommendation and a one-page essay on why the student wants to be principal for the day. The student then attends to an interview conducted by Leadership students, Officer Harris and Mr. Hill. The final selection is completed by Officer Harris.

Ms. Blanca Zepeda has been selected as Student Principal at Richmond High School, where she will shadow Principal Julio Franco throughout the day on May 26, 2009. Ms. Zepeda arrived in the United States when she was eleven years old. She is the oldest of three children. After living in other areas of California, her family moved to Richmond where she attended Grant Elementary School, Helms Middle School, and then Richmond High School. Ms. Zepeda has always been active in social improvement. At Richmond High she is the Student Body President and a member of the marketing group for the school's garden. She was Lieutenant Governor for KIWINIS 32nd District. She assisted Youth Together in organizing a 150 student protest to Sacramento where students spoke with state representatives regarding budget cuts to education. She also tutors on Saturdays for Metas at Contra Costa College. Ms. Zepeda was recently awarded a \$10,000 scholarship as a Coca-Cola Scholar, one of 252 chosen out of 75,000 applicants, and had the opportunity to receive her award in Atlanta.

Ms. Zepeda's summer sessions at both Brown and Princeton best illustrate her initiative. She used Google's search features to find scholarship opportunities for summer sessions out of state. With the help of one of her teachers, she applied to both programs and was accepted. Instead of focusing on just one experience last summer, she managed to attend both, leaving one program a few days early so that she could begin the second summer program.

Student Retention

Background Information:

This proposal is intended to help with reducing the drop out rate at WCCUSD and for helping the district retain more of its students. With drop out rates estimated to be as high as 40% in some years, we know that additional efforts are needed to help all WCCUSD students remain in school and get the preparation they need to have a bright future. School Districts throughout California and the United States struggle with drop out issues and WCCUSD would benefit from working closely with other districts throughout the region and the state. It has been widely reported that students who drop out of high school are more likely to have negative outcomes such as difficulty being engaged in the workforce, or increased likelihood of being impacted by crime and violence. It is the intent of this proposal to help all WCCUSD students remain in school and get preparation for bright futures in post secondary education, vocational training, or other opportunities that will help those students develop marketable skills.

At the heart of this proposal is the premise that the best way to prevent students from dropping out is to insure that every student is accounted for at all times. Put another way, students in WCCUSD would be known by name by WCCUSD staff, volunteers, family members, and partners, and each student would have a success plan for achieving a bright future. This proposal sets out to develop a way to meet such outcomes.

This proposal seeks to chart a course where every student at the high school level will be known by name and to have a documented success plan. The proposal calls on WCCUSD staff and partners to develop a success plan for each high school age student in the district and to help connect those students to resources and experiences that will help students achieve their future success. This proposal also emphasizes the importance of strong tracking systems that allow WCCUSD staff and partners to keep track of the whereabouts of students and other activities to support overall retention. (Student success goals could be coming to school daily, improving grades, attending college seminars, working in an internship, etc.)

The following examples highlight how the program might work.

The Principal and school staff establish a database for tracking the whereabouts of each student for the duration of that student's tenure at the school. If the student stops coming to school or transfers, information related to that students whereabouts would be updated in the database.

The Principal and school staff convene a meeting with local volunteers who would be interested in working with students. These could be volunteers from local businesses, local government agencies, non profit agencies and others who are willing to help students develop bright futures.

The Principal and school staff convene a meeting with each student in which the student develops a yearly goals plan that relates to some future goal that student has for his/her future. The student and staff highlight who will do what to reach the goals (responsible parties) in those plans and how the student will get help towards his or her future goals.

For all intents and purposes, this approach could be piloted in one high school, then expand to other high schools and then middle schools as the details of implementation get worked out. Potential partners could include the local chamber of commerce, local government agencies, parent groups, and local non profits.

A steering committee of interested parties should be developed to guide and support the work of the effort and to insure that there is accountability in implementation. This group could also start out by examining relevant trends in truancy and drop out issues and establish annual benchmarks for retention or reducing drop out rates. By adopting this concept proposal the WCCUSD Board of Directors directs staff to develop additional plans for moving such a concept forward for implementation.
