### Comment:

Contracts have been initiated by staff using previously qualified consulting, engineering, architectural, or landscape architectural firms to assist in completion of the referenced projects. Many of the firms are already under contract and the staff-initiated work may be an extension of the firm's existing contract with the District. Public contracting laws have been followed in initially qualifying and selecting these professionals.

### \*CI C.10 Ratification and Approval of Negotiated Change Orders

### Comment:

Staff is seeking ratification of Change Orders on the following current District construction project: Dover Elementary School Ph. 1 Sitework. Change Orders are fully executed by the District upon signature by the Superintendent's designee. Board ratification is the final step required under state law in order to complete payment and contract adjustment.

In addition to normal ratification, approval of the noted Change Order for the Pinole Middle School New Gym Classroom Building project is required by the Board, with special findings as noted below, because it is in excess of the Public Contract Code limit of 10% of the original contract value. In

accordance with Public Contract Code 20118.4, the Board, by approving and ratifying these Change Orders, finds that it would have been futile to publicly bid the work in question because of the tight time frames to complete this work without affecting the operations of the District, and that the public is best served by having this work completed by the contractor on the project.

Fiscal Impact: Total ratification and approval by this action: \$40,877.17.

### \*CI C.11 Coronado Elementary Portables Replacement Utility Installation Contract Award

### Comment:

The District has received funding from the state Emergency Repair Program ("ERP") to replace two seriously deteriorated modular buildings at the Coronado Elementary School site. WLC Architects is providing architectural and engineering services for the project. The Board authorized purchase of the two buildings at the meeting of May 6, 2009. This project includes the construction, utilities, and miscellaneous work needed to complete the replacement at the site.

The District conducted a public bid process for this project. Seven Contractors submitted bids. They are as follows: Bruce Carone Paving \$132,752; Rodan \$117,000; Bay Cities Paving \$105,000; A&E Emmar \$87,000; ERA Construction \$85,000; Cal Bay \$84,442; and WR Forde \$81,200. The lowest responsive, responsible bidder is WR Forde at \$81,200.

Recommendation: Award contract to the lowest responsive, responsible bidder

# \*CI C.12 Resolution 90-0809, Governing Board of the WCCUSD to Become Subject to Uniform Public Construction Cost Accounting Act (UPCCAA or the "Act")

### Comment:

The acceptance of this resolution would benefit the District in ways already reported to the State Controller's Office by other districts and local public agencies. Benefits include: raised forced account limit, access to informal bidding procedures, greater leeway in execution of projects, streamlined awards process, improved timeliness of project completion and simplified administration. This is anticipated to further the Board of Education's policy regarding local outreach by creating additional opportunities for the local small businesses and contracting community.

The District would be required to follow established procedures and accounting guidelines set forth by the UPCCAA, which is summarized in the resolution.

### F.2 Mentoring Program Support

### Comment:

### A Proposal to Develop and Implement a Mentoring Program for WCCUSD Youth

The proposal outlines the formation of a formal mentoring program to support specific students at WCCUSD. In this program, WCCUSD would partner with local government agencies, businesses, parent groups, and community based organizations to connect WCCUSD students to caring adult mentors.

The City of Richmond is considering the development of a program that would encourage city employees to volunteer to serve as mentors to WCCUSD youth. In such a program WCCUSD would help with screening mentor applicants and connecting them to WCCUSD youth in need of a mentor. This collaboration if pursued could serve as a model for how employees of other government agencies could also encourage their employees to serve as mentors. In light of the fact that there are at least six government agencies serving in West Contra Costa County alone (County of Contra Costa and the Cities of Richmond, San Pablo, El Cerrito, Hercules, and Pinole), a school district/government agency collaboration to recruit and match mentors could yield high results.

By approving this proposal the WCCUSD agrees to work with the City of Richmond to develop a program that allows city employees to mentor WCCUSD youth and to partner with other entities that could provide adult mentors. By approving this proposal, WCCUSD also formally authorizes WCCUSD to serve as a co-applicant in funding applications being submitted by Be A Mentor Inc, to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to support mentoring efforts. Be a Mentor, Inc is a community based organization that develops and implements programs to help recruit, screen, and match mentors and mentees. Be A Mentor intends to submit an application to the Department of Health

Human Services to support youth of incarcerated family members, foster youth, and other youth who would benefit from mentoring. Be A Mentor, Inc is already engaged in a similar partnership with the County of Alameda. If funded, these grants would pay for many of the costs associated with recruiting, screening, training, matching, and supporting mentors and mentees.

The WCCUSD recognizes that having a connection to a caring adult is one of the key ways to help insure that all youth can have a bright future. As such the WCCUSD Board of Directors authorizes and directs its staff to work with the City of Richmond, Be A Mentor Inc, and other government agencies, businesses, parent groups, and community based organizations to develop and implement a formal mentoring program to benefit WCCUSD youth.

<u>Recommendation:</u> That the Board authorizes and directs its staff to work with the City of Richmond, Be A Mentor Inc, and other government agencies, businesses, parent groups, and community based organizations to develop and implement a formal mentoring program to benefit WCCUSD youth.

### Comment:

With the deepening recession and the state budget crisis, school districts are facing staffing and program reductions that will have a devastating impact on the quality of education in California. Because of its structural deficit, debt going back to the early 1990's and health benefit contributions, WCCUSD faces an even worse situation from nearly all other districts. The only local option that districts have to raise funds is a parcel tax. In November 2008, voters renewed the 2004 parcel tax with more than 79% of voters in support. While that measure provides nearly \$10 million revenue the District may be facing a budget deficit for 2009-10 of at least three times that amount and perhaps more.

<u>Recommendation:</u> That the Board discuss the feasibility and possible timing of a parcel tax for WCCUSD.

### C.6 Ratification and Approval of Engineering Services Contracts

### **Public Comment:**

Sharon Farrell asked the Board to reconsider the Portola relocation at El Cerrito High School and consider the temporary lower pad on the existing campus.

### **Board Comment:**

Mr. Ramsey spoke in support of bifurcation of this item for separate votes, as well as the cost of relocating Portola students, further cost information received after the initial decision, and shared campuses. Mr. Bill Fay responded about a truncated process that was followed by objections from the City of El Cerrito. Mr. Ramsey asked further questions about the contract process. Mr. Fay responded that the District did not go through an RFP process. Mr. Ramsey clarified the mechanics of the agreement and asked for further explanation of the expense, timeline, and educational impact. Superintendent Harter responded that the direction from the Board was to move expeditiously to relocate students with the earliest time to take up residency in the temporary facility during winter break. Mr. Ramsey addressed questions about impact of any lawsuit with the City. Mr. Fay spoke about timelines not committing to expectations for a Fall relocation, as well as potential legal challenges.

Ms. Miles asked what the District is currently doing to work with the City of El Cerrito. Mr. Fay responded that discussions continue to take place all along the process.

Mr. Thurmond spoke about the change in the scope of work due to changes in circumstances and that he agrees that aggressive strategies are necessary to work with the City and families in the community to create investment in the decisions. He asked that staff restate the circumstances that changed the scope of the project to requiring a full EIR and an update of the timeline of proposed project.

Mr. Savidge spoke about initial meetings with staff from the City of El Cerrito where they expressed a range of concerns regarding traffic, student safety, neighborhood impacts, and support of a full EIR and expanded traffic study. He spoke about a formal request from the City summarizing the requests which was used for the basis of expanding the scope of services with contractor PMC in order to work cooperatively with the City. The decision was approved by the Facilities Subcommittee to bring this item back to the Board as a full Environmental Impact Report.

Ms. Miles asked questions about the environmental impact study and whether it considers the value of educational programs. Mr. Savidge responded.

Ms. Kronenberg spoke about the initial approval to move students to expedite the project and the possibility to revisit the decision.

Ms. Miles commented about the value of the education and services available for students as well as additional costs.

Mr. Medrano said he is still concerned with the safety of students while other schools have dealt with similar situations of a shared campus.

Mr. Ramsey recalled similar temporary situations at other campuses.

Mr. Thurmond asked Mr. Savidge about an environmental impact report's overriding consideration and any options available. Mr. Savidge spoke about mitigation of an EIR and a possible legal challenge.

MOTION: Mr. Thurmond moved to separate the two items in this recommendation for individual votes. Mr. Ramsey seconded. Ms. Kronenberg, Mr. Medrano, Mr. Ramsey, Mr. Thurmond, Student Representative Payton (advisory vote only) and Ms. Miles voted yes, with no abstentions and no absences. Motion carried 5-0-0-0.

MOTION: Mr. Ramsey moved approval of the Ohlone Elementary School Reconstruction project with the firm Powell and Partners. Mr. Thurmond second. Ms. Kronenberg, Mr. Medrano, Mr. Ramsey, Mr. Thurmond, Student Representative Payton (advisory vote only) and Ms. Miles voted yes, with no abstentions and no absences. Motion carried 5-0-0-0.

Mr. Thurmond asked for discussion to consider Board direction to seek an aggressive outreach effort to the City of El Cerrito along with an aggressive investment strategy to work with families and other stakeholders.

Superintendent Harter expressed concern at being asked to try to influence city councils. Mr. Thurmond spoke of this as a listening exercise to hear constituent concerns in order to develop solutions. Superintendent Harter further expressed concern for staff to implement this direction. Mr. Thurmond and Mr. Medrano said they would be willing to participate.

MOTION: Mr. Medrano moved to deny the contract with PMC for the Portola relocation project with an added provision that staff engage in constructive conversation with local cities. Mr. Ramsey seconded. A roll call vote was taken with Ms. Kronenberg, Mr. Medrano, Mr. Ramsey, Mr. Thurmond, and President Miles voting yes, Student Representative Payton abstaining (advisory vote only) and no absences. Motion carried 5-0-0-0 to deny the PMC contract.

Mr. Medrano said he always makes it a point to stop and speak to office managers and secretaries at schools. He concluded by asking that a copy of the resolution be given to school sites for further recognition.

Mr. Ramsey echoed the appreciation and acknowledged the strong support of Local One employees at the various schools.

Mr. Thurmond acknowledged classified employees, and spoke about afterschool program work and relationships with custodians and secretaries.

Ms. Miles thanked classified employees as well as union representatives Mike Wasilchin and Marcus Mitchell.

Ms. Kronenberg, Mr. Medrano, Mr. Ramsey, Mr. Thurmond, Student Representative Payton (advisory vote only) and Ms. Miles voted yes, with no abstentions and no absences. Motion carried 5-0-0-0.

### F.3 Resolution No. 87-0809: Declaration to Hire 30-Day Substitutes on CBEST Waivers

Ms. Romeo spoke about the state wide shortage of substitute teachers and that this waiver would allow the District to bring in substitute teachers that have a BA degree and one year to pass the CBEST Test. This waiver is required to be on file for the 2009-2010 school year.

Public Comment: None

### **Board Comment:**

Ms. Kronenberg spoke about the difficulty of teacher lay offs and needing substitute teachers. Ms. Romeo responded.

MOTION: Mr. Ramsey moved approval of Resolution 87-0809: Declaration to Hire 30-Day Substitutes on CBEST Waivers. Mr. Medrano seconded. Ms. Kronenberg, Mr. Medrano, Mr. Ramsey, Mr. Thurmond, Student Representative Payton (advisory vote only) and Ms. Miles voted yes, with no abstentions and no absences. Motion carried 5-0-0-0.

### G. DISCUSSION ITEMS

### **G.1** Student Retention

Mr. Thurmond spoke about partnering with other entities to bring appropriate volunteers to work with students for a success plan for attendance and graduation progress. This proposal is intended to be a template for developing a priority to help students stay in school.

Mr. Ramsey said he is a product of mentoring because of his father's success after dropping out of high school and serving in the military, and how mentoring has the potential of changing the lives of students.

Mr. Medrano said he is enthusiastic to pursue this program because a mentor urged him as a young student to master English as a second language.

Ms. Kronenberg said she is supportive of this project and interested in the details. She spoke of projects at El Cerrito High School, with Brown University alumni, and ways to develop a program. She cautioned about finding people

who will be committed and not lose interest as it leads to disappointment for the mentees. She suggested a steering committee, funding sources, ways of articulating with middle school through high school, protocols for choosing families, as well as looking at other school districts.

Ms. Miles agreed that this is an excellent start and that there are existing programs within the District that deal with the whole family and other community organizations are willing to partner with the District. She said with the state budget crisis, it is not clear what funding will be available, but would suggest looking at available services to establish partnerships.

Mr. Thurmond thanked Board members for brainstorming this idea to help students remain in school. He would like to bring this item back as an action item to provide direction. He would like to see an outcome or goal established in an effort to reduce the drop out rate by a determined percentage and bring together partners and existing entities.

Mr. Greer spoke about partners currently in place within the community and plans to look forward to developing a more comprehensive plan with multiple pathways.

### G.2 Status Reports – Facilities Planning and Construction

Mr. Savidge provided a presentation on the status of the Bond Facilities program.

### **Board Comment:**

Mr. Ramsey spoke about the expected approval by the State Board of Education regarding the District's debt limit waiver. He said he would like to learn more from staff about the predicted delay in the bidding of the DeAnza construction site. Mr. Savidge responded with clarification. Mr. Ramsey urged the Board to give direction to move projects forward. He also asked questions about Nystrom and the joint use project with the City of Richmond for the multipurpose building.

Mr. Medrano asked questions about how the Leadership Public Schools - Nystrom joint campus use is working out. Mr. Savidge responded that the situation appears to be working out very well.

Mr. Ramsey asked questions about the potential demolition of the Gompers site, saying he would like items agendized to allow the Board to take action. Mr. Savidge responded that presentations are anticipated for a future meeting.

Ms. Miles asked for clarification of a comment about the freezing of bonds by California. Ms. Gamba clarified that the threat is at the state level, not with local bond issuances.

Ms. Kronenberg spoke about moving the timeline along and her support to bring construction items to the Board for action.

Mr. Thurmond said he concurred with Board members and that he would like to hear from Superintendent Harter about staff's requirements. Dr. Harter said that staff will await recommendations from the Facilities Subcommittee.

### B. ACTION ITEM

# **B.1** Resolution 87-0809: Resolution to Adopt the Decision of the Administrative Law Judge and Termination of Certificated Employees

Ms. Romeo introduced this item providing background and indicating that on March 4, 2009, the Board took action to eliminate certain kinds of services and that the district is now required to give notice. She asked the Board to adopt the decision and resolution which allows final notice to be sent to all employees listed on Exhibit C.

### **Public Comment:**

Pixie Hayward Schickele expressed sadness about laying off teachers who provide service to students in the district. She commented that the administrative law judge only acted on the layoff and not other issues that UTR has raised such as the decision about class size reduction.

### **Board Discussion:**

Mr. Medrano said it pained him to have to layoff 124 teachers. He commented that he knows what a painful process this is, having been on the list himself when working for San Francisco Unified School District.

Mr. Ramsey said this was another difficult period of time not only in the district but also with other governmental entities that will be experiencing job losses. He spoke about this as an opportunity to rise above partisanship and bickering and to be resolute in approaching Sacramento.

President Miles said she and Ms. Kronenberg had layoffs in their districts. She said she is saddened by this decision but that there were no other options. She spoke about the May 19 election and possible additional funding losses.

Ms. Kronenberg spoke about her experiences dealing with people who have been laid off and how sobering the process of separation is.

Mr. Thurmond indicated he would vote no, the same as on the initial vote.

### **RESOLUTION NO. 90-0809**

# GOVERNING BOARD OF THE WEST CONTRA COSTA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT TO BECOME SUBJECT TO UNIFORM PUBLIC CONSTRUCTION COST ACCOUNTING PROCEDURES

Generally a school district must formally bid contracts for construction services and public works projects if the cost exceeds \$15,000 pursuant to Public Contract Code section 20111. The Uniform Public Construction Cost Accounting Act (the "UPCCAA or the "Act")(Public Contract Code section 22000 et seq.) provides an exception to this general rule for school districts and other local public agencies that elect to become subject to the Act.

Becoming subject to the Act would allow the District to perform public projects up to a certain cost range with the District's own work force. The Act would also allow the District to proceed by alternative or informal bidding procedures when the public projects are within a certain cost range. The District would be required to follow detailed accounting procedures for staff time, materials, supplies, etc., under the Act. The UPCCAA Commission determined, however, that compliance with the California Schools Accounting Manual satisfies the accounting procedures required by the Act for school districts.

Effective July 1, 2005, the State Controller's most recent adjustments to the cost ranges referenced above under the Act provide that public projects of \$30,000 or less may be performed by negotiated contract or by purchase order, that public projects of \$125,000 or less may be let to contract by the informal procedures set forth in the Act, and that public projects of more than \$125,000 shall be let to contract by formal bidding procedures. (Public Contract Code, section 22032, subdivisions (a)-(c).)

The Act's informal bid requirements provide for the District to follow procedures to establish a list of qualified contractors, identified by work category, to be notified of potential projects and In November of each year, the District must mail written procedures for informal bidding. notice to designated trade journals and invite all licensed contractors to submit firm names and required information for inclusion on the qualified bidders list for the following calendar year. The District may create a new contractors list starting January 1 of each year and it may include any contractors' names it desires and is required to include contractors who provide(d) required information during calendar year or prior to November or December. To informally bid a project, the District would then mail a notice inviting bids at least 10 days before bids are due to all contractors on the District's list for the category of work and to specified trade journals. The notice would describe the project in general terms with information on how to obtain detailed information and the time and place for bid submission. The Governing Board may delegate authority to award informal contracts to specific staff members (e.g. Superintendent, Superintendent's designee). If all bids received exceed \$125,000, the Governing Board may pass a four-fifths resolution awarding contract at \$137,500 or less to lowest responsible bidder if it determines District's cost estimate was reasonable.

The District may include repairs and maintenance in its UPCCAA resolution but is not required to. Otherwise, the entire District would become subject to the Act. If the District does not include maintenance, as recommended, the bid limit for formal contracts for repairs and maintenance would remain at \$76,700 rather than \$125,000. If the District included maintenance, then the District must comply with informal bidding requirements for the tier of projects between \$30,001 to \$76,700, but obtain the advantage of a higher formal bid limit of \$125,000.

If formal bidding is necessary, the Act requires the District to mail a notice inviting formal bids to all construction trade journals specified in the California Schools Accounting Manual determined by UPCCAA Commission at least 30 calendar days before the date of opening the bids in addition to publishing the notice at least once a week for two weeks in some newspaper of general circulation published in the district.

The State Controller's Office reports that local public agencies complying with the Act indicate that benefits of becoming subject to uniform public construction cost accounting procedures under the Act include the raised force account limit, access to informal bidding procedures, greater leeway in execution of public works projects, a streamlined awards process, improved timeliness of project completion and simplified administration. District staff members with experience complying with the Act at other school districts report these benefits as well.

**RECOMMENDATION**: The Administration recommends the Board of Education adopt Resolution No. 90-0809, Governing Board of the West Contra Costa Unified School District electing to become subject to the uniform public construction cost accounting procedures set forth in the Act, delegating authority to the District Superintendent or Superintendent's designee to award contracts and undertake other procedures authorized in the Act, and to authorize the District's Superintendent or Superintendent's designee to take any action necessary for the District to become subject to the uniform public construction costs accounting procedures set forth in the Act.

WHEREAS, Exercise and fitness activities can increase self-esteem, boost energy, strengthen the heart and muscles, burn calories, and improve cholesterol levels; and

WHEREAS, Exercise and fitness activities are excellent ways to relieve stress, lower the risk of heart disease and diabetes, prevent bone loss, and decrease the risk of some cancers; and

WHEREAS, A person's fitness level has a dramatic effect on the body's ability to produce energy and to reduce fat; and

WHEREAS, A fit person burns a higher percentage of fat not only during activity, but also at rest, fit people have a higher proportion of muscle tissue, which burns more calories than fat, and those with more muscle mass can eat more calories and still maintain a healthy weight; and

WHEREAS, To lose weight and keep it off, one should do an enjoyable, moderate-intensity aerobic activity for 30 to 60 minutes, three to five times a week; and

WHEREAS, in 2008 the Board approved an irrevocable trust to begin prefunding the post retirement health benefit liability;

WHEREAS, District Management representing the Board are in current negotiations with the goal of reducing the District's post employment retirement benefits; and

WHEREAS, the Board has capped the benefits of non-represented Managers and Board Members:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Governing Board of the West Contra Costa Unified School District acknowledges the size and gravity of the unfunded liability stemming from nearly 40 years of providing lifetime health benefits, acknowledges its agreement with findings 1-16 in the Contra Costa Grand Jury Report, and is proceeding with the Grand Jury's recommendation in negotiations with its employee groups.

# **Background Information:**

# A Proposal to Develop and Implement a Mentoring Program for WCCUSD Youth

The proposal outlines the formation of a formal mentoring program to support specific students at WCCUSD. In this program, WCCUSD would partner with local government agencies, businesses, parent groups, and community based organizations to connect WCCUSD students to caring adult mentors.

The City of Richmond is considering the development of a program that would encourage city employees to volunteer to serve as mentors to WCCUSD youth. In such a program WCCUSD would help with screening mentor applicants and connecting them to WCCUSD youth in need of a mentor. This collaboration if pursued could serve as a model for how employees of other government agencies could also encourage their employees to serve as mentors. In light of the fact that there are at least six government agencies serving in West Contra Costa County alone (County of Contra Costa and the Cities of Richmond, San Pablo, El Cerrito, Hercules, and Pinole), a school district/government agency collaboration to recruit and match mentors could yield high results.

By approving this proposal the WCCUSD agrees to work with the City of Richmond to develop a program that allows city employees to mentor WCCUSD youth and to partner with other entities that could provide adult mentors. By approving this proposal, WCCUSD also formally authorizes WCCUSD to serve as a co-applicant in funding applications being submitted by Be A Mentor Inc, to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to support mentoring efforts. Be a Mentor, Inc is a community based organization that develops and implements programs to help recruit, screen, and match mentors and mentees. Be A Mentor intends to submit an application to the Department of Health Human Services to support youth of incarcerated family members, foster youth, and other youth who would benefit from mentoring. Be A Mentor, Inc is already engaged in a similar partnership with the County of Alameda. If funded, these grants would pay for many of the costs associated with recruiting, screening, training, matching, and supporting mentors and mentees.

The WCCUSD recognizes that having a connection to a caring adult is one of the key ways to help insure that all youth can have a bright future. As such the WCCUSD Board of Directors authorizes and directs its staff to work with the City of Richmond, Be A Mentor Inc, and other government agencies, businesses, parent groups, and community based organizations to develop and implement a formal mentoring program to benefit WCCUSD youth.

# **Background Information:**

With the deepening recession and the state budget crisis, school districts are facing staffing and program reductions that will have a devastating impact on the quality of education in California. Because of its structural deficit, debt going back to the early 1990's and health benefit contributions, WCCUSD faces an even worse situation from nearly all other districts. The only local option that districts have to raise funds is a parcel tax. In November 2008, voters renewed the 2004 parcel tax with more than 79% of voters in support. While that measure provides nearly \$10 million revenue the district may be facing a budget deficit for 2009-10 of at least three times that amount and perhaps more.

### **Recommendation:**

That the Board discuss the feasibility and possible timing of a parcel tax for WCCUSD.
