The Provisional Internship Permit (PIP) was created in response to the phasing out of emergency permits and became effective on July 1, 2005. It allows an employing agency to hire an individual who has not yet met the subject matter competence requirement needed to enter an internship program. Prior to requesting a PIP, the employing agency must verify that a diligent search has been made, and a fully credentialed teacher cannot be found. The PIP is issued for one (1) year and is renewable one time only provided the teacher has taken all appropriate subject matter examinations, but has not yet passed those tests.

*CI C.11 2010 Consolidated Application for Funding Categorical Aid Programs, Part I

Comment:

The Consolidated Application is the vehicle used by the California Department of Education to gather routine district data regarding categorical programs and compliance with NCLB requirements.

*CI C.12 Ratification and Approval of Engineering Services Contracts

Comment:

Contracts have been initiated by staff using previously qualified consulting, engineering, architectural, or landscape architectural firms to assist in completion of the referenced projects. Many of the firms are already under contract and the staff initiated work may be an extension of the firm's existing contract with the District. Public contracting laws have been followed in initially qualifying and selecting these professionals.

*CI C.13 Ratification and Approval of Negotiated Change Orders

Comment:

Staff is seeking ratification of change orders on the following current District construction projects: Adams Middle School Site Improvements (Emergency Repair Project); and Dover Elementary School Reconstruction. Change orders are fully executed by the District upon signature by the Superintendent's designee. Board ratification is the final step required under state law in order to complete payment and contract adjustment.

*CI C.14 Juan Crespi Jr. High Emergency Repair Program Roofing Repair Contract Award

Comment:

The District has received funding from the State Emergency Repair Program ("ERP") to repair seriously deteriorated roofing systems on buildings and walkways, replacement of the 500 Wing roof, and replacement of ceilings at building hallways at the Crespi Jr. High site.

HY Architects prepared bid documents for the State-approved project. The District conducted a public bid process for the project. Bids were opened on July 15, 2010. Twelve Contractors submitted bids. They are as follows: IMR Contractors \$715,000; ERA Construction \$683,000; Goldspring \$652,927; Amana Engineering \$625,000; Western Roofing \$549,179; Kendrige Builders \$537,000; Fidelity Roof \$532,000; Albay Construction \$521,000; Pioneer Construction \$398,000.

Subsequent to the bid opening, and within the timeframes allowed by the Public Contract Code, the apparent low bidder withdrew their bid citing mathematical error in preparation of the bid. The District has accepted the withdrawal. Therefore, the lowest responsive bidder is Albay Construction at \$521,000.

*CI C.15 Kennedy High School Field Building and Field Lighting Project Rejection of Bids & Authorization for Staff to Rebid the Project

Comment:

This project will provide for field lighting for athletic events and team practices at the George Harris Field and Kennedy High School. In addition, this project includes a permanent building for restrooms, concessions, equipment storage and support spaces for the field area. This project will provide high quality facilities for community use.

Powell and Partners Architects completed plans and specifications for the project. The District conducted a public bid of the project. Bids were opened on June 10, 2010. Six Contractors submitted bids. They were as follows: John Plane Construction \$1,605,046; KMS, Inc. \$1,424,808; JDS Builders \$1,358,000; S&H Construction \$890,000; and CA Professional Builders \$829,500.

After opening the bids, the District received information that field lighting levels needed to be higher than designed in order to ensure similar light levels to our other current field lighting projects. Considering this information, it is appropriate that the District redesign the project and rebid. Therefore it is recommended that the Board take action at this time to reject all bids and authorize staff to rebid the project after making changes to the design.

*CI C.16 Gompers Continuation High Campus Modulars Approval of Lease

Comment:

The Gompers Continuation High School is located in the modular building campus formerly occupied by the Leadership Public Schools Charter High School ("LPS"). This group of buildings is located at 8th and Chanslor on District property adjacent to the old Gompers site. The lease for the buildings was previously held by LPS and will expire in August of this year. The District has been paying for the use of the buildings by reimbursing LPS, the current leaseholder. It is appropriate at this time for the District to take over the lease of the buildings directly with Mobile Modular. The construction of the new permanent campus for Gompers Continuation High School is currently in the schematic design phase. It is anticipated that this project will be ready for occupancy in approximately 2 ½ years or less. District staff has negotiated a 2 year lease and we can extend on a monthly basis as needed. The building leases have been negotiated down almost 20% lower than the current rates, which reflect the age of the buildings. The buildings will still be under Mobile Modular warranty and service. The lease includes a restroom building, one standard 24 x 40 building used for administration, and 5-24 x 60 classroom buildings, each containing two classrooms. The total lease cost per month is \$4,146. With a 24 month lease the total cost will be \$99,504. This campus is considered as a temporary housing campus, pending construction of the permanent Gompers buildings, and as such this project will be funded under the Bond Program.

*CI C.17 Richmond College Prep Charter Campus Modulars Award of Contract

Comment:

The Richmond College Prep Charter ("RCP") continues to expand their campus at the Nystrom site. The Board recently renewed the RCP Charter. As part of their equivalent facilities request RCP has indicated that they will need two additional classrooms to meet the next phase of enrollment. The District has been working with the school to locate the new classrooms and retained Interactive Resources to complete plans and specifications for new modular classrooms. The project plans, which will locate the new building at the rear of the existing Harbour Way Academy building, have been approved by the Division of State Architect. The District has received pricing on the modular buildings from Mobile Modular, in accordance with the pricing which was publically bid for the Portola Temp campus, on which this vendor was the lowest bidder among five modular building vendors.

*CI C.18 Modulars Award of Contract: Richmond College Prep Charter Campus and Valley View Elementary Replacement

Comment:

There are two schools which require modular building purchase:

- 1. The Richmond College Prep Charter ("RCP") continues to expand their campus at the Nystrom site. The Board recently renewed the RCP Charter. As part of their equivalent facilities request RCP has indicated they will need two additional classrooms to meet the next phase of enrollment. The District has been working with the school to locate the new classrooms and retain Interactive Resources to complete plans and specifications for new modular classrooms. The project plans, which locate the new building at the rear of the existing Harbour Way Academy building, have been approved by the Division of State Architect.
- 2. Valley View Elementary School has a modular building which became severely deteriorated due to water damage. It was unusable as a classroom and the building has been removed by the District pending replacement. HMR Architects is preparing plans and specifications for DSA approval. The new modular will be placed in the same location as the previous building on campus.

The District has received pricing on the modular buildings from Mobile Modular, in accordance with the pricing which was publically bid for the Portola Temp campus, on which this vendor was the lowest bidder among five modular building vendors.

*CI C.19 Portola Middle School Temporary Housing Rain/Shade Structure Award of Contract

Comment:

The temporary campus at Portola Middle School is nearing completion. The campus has a lunch shelter system adjacent to the temporary kitchen. However, it is clear that an additional outdoor shelter will be needed in order to accommodate the number of students on campus. The site will be without a large multi-purpose/cafeteria space for a year or more and this will provide appropriate outdoor gathering space for students. It is proposed to provide an additional temporary rain/shade shelter using a modular, preapproved system with PVC-coated fabric covering on the playground area. This will provide both sun and rain protection. It is proposed to install a system totaling 30' wide x 40' long x 12' high.

The District has received a "piggyback" contract price for providing and installing the shade structure. The piggyback contract is an award from the San Joaquin County Office of Education dated October 23, 2007, to the USA Shade & Fabric Structures, Inc. This contract has been updated annually to reflect current pricing. The pricing for the product and installation is in accordance with this contract. The West Contra Costa Unified School District is a named additional district in the piggyback contract. The total cost for providing and installing the system is \$56,155.95.

Award contract to USA Shade & Fabric Structures, Inc. under the terms and conditions of the San Joaquin County Office of Education piggyback contract

*CI C.20 Approve Purchase of Maintenance Equipment for Helms and El Cerrito High Projects

Comment:

The District's Bond Program includes provisions for providing maintenance equipment for new building systems. The Helms Middle School project and the El Cerrito High School project require maintenance equipment at this time. These items will allow maintenance of the ECHS Theater and all areas of Helms campus. District staff and the Bond team prepared a public bid process. Two vendors provided pricing. They are as follows:

Toyota Material Handling: Electric boom lift, JLG Lifts, Electric Cart Carrier and trailer, \$75,994. Advance: Rider Sweeper, \$29,042.

*CI C.21 Approval of Program and Construction Management Services for Additional Projects and Staffing

Comment:

The District's Bond Program is managed primarily by Seville Group ("SGI"). This includes individual project construction management and program management services. Not all projects in the Measure J program are currently under contract and it is appropriate at this time to approve construction management services for two projects which are beginning constructed. For the Nystrom Multi-Purpose Building project the services are through August 2011 and include a full time on-site construction manager and a half-time project engineer. The Restroom Wall Cracks repair project is a limited duration half-time position contract through November 2010. In addition, SGI provides staffing for program management for estimating, scheduling, document control, network support services, and administrative staff. The proposed program management services and personnel costs are for the 2010/2011 fiscal year and include reimbursable expenses of approximately \$30,000/month for the Facilities Operations Center. The program management budget is included in the overall District budget for the program and each project budget carries a share of the program management costs.

There are three specific proposals recommended for approval under this action:

Nystrom Multi-Purpose Building Construction Management: \$428,188 \$ 39.984 Restroom Wall Cracks Repair Project: \$1,255,247

Program Management Services/General Condition Reimbursable:

Inspector of Record Contracts for Bond Program Projects 2010-2011 *CI

Comment:

Every construction project in the District approved by the Division of State Architect ("DSA") is required to have on-site, continuous inspection in order to ensure compliance with the approved plans and specifications. These inspectors are certified by DSA, approved by the Architect of Record, and are hired by the District. The District currently has 5 inspectors under contract. In addition to our regular inspection team, the District has a master inspector, Steve Cayson/Production Technical Services who coordinates all of the work of the project inspectors, coordinates District inspection needs with DSA, and is responsible for coordination of District utilities for the projects. In addition, staffing for individual projects may include more than one inspector or a Class 1 with full responsibility supervising a Class 2 or 3 inspector. It is appropriate to approve contracts with these individuals for the upcoming year in order to ensure continuity on the projects. These costs are budgeted for each project in the District's Bond Program. The inspectors, project assignments, and contract amounts are as follows:

Mark Eriksen, Class 1: Ford, King Reconstruction Projects, \$16,466/month. \$197,600/year; Kris Gilbert, Class 1: Dover, Pinole Middle, and Nystrom Multi-Purpose, \$16,466/month, \$197,000/year; A.J. Washington, Class3 w/Welding Certifications: DeAnza Main Campus, \$14,733/month, \$176,800/year;

Brad Williamson, Class 3: Richmond HS ERP, Nystrom Multi-Purpose, Kennedy HS projects, \$13,000/month, \$156,000/year.

Steve Cayson, Class 1, Master Inspector, Supervision of all inspectors: DeAnza Main Campus. Utilities and services coordination with PG&E, EBMUD, Sanitary Districts for all projects. \$21,880/month, \$\$262,560/year.

*CI C.23 Measure D 2010 Bond Program Oversight

Comment:

Proposition 39, approved by California voters in the November 6, 2000, general election, provides that the Governing Board of a school district may pursue the authorization and issuance of bonds by 55 percent vote of the electorate. As a result of the passage of Proposition 39, language was added to the Education Code requiring school districts passing a bond designated as a Proposition 39 bond election to establish a Citizens' Oversight Committee ("Committee") to actively review and report on the use of bond proceeds whenever the district passes a Proposotion39 bond.

When a Proposition 39 bond is passed, the Board shall establish a Committee to actively review and report on the use of bond proceeds to ensure they are spent only on school and classroom improvements and not for any other purpose. The Committee shall be established within sixty (60) days of the date that the Board enters the election results in its minutes.

At the June 23, 2010, regular meeting of the CBOC, unanimous action was taken to recommend the addition of the oversight for the Measure D 2010 bond program, to the prevue of the existing responsibilities. Staff recognizes the valuable service and commitment that the committee provides for the benefit of the community and the district and supports their recommendation.

*CI C.24 Citizens' Bond Oversight committee (CBOC) appointments: Jason Gallia to represent Contra Costa Building Trades Council and Re-appointment of Marcus Mitchell representing Public Employees Union Local 1

The current appointee from the Contra Costa Building Trades Council, Robert Sewall, has completed two consecutive terms on the CBOC. The Council has recommended Jason Gallia as their new member of the CBOC.

*CI C.26 Resolution No. 17-1011: In Support of the California Jobs Budget

* F.1 Authorize a Parcel Tax Election Resolution No. 16-1011

Comment:

By statute the per pupil revenue limit for 2010-11 should be \$6,390 but due to the financial crisis and the Legislature's inability to fund public education in California, West Contra Costa Unified School District will receive only \$4,951. The total loss of revenue to WCCUSD is nearly \$40 million. The Board has

demonstrated financial stewardship in making expenditure reductions including closing schools, capping employee health benefits, requiring employees to take furlough days, raising class sizes, and reducing or eliminating many programs that had served the students of the District. In adopting a budget for 2010-11, the Board used several one-time funding sources such as the Federal Stimulus money to keep essential programs and services. Yet, the District faces a deficit of \$3.2 million for 2010-11 and huge program and service reductions for 2011-12.

At the June 22, 2010 meeting, the Board authorized a contract with Godbe Research to perform a random sample survey to aid in determining the degree to which the community is willing to support a possible local measure that would help in replacing the vast amount of state funding that has been lost due the State's revenue shortfall. At the July 7, 2010 meeting, Bryan Godbe from Godbe Research presented the results of that survey. The survey results show the voters are willing to support a small parcel tax that would help the District continue to fund key programs and services to get through the current financial hardship.

Recommendation:

That the Board approve ballot language and Resolution No. 16-1011 authorizing a parcel tax measure on the November 2010 ballot

Fiscal Impact:

Provide \$9.8 million each year for 5 years for programs and services to students

* F.2 Refund 2002 Measure "D" Bonds by using the proceeds from Measure "J" Series "D" Bond

Comment:

The District received authorization to issue \$300 million in general obligation bonds on March 5, 2002. The District issued the full amount of the authorization in four series. The overall debt service structure on the bonds issued under the 2002 Measure D authorization, as originally structured, escalates at 4.2%, on average, and has not changed since the issuance of Series D Bonds in October 2005. Since that time, the Measure D tax rates have gone from \$48.70 to \$44.20 to \$48.40 to \$58.10 per \$100,000 of AV (Assess Valuation). The maximum tax rate target on the 2002 bonds was \$60 per \$100,000 of AV. Preliminary tax base figures from the County indicate that AVs will decline by 7.7% in tax year 2010-11. Based on the preliminary AV provided by the County, the District Staff believes that the Measure D could be in excess of \$65.00 per \$100,000 of AV. District Staff would use an amount of \$1,600,000 from the recent Measure "J" Series "D" bond sale to refund 2002 Measure "D" bonds. This will allow the District to keep the 2010 – 11 tax rates below the tax rate target of \$60 per \$100,000.

Recommendation:

Approve proceeds from Measure "J" Series "D" to refund 2002 Measure "D" bonds in an amount not to exceed \$1,600,000 and authorize the Superintendent and the Associate Superintendent for Business Services to execute and deliver any certificates, notices, agreements or other documents that they may deem necessary in order to accomplish the refunding of such 2002 Measure "D" bonds.

F.1 Resolution No. 14-1011: Resolution to Conditionally Approve the Renewal of the Charter Petition for Richmond College Prep K-5 Charter School

Executive Director Linda Jackson presented information regarding the request from Richmond College Prep Charter School for renewal of their charter and extension of an additional grade level. She said a District panel reviewed the petition and developed specific findings and recommendations. Ms. Jackson reviewed the findings and recommended that the Board adopt the resolution.

Board Comment:

Ms. Miles asked questions about operational and special education memorandums of understanding. Ms. Jackson provided clarification.

Mr. Medrano asked whether any similar special needs requirements are in place for other charter schools. Ms. Jackson provided examples and clarification.

Mr. Thurmond had questions about amending bylaws and articles of incorporation. Ms. Jackson said that the intent of the recommendations is to promote compliance with the law. He further asked about recommended revisions to the parent-student handbook. Ms. Jackson provided examples of required compliance. Mr. Thurmond continued with questions about the recommended provision for Academic Performance Index (API) score improvement. Ms. Jackson spoke of Richmond College Prep's gains and the ratio of students to adults as compared to other schools in the comparison. He said he supports challenging student performance and asked what the process might be if Richmond College Prep's test scores do not attain the required gains. Ms. Jackson provided information regarding current API scores and comparisons with the other schools mentioned as well as state required accountability for the education of children.

Mr. Medrano asked Ms. Jackson to repeat the state requirements for API scores. Ms. Jackson said that the state requires all schools to achieve scores of 800 or higher.

President Kronenberg asked whether similar standards have been applied to other charter schools. Ms. Jackson responded that current state requirements were not in place at the time of other charter renewals but will be required with future renewals.

Superintendent Harter said that the state's intent is that charter schools perform better than other schools and the reason for their additional resources is to lead the way for public schools in reaching such a high standard. President Kronenberg commented that this position follows the state's new emphasis on accountability.

Ms. Peppina Chang, Chief Educational Officer, spoke on behalf of Richmond College Prep Charter School saying that the board of directors accepts and is grateful for the conditional approval of the renewal. She addressed each of the conditions and emphasized that RCP has taken STAR testing only twice since their founding, yet is compared against many schools. She pointed out their second year gain of 45 points in one year. She said she understands the need for comparison and improvement, and knows the school does not face failure. She said that Richmond College Prep is willing to comply with the recommended amendments.

Motion: Mr. Thurmond moved approval of Resolution No. 14-1011: Resolution to Conditionally Approve the Renewal of the Charter Petition for Richmond College Prep K-5 Charter School. Mr. Medrano seconded. Mr. Medrano, Ms. Miles, Mr. Thurmond and President Kronenberg voted yes with no abstentions and Mr. Ramsey absent. Motion carried 4-0-0-1.

G.2 Revenue Enhancement Survey Report

Superintendent Harter introduced Mr. Bryan Godbe who spoke about the results of a preliminary analysis of a survey and feasibility for a parcel tax. He presented detailed information regarding the survey conducted. He further reported that a complete report will be presented to the Board in a few weeks.

Public Comment:

Board Comment:

Mr. Ramsey asked questions of Mr. Godbe regarding any determination about the duration of a measure. Mr. Godbe said duration has been tested repeatedly and that the overall voter perception is that the state financial situation is a short-term problem and therefore the voter sees the need for a short-term solution. Mr. Godbe recommended a 5 year time frame. Mr. Ramsey continued with questions about the survey responses regarding adult education and summer school programs, and compelling responses. Mr. Godbe replied with clarification.

Mr. Ramsey spoke about the encouragement of the percentage of voter support and a concerted campaign to reach voters.

Ms. Miles said she is encouraged by the survey, agreeing that the work needs to get started with a clear message to the community and commitment to working on a campaign.

Mr. Ramsey asked Ms. Miles what tax threshold she would support. She said she supports the dollar amount that would secure a class size reduction supplement.

Mr. Thurmond said he supported a parcel tax as revenue enhancement and that families in this community deserve a choice. He continued by asking questions about the presentation regarding the percentage rates. Mr. Godbe responded.

Mr. Medrano said he was encouraged by the survey results and supported clear language for the ballot measure. He said he was prepared to begin the campaign for educating the community of voters.

President Kronenberg said she was also encouraged and has respect for the survey results. She continued to say that she supports attracting and retaining quality teachers with a reasonable work load that includes class size reduction, quality buildings and technology. Determining which items will be most persuasive to voters is the next task for preparation of the measure language.

Mr. Ramsey asked other Board members about the tax threshold level they would support. He continued to ask about the top ranking supporting arguments from the survey. Mr. Godbe responded.

Mr. Thurmond spoke about the features of the measure and deliverability of the message to the public. He asked for the levels of tax threshold and the amount of funds potentially generated.

Superintendent Harter responded with the various revenue generations per level of tax threshold.

Discussion continued. Mr. Godbe recommended using the full data to frame the ballot measure question and prepare messages with affirmative responses to potential voter questions.

Mr. Ramsey asked Mr. Thurmond to consider chairing the campaign. Mr. Thurmond responded that he will take chairing the campaign under advisement, but is fully committed to support the measure.

All Board members were in agreement that Ms. Miles work with Superintendent Harter in framing the ballot language and bringing this back for action by the Board.

G. 3 Report on the Status of General Obligation Bond Debt and Potential Refunding

Ms. Gamba introduced Ms. Joanna Bowes from KNN Public Finance and other district bond finance advisors. Ms. Bowes provided a presentation regarding the bond debt and tax rate service.

Board Comment:

Mr. Ramsey asked questions about the debt limit waiver and bonding capacity. Ms. Bowes spoke about bonding capacity mandates and legislative imposed caps. Mr. Ramsey said he wanted an understanding of the comparables for other districts of similar size. Ms. Gamba interjected that the rate on the ability to issue debt is arbitrary and assessed valuation of property is determined by the County Assessor's Office. She continued to say that this presentation is regarding the 2002 Measure D bond measure and making sure the promise to the taxpayers is upheld. She said that the finance team will also attend the next Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee meeting to share further.

Mr. Ramsey asked about tax rates not being cumulative. Ms. Bowes responded. Attorney David Casnocha provided further information regarding the constitutional provisions under which the separate bond measures were approved by voters. Mr. Ramsey continued with further questions about the possibility of the Assessor's determinations at a lesser value.

Ms. Gamba offered a point of clarification for projected comparisons with and without refunding as well as the uncertainty in assessed valuation over the next few years. Discussion continued about the assumptions in preparing these projections and Ms. Gamba spoke about presenting conservative estimates.

Mr. Thurmond asked questions about the timeline and projections. Ms. Bowes responded with clarification.

Ms. Gamba said that when final data is received from the Assessor's office more firm recommendations will be developed to support a refunding for the upcoming property tax statements.

President Kronenberg said it is important for the Board and community to have transparent, clear information.

G.4 Four Closed School Sites Analysis and Recommendations

Mr. Fay introduced Mr. Scott Sheldon of Terra Realty Advisors who prepared a review of four properties; Seaview, El Sobrante, Adams and Portola. He presented information regarding potential opportunities, constraints, values and recommendations for each site.

Board Comment:

Mr. Ramsey spoke about costs to mitigate property issues versus debt payoff, potential for the Seaview site, community interested in the El Sobrante property, and litigation resolution for Adams and Portola.

Ms. Miles asked Mr. Fay for an estimate of maintenance costs of closed property due to vandalism. Mr. Fay responded.

Mr. Ramsey commented about demolition or removal of portable buildings to deter vandalism as a factor in potential reduction of property values.

Mr. Medrano spoke about moving Leadership Public Schools to another campus with Kennedy or El Sobrante as a possible temporary campus.

Ms. Miles spoke about the community's concern about placing Leadership Public School (LPS) at Seaview.

Mr. Ramsey spoke about a temporary campus for LPS while the Gompers campus is demolished and rebuilt.

Mr. Medrano commented about the Seaview campus and use of fields for county soccer fields.

Mr. Ramsey asked about agendizing this item for an upcoming Facilities Subcommittee.

Mr. Thurmond suggested pursuing lease options rather than selling property at low estimated values. He asked whether there is any expressed interest from buyers. Mr. Sheldon offered further information.

Mr. Sheldon said there is maximum value in leaving buildings on the property, and potential for schools and churches that might be interested in the sites. Mr. Thurmond asked questions about El Sobrante and any proposals. Mr. Sheldon responded and Mr. Fay said that Terra Realty Associates developed lease prices as recommendations. Further discussion continued regarding community group interest in the El Sobrante location.

Mr. Thurmond asked about the process for interested groups in leasing property. Mr. Fay responded.

Ms. Miles said she agreed that there needs to be a clear process for handling potential interest, and that she supports lease agreements or joint agreements in order to reduce vacancy issues and generate revenue. Mr. Fay says the District could engage a broker who would market the property and screen potential tenants.

Mr. Medrano asked about the closure of an additional four schools in the next year.

Ms. Kronenberg said she agreed that there is expense to maintaining buildings and that some of these are unsafe. She suggested looking at demolition of buildings if unsafe.

Mr. Ramsey said he wanted to make it clear that safety was the reason other board members chose to close Adams even though no complete seismic study had been done, while his reasons for closure were economic.

Mr. Medrano asked about lighting at the future LPS and Gompers site. Mr. Savidge responded.

This group of buildings is located at 8th and Chanslor on District property adjacent to the old Gompers site. The lease for the buildings was previously held by LPS and will expire in August of this year. The District has been paying for the use of the buildings by reimbursing LPS, the current leaseholder. The temporary campus at Portola Middle School is nearing completion. The campus has a lunch shelter system adjacent to the temporary kitchen. However, it is clear that an additional outdoor shelter will be needed in order to accommodate the number of students on campus. Every construction project in the District approved by the Division of State Architect ("DSA") is required to have on-site, continuous inspection in order to ensure compliance with the approved plans and specifications. These inspectors are certified by DSA, approved by the Architect of Record, and are hired by the District. The District currently has 5 inspectors under contract. In addition to our regular inspection team, the District has a master inspector, Steve Cayson/Production Technical Services who coordinates all of the work of the project inspectors, coordinates District inspection needs with DSA, and is responsible for coordination of District utilities for the projects. In addition, staffing for individual projects may include more than one inspector or a Class 1 with full responsibility supervising a Class 2 or 3 inspector. It is appropriate to approve contracts with these individuals for the upcoming year in order to ensure continuity on the projects. These costs are budgeted for each project in the District's Bond Program. The inspectors, project assignments, and contract amounts are as follows:

Background Information:

By statute the per pupil revenue limit for 2010-11 should be \$6,390 but due to the financial crisis and the Legislature's inability to fund public education in California, West Contra Costa Unified School District will receive only \$4,951. The total loss of revenue to WCCUSD is nearly \$40 million. The Board has demonstrated financial stewardship in making expenditure reductions including closing schools, capping employee health benefits, requiring employees to take furlough days, raising class sizes, and reducing or eliminating many programs that had served the students of the District. In adopting a budget for 2010-11, the Board used several one-time funding sources such as the Federal Stimulus money to keep essential programs and services. Yet, the District faces a deficit of \$3.2 million for 2010-11 and huge program and service reductions for 2011-12.

At the June 22, 2010 meeting, the Board authorized a contract with Godbe Research to perform a random sample survey to aid in determining the degree to which the community is willing to support a possible local measure that would help in replacing the vast amount of state funding that has been lost due the State's revenue shortfall. At the July 7, 2010 meeting, Bryan Godbe from Godbe Research presented the results of that survey. The survey results show the voters are willing to support a small parcel tax that would help the District continue to fund key programs and services to get through the current financial hardship.

That the Board approve ballot language and Resolution 16-1011 authorizing a parcel tax measure on the November 2010 ballot

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE WEST CONTRA COSTA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT CALLING AN ELECTION, ESTABLISHING SPECIFICATIONS OF THE ELECTION ORDER, AND REQUESTING CONSOLIDATION WITH OTHER ELECTIONS OCCURRING ON NOVEMBER 2, 2010

WHEREAS, the West Contra Costa Unified School District ("District") is committed to offering a high-quality educational program to all students in the District, and due to inadequate state funding, increased local revenues are necessary to meet this goal; and

WHEREAS, California Constitution, Article XIIIA, Section 4 and Government Code Section 50075 et seq. authorize school districts, upon approval of 2/3rds of the electorate, to levy qualified special taxes on property in the District for the purposes of providing quality educational programs in the District and other lawful purposes of the District; and

WHEREAS, an adequately funded and well-developed public education program provides numerous benefits and advantages to all of the residents of the community; and

WHEREAS, in the judgment of this Board, following public hearing and comment, it is advisable to request that the Contra Costa County Registrar of Voters call an election and submit to the voters of the District the question whether the District shall levy a special tax within the District for the purpose of raising additional revenue for the District; and

WHEREAS, the purpose of the special tax shall be to improve the quality of education in the District by supporting the following programs:

- providing manageable class sizes to improve core academics like math, science, reading and writing,
- restoring arts and music programs,
- attracting and retaining quality teachers,
- improving campus safety and cleanliness,
- preparing students for college and workforce.

WHEREAS, pursuant to Education Code Section 5342 and Elections Code Sections 10400, 10402, and 10403, such election may be completely or partially consolidated with any other election held on the same day and in the same territory or in territory that is in part the same.

WHEREAS, the Board of Education of the District (the "Board") believes that in order to continue meeting the educational needs of all of the District's students it is necessary to request a new qualified special tax in the amount of 7.2 cents per square foot of total building area on each parcel of taxable property or a tax of \$7.20 per unimproved parcel of taxable property per year, to be collected for five years beginning July 1, 2011; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Resolution Constitutes Order of Election. That this resolution shall constitute an order of election pursuant to Education Code Section 5320 et seq.

Section 2. Date and Purpose of Measure. Pursuant to Section 4 of Article XIIIA of the California Constitution and Government Code Section 50077, an election shall be held within the boundaries of the District on Tuesday, November 2, 2010 for the purpose of voting on a proposition, a copy of which is attached hereto and marked Exhibit A, containing the question of whether the District shall establish a parcel tax for the purposes stated therein. In addition, the full text of the ballot proposition (the "Full Ballot Text") attached hereto and marked Exhibit B shall appear in the ballot pamphlet. The parcel tax shall be established at an amount equal to 5 cents per square foot of total building area on each parcel of taxable property within the District or a tax of \$5 per unimproved parcel of taxable real property. The District shall provide the Contra Costa County Treasurer-Tax Collector a report indicating the parcel number and amount of tax for each parcel of taxable real property. The number of square feet of total building area on improved real property shall be obtained from the Contra Costa County Tax Assessor. If that information is missing from the tax assessor's records, the number of square feet of total building area shall be based upon the records of the building department for the applicable jurisdiction. The parcel tax shall be collected by the Contra Costa County Treasurer-Tax Collector at the same time, in the same manner, and subject to the same penalties as ad valorem property taxes collected by the Treasurer-Tax Collector. Unpaid taxes shall bear interest at the same rate as the rate for unpaid ad valorem property taxes until paid. The collection of the parcel tax shall not decrease the funds available from other sources of the District in any period from the effective date hereof.

The District's Superintendent, or designee, is hereby authorized and directed to make any changes to the text of the measure, or to the abbreviated form of the measure, as may be convenient or necessary to comply with the intent of this Resolution, the requirements of elections, officials, and requirements of law.

"Parcel of taxable real property" shall be defined as any unit of real property in the District that receives a separate tax bill for *ad valorem* property taxes from the Contra Costa County Treasurer-Tax Collector's Office. All property that is otherwise exempt from or on which are levied no *ad valorem* property taxes in any year shall also be exempt from the parcel tax in such year. Parcels owned and occupied by eligible persons 65 years of age or older or who receive Supplemental Security Income for a disability, regardless of age, who apply to the District pursuant to an administrative review process are exempt from the parcel tax.

The District shall annually provide a list of parcels that the District has approved for a Senior Citizen Exemption or the SSI Exemption from the parcel tax as described above to the Contra Costa County tax collection officials. The Contra Costa County Tax Assessor's determination of exemption or relief of any parcel from taxation for any reason other than the Senior Citizen or SSI Exemptions shall be final and binding for the purposes of the parcel tax. Taxpayers wishing to challenge the County Assessor's determination must do so under the procedures for correcting

a misclassification of property pursuant to Section 4876.5 of the California Revenue and Taxation Code or other applicable procedures. Taxpayers seeking a refund of parcel taxes paid shall follow the procedures applicable to property tax refunds pursuant to the California Revenue and Taxation Code.

- **Section 3. Authority for Ordering Election.** That the authority for ordering the election is contained in Section 50075 <u>et seq.</u> of the Government Code and Section 4 of Article XIIIA of the California Constitution.
- **Section 4. Authority for Specifications.** That the authority for the specification of this election order is contained in Section 5322 of the Education Code.
- Section 5. Resolution to County Registrar and Clerk and County Superintendent of Schools. That the Clerk of the Board is hereby directed to cause certified copies of this Resolution and Order to be delivered not later than August 6, 2010, to the Contra Costa County Superintendent of Schools and not later than August 6, 2010, to the Contra Costa County Registrar of Voters (the "County Registrar"), as the officer conducting the election, and to the Contra Costa County Clerk of the Board of Supervisors (the "County Clerk").
- **Section 6. Formal Notice.** That the Contra Costa County Superintendent of Schools is hereby requested to prepare and execute a Formal Notice of Parcel Tax Election and consolidation order in substantially the form attached hereto as Exhibit C (the "Formal Notice"), and to call the election by causing the Formal Notice to be posted pursuant to Section 5362 of the Education Code by August 6, 2010, or to otherwise cause the notice to be published as permitted by law. The Clerk of the Board, on behalf of and as may be requested by the County Superintendent of Schools, is authorized to cause all notices required by law in connection herewith to be published and posted, as the case may be.
- **Section 7. Full Ballot Text.** That the Board hereby determines to include within the ballot pamphlet the Full Ballot Text attached hereto as Exhibit B, which is hereby approved and adopted by the Board.
- **Section 8. Conduct of Election.** (a) *Request to Registrar of Voters*. Pursuant to Section 5303 of the Education Code, the Registrar of Voters is requested to take all steps to hold the election in accordance with law and these specifications.
- (b) *Voter Pamphlet*. That the Registrar of Voters is hereby requested to reprint the measure in its entirety (the Full Ballot Text located in Exhibit B) in the voter information pamphlet to be distributed to voters pursuant to Section 13307 of the Elections Code. In the event the Full Ballot Text of the measure will not be reprinted in the voter information pamphlet in its entirety, the Registrar of Voters is hereby requested to print, immediately below the impartial analysis of the measure, in no less than 10-point boldface type, a legend substantially as follows:

The above statement is an impartial analysis of Measure ____. If you desire a copy of the measure, please call the Contra Costa County Registrar of Voters at (phone number) and a copy will be mailed at no cost to you.

- (c) *Consolidation*. That the County Registrar and the Contra Costa County Board of Supervisors are hereby requested to consolidate the election ordered hereby with any and all other elections to be held on November 2, 2010, within the District.
- (d) Canvass of Results. That the Board of Supervisors of the County is authorized to canvass the returns of the election pursuant to Section 10411 of the Elections Code.
- **Section 9. Appropriations Limit.** That the Board of Education shall provide in each year (pursuant to Section 7902.1 of the Government Code or any successor provision of law) for any increase in the District's appropriations limit as shall be necessary to ensure that proceeds of the parcel tax may be spent for the authorized purposes.
- **Section 10. Ballot Arguments.** That the President of this Board and/or her designees are hereby authorized to prepare and file with the Registrar of Voters a ballot argument in favor of the proposition contained in Exhibit A hereto, or act as an author of any ballot argument prepared in connection with the election, including a rebuttal argument, each within the time established by the Registrar of Voters, which shall be considered the official ballot arguments of this Board as sponsor of the proposition.
- **Section 11. Official Actions.** That the Superintendent, President of the Board, or their designees are hereby authorized to execute any other document and to perform all acts necessary to amend the tax measure on the ballot including making alterations in the ballot language stated in Exhibits A and B hereto to comply with requirements of law and election officials.

Section 12. Effective Date. That this resolution shall take effect from and after its adoption.

EXHIBIT B

FULL BALLOT TEXT

The following is the full ballot text of the proposition to be presented to the voters by the West Contra Costa Unified School District in the ballot pamphlet:

To provide local funding the state cannot take away, and preserve quality education by:

- providing manageable class sizes to improve core academics like math, science, reading and writing,
- restoring arts and music programs,
- attracting and retaining quality teachers,
- improving campus safety and cleanliness
- preparing students for college and workforce;

shall West Contra Costa Unified School District charge an annual tax of 7.2 cents per square foot of building area, or \$7.20 per vacant parcel for five years commencing July 1, 2011, exempting seniors and requiring independent citizen oversight?

The purpose of the special tax is to improve the quality of education in the District by supporting the following programs:

- providing manageable class sizes to improve core academics like math, science, reading and writing,
- restoring arts and music programs,
- attracting and retaining quality teachers,
- improving campus safety and cleanliness,
- preparing students for college and workforce;

An exemption shall be granted annually on any single family residential parcel or multi-family dwelling unit owned by one or more persons 65 years of age or older or persons who receive Supplemental Security Income for a disability, regardless of age, who occupies said parcel or unit as a principal residence, upon annual application to the District for exemption.

Pursuant to California Constitution Article XIIIB and applicable laws, the appropriations limit for the District will be adjusted periodically by the aggregate sum collected by levy of this special tax.

Accountability

The proceeds of the special tax shall be applied only for the specific purposes identified above. The proceeds of the special tax shall be deposited into an account, which shall be kept separate and apart from other accounts of the District. No later than January 1 of each year while the tax is in effect, commencing January 1, 2012, the chief fiscal officer of the District shall prepare and file with the Board of Education a report detailing the amount of funds collected and expended

during the prior fiscal year, and the status of any project or description of any programs authorized to be funded by this measure. Parcel Tax funds shall also be subject to an annual independent financial audit which shall be made public, including oversight by the Community Budget Advisory Committee and posting on the District's website.

Basis of Tax

The parcel tax shall be an annual tax of 7.2 cents per square foot of total building area on each parcel of taxable real property within the District or a tax of \$7.20 per unimproved parcel of taxable real property. The District shall provide the Contra Costa County Treasurer-Tax Collector a report indicating the parcel number and amount of tax for each parcel of taxable real property. The number of square feet of total building area on improved real property shall be obtained from the Contra Costa County Tax Assessor. If that information is missing from the tax assessor's records, the number of square feet of total building area shall be based upon the records of the building department for the applicable jurisdiction.

Definition of Parcel of Taxable Real Property

"Parcel of taxable real property" shall be defined as any unit of real property in the District that receives a separate tax bill for *ad valorem* property taxes from the Contra Costa County Treasurer-Tax Collector's Office. All property that is otherwise exempt from or on which are levied no *ad valorem* property taxes in any year shall also be exempt from the parcel tax in such year. Parcels owned and occupied by persons 65 years of age or older or persons receiving Supplemental Security Income for a disability regardless of age, are exempt from the parcel tax as described above.

For purposes of this special tax, any such "Parcels" which are (i) contiguous, (ii) used solely for owner-occupied, single-family residential purposes, and (iii) held under identical ownership may, by annually submitting an application of the owners thereof by July 1 of any year to the Board of Education be treated as a single "parcel" for purposes of the levy of this education parcel tax.

Severability

The Board of Education hereby declares, and the voters by approving this measure concur, that every section and part of this measure has independent value, and the Board of Education and the voters would have adopted each provision hereof regardless of every other provision hereof. Upon approval of this measure by the voters, should any part be found by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid for any reason, all remaining parts hereof shall remain in full force and effect to the fullest extent allowed by law.

Subject: Refund 2002 Measure "D" Bonds by using the proceeds from Measure "J" Series "D" Bond

Background Information:

The District received authorization to issue \$300 million in general obligation bonds on March 5, 2002. The District issued the full amount of the authorization in four series. The overall debt service structure on the bonds issued under the 2002 Measure D authorization, as originally structured, escalates at 4.2%, on average, and has not changed since the issuance of Series D Bonds in October 2005. Since that time, the Measure D tax rates have gone from \$48.70 to \$44.20 to \$48.40 to \$58.10 per \$100,000 of AV (Assess Valuation). The maximum tax rate target on the 2002 bonds was \$60 per \$100,000 of AV. Preliminary tax base figures from the County indicate that AVs will decline by 7.7% in tax year 2010-11. Based on the preliminary AV provided by the County, the District Staff believes that the Measure D could be in excess of \$65.00 per \$100,000 of AV. District Staff would use an amount of \$1,600,000 from the recent Measure "J" Series "D" bond sale to refund 2002 Measure "D" bonds. This will allow the District to keep the 2010 – 11 tax rates below the tax rate target of \$60 per \$100,000.

Recommendation: Approve proceeds from Measure "J" Series "D" to refund 2002 Measure "D" bonds in an amount not to exceed \$1,600,000 and authorize the Superintendent and the Associate Superintendent for Business Services to execute and deliver any certificates, notices, agreements or other documents that they may deem necessary in order to accomplish the refunding of such 2002 Measure "D" bonds.
