*CI C.11 Approval of Contract for Furniture, Setup and Installation at Dover Elementary School Phase I

Comment:

The construction of the first phase of the reconstruction of Dover Elementary School is nearly complete. The next step for the District is to purchase new furniture for the school. The District has prepared preliminary furnishing criteria with classroom configurations, specialty spaces including pre-school, special education, administration furnishings, library, offices and staff work areas. New furnishings will be comparable to those installed in our other completed elementary sites, most recently for Downer Elementary.

The District engaged in a public bid process, using its preliminary furnishing criteria, to select the vendor for this contract. Public bids were opened on January 6, 2011. Three vendors submitted proposals. They are as follows: Sierra School \$290,282; Young Office \$278,664; and, Contrax Furnishings \$223,986. The lowest responsible vendor is Contrax Furnishings at \$223,986.

Recommendation:

Approve contract for Dover Elementary furniture, setup and installation with the lowest responsive, responsible vendor.

*CI C.12 Kennedy High School Field Building and Field Lighting Project Award of Contract

Comment:

The next step in completing the master plan for limited renovations at Kennedy High School is to finalize work at the main sports field area and bring this facility up to current District standards. This project will provide for field lighting for athletic events and team practices at the George Harris Field at Kennedy High School. In addition, this project includes a permanent building for restrooms, concessions, equipment storage and support spaces for the field area. This project will also provide high quality facilities for community use and joint use with the City of Richmond.

Powell and Partners Architects completed plans and specifications for the project. The District conducted a public bid of the project. There were two bid alternates included in the project for different lighting manufacturers. Bids were opened on January 11, 2011. Thirteen contractors submitted bids. They are included in the table provided.

The lowest responsive, responsible bidder, the sum of the base bid and the lowest bid alternate, is B-Side, Inc. at \$990,000.

Recommendation:

Award contract to the lowest responsive, responsible bidder. It is also recommended that this project be included under the District's Project Labor Agreement (PLA) given that even minimal contract changes will push the construction cost over the PLA threshold of \$1,000,000.

*CI C.13 Ratification and Approval of Engineering Services Contracts

Comment:

Contracts have been initiated by staff using previously qualified consulting, engineering, architectural, or landscape architectural firms to assist in completion of the referenced projects. Many of the firms are already under contract and the staff-initiated work may be an extension of the firm's existing contract with the District. Public contracting laws have been followed in initially qualifying and selecting these professionals.

*CI C.17 Approval of Board Member Attending Conferences:

National School Boards Association Annual Conference, San Francisco National Council on Educating Black Children Convention, Las Vegas

Comment:

Board Bylaw 9250 stipulates members of the board shall be reimbursed for allowable expenses incurred in attending any meetings or in making any trips on official business of the school district when so authorized in advance by the Board of Education. (Education Code 35044) Board member Elaine Merriweather has expressed interest in attending the National School Boards Association (NSBA) Annual Conference, to be held in San Francisco, April 9-11, 2011 and the National Council on Educating Black Children Convention, to be held in Las Vegas, April 28-30, 2011. Expenses including registration, travel, food and lodging are estimated to total approximately \$2,300.00. Funds for Board travel and conference are budgeted and there is sufficient funding within that budget.

Recommendation:

That the Board authorizes attendance to the NSBA Annual Conference and the National Council on Education of Black Children Convention.

*CI C.18 Ivy League Summer Programs: Students from WCCUSD high schools will participate in College Courses and Readiness Programs offered at Ivy League Colleges and Universities

Comment:

The Ivy League connection program has been an integral college awareness program in the West Contra Costa Unified School District for the last four years. Students from DeAnza, El Cerrito, Hercules, Kennedy, Pinole Valley, Richmond and Middle College high schools participate in a rigorous screening process in order to gain acceptance into a summer program at an Ivy League university. The Ivy League program has grown tremendously through the contributions of benefactors and corporations vested in providing educational opportunities for our students. This summer, West Contra Costa Unified School District will be sending thirty-five students to various Ivy League universities including Brown University, Cornell University, Columbia University, University of Pennsylvania, Vanderbilt University, and Yale

University. The District pays the travel costs and also provides chaperones, for an estimated cost of \$60,000 for 2011. Private contributions fund the program costs at each school. The Ivy League Connection promotes the college going culture in WCCUSD as participants in the program share their experiences with elementary and middle school students throughout the year and participate with alumni from the Ivy League schools.

Board members Madeline Kronenberg and Charles Ramsey have acted as the fund raisers and program administrators for the Ivy League Connection since its inception in 2006. The District has paid for travel for Ms. Kronenberg and Mr. Ramsey so that all the funds raised from private contributions can be used for direct program expenses. Their presence at these institutions has resulted in securing scholarships for WCCUSD students.

Additionally, their presence at the universities has resulted in the waiving of application fees (Yale, Brown, and Cornell) – a savings of more than \$2000. Since the program began in 2006, Ms. Kronenberg and Mr. Ramsey have raised well over \$700,000 for the program. The cost for Ms. Kronenberg and Mr. Ramsey to travel to the east coast this summer is just over \$7,000.

Mr. Ramsey's and Ms. Kronenberg's presence at these schools has also brought about new opportunities for WCCUSD students. WCCUSD students would not be going to Yale this summer if they had not set up meetings with the Deans of the summer programs.

Recommendation:

That the Board approve both the travel for Board Members Kronenberg and Ramsey and the costs for the 2010 Ivy League Connection program.

*CI C.19 Lake School Operation for 2011-12

Comment:

In February 2009 and after an extensive process, the Board approved the closure of eight schools over the three year period of time. Lake Elementary school was one of the schools that was to be closed at the end of the 2008-09 school year. At the February 17, 2009 meeting, the San Pablo City Council approved a resolution that provided the funding to keep Lake Elementary open for 2009-10 and 2010-2011. At the January 10, 2011 meeting, the San Pablo City Council approved a resolution that will provide funding to keep Lake Elementary open for 2011-12 school year while the City and the District develop a long-term plan for extending the partnership between the City and District to keep Lake beyond the 2011-12 school year.

Recommendation:

That the Board accept the commitment of funding from the City of San Pablo to keep Lake open for the 2011-12 school year and direct the Superintendent to continue the work on the longer-term agreement between the City and the District.

F. ACTION ITEMS

* F.1 Helms Middle School and DeAnza High School: Persistently Lowest-Achieving Schools and the School Improvement Process

Comment:

Federal and state laws and guidance associated with the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (AARA), the School Improvement Grant (SIG) program, and state statute require California to identify the state's persistently lowest-achieving schools and require the lowest 5% to implement one of four school intervention models: turnaround, transformation, restart, and school closure.

In March 2010, the California Department of Education designated Helm's Middle School and DeAnza High School on its list of the 5% persistently lowest-achieving schools in the state of California.

There is SIG funding available for schools who implement one of the designated intervention models. Each school is eligible to apply for \$50,000 - \$2 million.

Staff is recommending that the Turnaround model be implemented at both Helms Middle School and DeAnza High School for the 2011-12 school year. SIG applications will be submitted to the California Department of Education for Helms and DeAnza.

Staff will provide background information for the recommendation.

* F.2 El Cerrito High School Fields Phase I Construction Award of Contract

Comment:

The next step in completing the full reconstruction of El Cerrito High School is to build the fields and courts at the area which has been used as the campus temporary housing since 2005. The area has been cleared and is ready for reconstruction of the fields and courts. The scope of work includes full-size baseball, softball, and soccer fields. The project also includes construction of 5 tennis courts, and would replace the courts originally constructed by the City of El Cerrito. The work includes associated site work, utilities, grading, site paving, fencing, gates, dugouts, batting cage, lighting, and site furnishings.

In order to accommodate the intensive use of the fields at this site, the project construction documents have been updated to include a bid alternate which would substitute artificial turf for the grass fields included in the base bid. The bid alternate costs are included in the summary of bids below. The bid alternate cost is the net increase in cost to install artificial turf fields.

WLC Architects has prepared plans and specifications for the project. The District conducted a public bid process for the project. Bids were opened on January 11, 2011. Eleven contractors submitted bids. They are included in the table provided.

The lowest responsive, responsible bidder with the base bid and alternate is Michael Paul Corporation, at \$3,749,000.

* F.3 Shining Crescent Charter School Petition

Comment:

On November 18, 2010, the petitioner submitted to West Contra Costa Unified School District a petition for a charter school known as Shining Crescent Charter School ("Charter School"). Pursuant to the Charter Schools Act of 1992 (the "Act"), Education Code section 47600 *et seq.*, the Legislature has charged local school boards with the responsibility for reviewing and acting on petitions by charter schools.

Staff has reviewed the charter petition ("Petition") for the establishment (for five years) of the Shining Crescent Charter School ("Charter School"). The Charter School is governed by a nonprofit public benefit corporation, but the District would be responsible for oversight of the Charter School. As presented in the Petition, the Charter School expects to serve approximately 302 students in grades K through 8 in its first year of operation (2011-2012), increasing to 312 students in the second year of operation (2012-2013) and 345 students at full implementation, in year five (2015-2016). (Petition, Appendix N: Budget Assumptions.) Petitioners intend the Charter School to provide "a rigorous standards-based education" in a setting that will attract "children from Africa, the Middle East and South Asia: India-Pakistan-Afghanistan-Bangladesh and surrounding areas." (Petition, p. 13.) The Charter School's stated mission is "to contribute to building a diverse, virtuous and moral America by helping children to understand their stewardship role in the world, embedding in them a sense of care, responsibility, love, tolerance, and cooperation." (Petition, p. 5.) Petitioners further identify a need to "help students especially from South Asia, Africa and the Middle East, integrate into American society, while retaining their identity." (Petition, p. 5.)

Submission of a charter petition is governed by the requirements of Education Code section 47605 and 47607. Education Code section § 47605(b) requires the Board, within 30 days of receiving a petition, to hold a public hearing to consider the level of support for the petition. The public hearing was held on December 8, 2010. "After review of the petition and the public hearing, the governing board of the school district shall either grant or deny the charter within 60 days of receipt of the petition, provided, however, that the date may be extended by an additional 30 days if both parties agree to the extension." Education Code section § 47605(b) A written agreement was made between Shining Crescent Charter School and West Contra Costa Unified School District to defer the public hearing until January 19, 2011.

The Act states that a school district governing board considering whether to grant a charter petition "shall be guided by the intent of the Legislature that charter schools are and should become an integral part of the California educational system and that establishment of charter schools should be encouraged." (Ed. Code, § 47605(b).) With this legislative intent in mind, the governing board must grant a charter "if it is satisfied that granting the charter is consistent with sound educational practice." (Ed. Code, § 47605(b).)

Upon receipt of the petition, components of the petition were assigned to various staff members of the District for review and analysis based on individual areas of expertise. Review of the different components of the charter petition was allocated as follows: Educational Program, Linda Jackson, Executive Director K-12 Schools, Lyn Potter, Director Educational Services, Sonja Neely-Johnson, Harlan Kerr, Sherry Bell, Susan Dunlap, Coordinators Educational Services; Special Education, Steve Collins, SELPA Director; Fiscal/Budget, Martin Coyne, Executive Director, CPA; Human Resources/Employee Issues, Patricia Calvert, Director of Human Resources; Legal/Operational, Ed Sklar, Lozano Smith Attorneys at Law.

Staff and legal counsel have reviewed the Petition and prepared the Staff Written Findings Regarding Shining Crescent Charter School Petition ("Findings"), which are attached. Staff's analysis of the petition includes a review of its educational program, fiscal and governance structure, student admissions and discipline, labor and personnel issues, facilities and legal issues.

The pages immediately following the précis contain proposed findings prepared by District staff and legal counsel condensing the remaining areas of concern, the resolution of those concerns, and Staff's ultimate recommendation regarding those areas.

Recommendation:

Staff recommends that the Board deny the charter petition on the following grounds pursuant to Education Code section 47605:

- 1. The Charter School presents an unsound educational program for the students to be enrolled in the Charter School. (Ed. Code § 47605(b)(1).)
- 2. The Petitioners are demonstrably unlikely to successfully implement the program set forth in the Petition. (Ed. Code § 47605(b)(2).)
- 3. The Petition does not contain the number of signatures required by Education Code section 47605, subdivision (a)(1)(A) or (a)(1)(B).
- 4. The Petition does not contain reasonably comprehensive descriptions of certain required elements set forth in Education Code section 47605, subdivisions (b)(5)(A-P).

In order to deny the Petition on the grounds set forth above, Education Code section 47605, subdivision (b) requires the Governing Board to make "written factual findings, specific to the particular Petition, setting forth specific facts to support one or more" of the grounds for denying the charter. Staff recommends that the Board adopt the proposed findings of fact, attached, as its own. Staff further recommends that the Board deny the Petition.

Background Information:

The next step in completing the master plan for limited renovations at Kennedy High School is to finalize work at the main sports field area and bring this facility up to current District standards. This project will provide for field lighting for athletic events and team practices at the George Harris Field at Kennedy High School. In addition, this project includes a permanent building for restrooms, concessions, equipment storage and support spaces for the field area. This project will also provide high quality facilities for community use and joint use with the City of Richmond.

Powell and Partners Architects completed plans and specifications for the project. The District conducted a public bid of the project. There were two bid alternates included in the project for different lighting manufacturers. Bids were opened on January 11, 2011. Thirteen contractors submitted bids. They are included in the table below.

The lowest responsive, responsible bidder, the sum of the base bid and the lowest bid alternate, is B-Side, Inc. at \$990,000.

Recommendation:

Award contract to the lowest responsive, responsible bidder. It is also recommended that this project be included under the District's Project Labor Agreement (PLA) given that even minimal contract changes will push the construction cost over the PLA threshold of \$1,000,000.

Ivy League Summer Programs: Students from WCCUSD high schools will participate in

College Courses and Readiness Programs offered at Ivy League Colleges and Universities

Background Information:

The Ivy League connection program has been an integral college awareness program in the West Contra Costa Unified School District for the last four years. Students from DeAnza, El Cerrito, Hercules, Kennedy, Pinole Valley, Richmond and Middle College high schools participate in a rigorous screening process in order to gain acceptance into a summer program at an Ivy League university. The Ivy League program has grown tremendously through the contributions of benefactors and corporations vested in providing educational opportunities for our students. This summer, West Contra Costa Unified School District will be sending thirty-five students to various Ivy League universities including Brown University, Cornell University, Columbia University, University of Pennsylvania, Vanderbilt University, and Yale University. The District pays the travel costs and also provides chaperones, for an estimated cost of \$60,000 for 2011. Private contributions fund the program costs at each school. The Ivy League Connection promotes the college going culture in WCCUSD as participants in the program share their experiences with elementary and middle school students throughout the year and participate with alumni from the Ivy League schools.

Board members Madeline Kronenberg and Charles Ramsey have acted as the fund raisers and program administrators for the Ivy League Connection since its inception in 2006. The District has paid for travel for Ms. Kronenberg and Mr. Ramsey so that all the funds raised from private contributions can be used for direct program expenses. Their presence at these institutions has resulted in securing scholarships for WCCUSD students.

Additionally, their presence at the universities has resulted in the waiving of application fees (Yale, Brown, and Cornell) – a savings of more than \$2000. Since the program began in 2006, Ms. Kronenberg and Mr. Ramsey have raised well over \$700,000 for the program. The cost for Ms. Kronenberg and Mr. Ramsey to travel to the east coast this summer is just over \$7,000.

Mr. Ramsey's and Ms. Kronenberg's presence at these schools has also brought about new opportunities for WCCUSD students. WCCUSD students would not be going to Yale this summer if they had not set up meetings with the Deans of the summer programs.

Recommendation: That the Board approve both the travel for Board Members Kronenberg and Ramsey and the costs for the 2010 Ivy League Connection program.

El Cerrito High School Fields Phase I Construction Award of Contract

Background Information:

Subject:

The next step in completing the full reconstruction of El Cerrito High School is to build the fields and courts at the area which has been used as the campus temporary housing since 2005. The area has been cleared and is ready for reconstruction of the fields and courts. The scope of work includes full-size baseball, softball, and soccer fields. The project also includes construction of 5 tennis courts, and would replace the courts originally constructed by the City of El Cerrito. The work includes associated site work, utilities, grading, site paving, fencing, gates, dugouts, batting cage, lighting, and site furnishings.

In order to accommodate the intensive use of the fields at this site, the project construction documents have been updated to include a bid alternate which would substitute artificial turf for the grass fields included in the base bid. The bid alternate costs are included in the summary of bids below. The bid alternate cost is the net increase in cost to install artificial turf fields.

WLC Architects has prepared plans and specifications for the project. The District conducted a public bid process for the project. Bids were opened on January 11, 2011. Eleven contractors submitted bids. They are included in the table below.

The lowest responsive, responsible bidder with the base bid and alternate is Michael Paul Corporation, at \$3,749,000.

Subject: Shining Crescent Charter School Petition

Background Information:

On November 18, 2010, the petitioner submitted to West Contra Costa Unified School District a petition for a charter school known as Shining Crescent Charter School ("Charter School"). Pursuant to the Charter Schools Act of 1992 (the "Act"), Education Code section 47600 *et seq.*, the Legislature has charged local school boards with the responsibility for reviewing and acting on petitions by charter schools.

Staff has reviewed the charter petition ("Petition") for the establishment (for five years) of the Shining Crescent Charter School ("Charter School"). The Charter School is governed by a nonprofit public benefit corporation, but the District would be responsible for oversight of the Charter School. As presented in the Petition, the Charter School expects to serve approximately 302 students in grades K through 8 in its first year of operation (2011-2012), increasing to 312 students in the second year of operation (2012-2013) and 345 students at full implementation, in year five (2015-2016). (Petition, Appendix N: Budget Assumptions.) Petitioners intend the Charter School to provide "a rigorous standards-based education" in a setting that will attract "children from Africa, the Middle East and South Asia: India-Pakistan-Afghanistan-Bangladesh and surrounding areas." (Petition, p. 13.) The Charter School's stated mission is "to contribute to building a diverse, virtuous and moral America by helping children to understand their stewardship role in the world, embedding in them a sense of care, responsibility, love, tolerance, and cooperation." (Petition, p. 5.) Petitioners further identify a need to "help students especially from South Asia, Africa and the Middle East, integrate into American society, while retaining their identity." (Petition, p. 5.)

Submission of a charter petition is governed by the requirements of Education Code section 47605 and 47607. Education Code section § 47605(b) requires the Board, within 30 days of receiving a petition, to hold a public hearing to consider the level of support for the petition. The public hearing was held on December 8, 2010. "After review of the petition and the public hearing, the governing board of the school district shall either grant or deny the charter within 60 days of receipt of the petition, provided, however, that the date may be extended by an additional 30 days if both parties agree to the extension." Education Code section § 47605(b) A written

agreement was made between Shining Crescent Charter School and West Contra Costa Unified School District to defer the public hearing until January 19, 2011.

The Act states that a school district governing board considering whether to grant a charter petition "shall be guided by the intent of the Legislature that charter schools are and should become an integral part of the California educational system and that establishment of charter schools should be encouraged." (Ed. Code, § 47605(b).) With this legislative intent in mind, the governing board must grant a charter "if it is satisfied that granting the charter is consistent with sound educational practice." (Ed. Code, § 47605(b).)

Upon receipt of the petition, components of the petition were assigned to various staff members of the District for review and analysis based on individual areas of expertise. Review of the different components of the charter petition was allocated as follows: Educational Program, Linda Jackson, Executive Director K-12 Schools, Lyn Potter, Director Educational Services, Sonja Neely-Johnson, Harlan Kerr, Sherry Bell, Susan Dunlap, Coordinators Educational Services; Special Education, Steve Collins, SELPA Director; Fiscal/Budget, Martin Coyne, Executive Director, CPA; Human Resources/Employee Issues, Patricia Calvert, Director of Human Resources; Legal/Operational, Ed Sklar, Lozano Smith Attorneys at Law.

Staff and legal counsel have reviewed the Petition and prepared the Staff Written Findings Regarding Shining Crescent Charter School Petition ("Findings"), which are attached. Staff's analysis of the petition includes a review of its educational program, fiscal and governance structure, student admissions and discipline, labor and personnel issues, facilities and legal issues.

The pages immediately following this précis contain proposed findings prepared by District staff and legal counsel condensing the remaining areas of concern, the resolution of those concerns, and Staff's ultimate recommendation regarding those areas.

Recommendation:

Staff recommends that the Board deny the charter petition on the following grounds pursuant to Education Code section 47605:

- 1. The Charter School presents an unsound educational program for the students to be enrolled in the Charter School. (Ed. Code § 47605(b)(1).)
- 2. The Petitioners are demonstrably unlikely to successfully implement the program set forth in the Petition. (Ed. Code § 47605(b)(2).)
- 3. The Petition does not contain the number of signatures required by Education Code section 47605, subdivision (a)(1)(A) or (a)(1)(B).
- 4. The Petition does not contain reasonably comprehensive descriptions of certain required elements set forth in Education Code section 47605, subdivisions (b)(5)(A-P).

In order to deny the Petition on the grounds set forth above, Education Code section 47605, subdivision (b) requires the Governing Board to make "written factual findings, specific to the particular Petition, setting forth specific facts to support one or more" of the grounds for denying the charter. Staff recommends that the Board adopt the proposed findings of fact, attached, as its own. Staff further recommends that the Board deny the Petition.

STAFF REPORT AND PROPOSED FINDINGS OF FACT REGARDING SHINING CRESCENT CHARTER PETITION

Introduction

The West Contra Costa Unified School District ("District") received a charter petition ("Petition") on November 18, 2010, from the Shining Crescent Foundation, Inc., a California nonprofit public benefit corporation. The Petition proposes the creation of a charter school to be called the Shining Crescent Charter School ("Shining Crescent" or "Charter School"). The Petition proposes a Charter term of five (5) years.

As presented in the Petition, the Charter School expects to serve approximately 302 students in grades K through 8 in its first year of operation (2011-2012), increasing to 312 students in the second year of operation (2012-2013) and 345 students at full implementation, in year five (2015-2016). (Petition, Appendix N: Budget Assumptions.) Petitioners intend the Charter School to provide "a rigorous standards-based education" in a setting that will attract "children from Africa, the Middle East and South Asia: India-Pakistan-Afghanistan-Bangladesh and surrounding areas." (Petition, p. 13.) The Charter School's stated mission is "to contribute to building a diverse, virtuous and moral America by helping children to understand their stewardship role in the world, embedding in them a sense of care, responsibility, love, tolerance, and cooperation." (Petition, p. 5.) Petitioners further identify a need to "help students especially from South Asia, Africa and the Middle East, integrate into American society, while retaining their identity." (Petition, p. 5.)

Petitioners base their assertion that a school such as Shining Crescent is needed on the premise that students from Africa, South Asian and the Middle East "have unique social, cultural, moral, and religious values and are used to segregated societies." (Petition, p. 9.) Other comments in the Petition make reference to the difficulties recent immigrants from the targeted populations have in adjusting to a society which permits "the free mixing of the sexes" and the particular problems faced by children transitioning "from segregated societies to integrated societies." (Petition, p. 9.) According to Petitioners, "integration and the mixing of the genders is a great shock" to immigrants from Africa, South Asia, and the Middle East. (Petition, p. 9.) Although the Petition does not include any supporting documentation or research-based results to support their claims, Petitioners also assert that students from the targeted populations run the risk of religious fanaticism or gang involvement if they are not provided with a "rigorous" educational setting.

Review of the information included in the Petition which describes the backgrounds of the Charter School's founders and proposed Board members reflects a group of parents and community members with an impressive array of expertise in business, science, and community affairs. Further, it is clear that Petitioners are excellent, caring parents; however, review of the Petition makes clear that they lack the breadth of educational experience necessary to successfully implement an undertaking of this scope. District

staff concludes that there are significant portions of the Petition that have not been adequately developed and that, based upon these omissions, the Petition should be denied. Time and cost preclude staff from discussing all of the Petition's defects in detail in this report. Instead, the report addresses only the most glaring deficiencies. In sum, Petitioners have not provided evidence of a feasible educational program that can be successfully implemented. The deficiencies on the face of the Petition are simply too significant to permit approval.

This report sets forth findings based upon a review of the Petition and its appendices by District staff and legal counsel. A number of significant concerns raised by staff are discussed in detail, below.

Overview of Charter Petitions Generally

The Charter Schools Act of 1992 ("Act") governs the creation of charter schools in the State of California. The Act states that a school district governing board considering whether to grant a charter petition "shall be guided by the intent of the Legislature that charter schools are and should become an integral part of the California educational system and that establishment of charter schools should be encouraged." (Ed. Code § 47605(b).) With this legislative intent in mind, the governing board must grant a charter "if it is satisfied that granting the charter is consistent with sound educational practice." (Ed. Code § 47605(b).) The governing board may not deny a petition unless it sets forth specific facts to support one, or more, of the following five findings:

- 1. The charter school presents an unsound educational program for the students to be enrolled in the charter school.
- 2. The petitioners are demonstrably unlikely to successfully implement the program set forth in the petition.
- 3. The petition does not contain the number of signatures required by Education Code section 47605, subdivision (a)(1)(A) or (a)(1)(B).
- 4. The petition does not contain an affirmation of certain specific conditions set forth in Education Code section 47605, subdivision (d), including that the charter school: (1) will be nonsectarian in its admission policies, employment practices, and all other operations; (2) will not charge tuition; and (3) will not discriminate against any student on the basis of the characteristics set forth in Education Code section 220.
- 5. The petition does not contain reasonably comprehensive descriptions of certain elements in its program and operations as set forth in Education Code section 47605, subdivision (b)(5)(A-P), which describes the following sixteen separate elements that must be addressed in every charter petition:

- A. A description of the educational program of the school, designed, among other things, to identify those whom the school is attempting to educate, what it means to be an "educated person" in the 21st century, and how learning best occurs. The goals identified in that program shall include the objective of enabling students to become self-motivated, competent, and lifelong learners.
- B. The measurable student outcomes identified for use by the charter school. "Student outcomes" means the extent to which all students of the school demonstrate that they have attained the skills, knowledge, and attitudes specified as goals in the school's educational program.
- C. The method by which student progress in meeting those student outcomes is to be measured.
- D. The governance structure of the school, including, but not limited to, the process to be followed by the school to ensure parental involvement.
- E. The qualifications to be met by individuals to be employed by the school.
- F. The procedures that the school will follow to ensure the health and safety of students and staff.
- G. The means by which the school will achieve a racial and ethnic balance among its students that is reflective of the general population residing within the territorial jurisdiction of the school district to which the charter petition is submitted.
- H. Admission requirements, if applicable.
- I. The manner in which annual, independent, financial audits will be conducted, which will employ generally accepted accounting principles, and the manner in which audit exceptions and deficiencies will be resolved to the satisfaction of the chartering authority.
- J. The procedures by which students can be suspended or expelled.
- K. The manner by which staff members of the charter schools will be covered by the State Teachers' Retirement System, the Public Employees' Retirement System, or federal social security.
- L. The public school attendance alternatives for students residing within the school district who choose not to attend charter schools.
- M. A description of the rights of any employee of the school district upon leaving the employment of the school district to work in a charter school,

and of any rights of return to the school district after employment at a charter school.

- N. The procedures to be followed by the charter school and the entity granting the charter to resolve disputes relating to provisions of the charter.
- O. A declaration whether or not the charter school will be deemed the exclusive public school employer of the employees of the charter school for the purposes of the Educational Employment Relations Act ("EERA" or "Rodda Act").
- P. A description of the procedures to be used if the charter school closes. These procedures must ensure a final audit of the school to determine the disposition of all assets and liabilities of the charter school, including plans for disposing of any net assets and for the maintenance and transfer of student records.

Charter school petitions are also required to include discussion of the impact on the chartering district, including, the facilities to be utilized by the school, the manner in which administrative services will be provided, potential civil liabilities for the chartering school district, and a three year projected operational budget. (Ed. Code § 47605(g).)

Recommended Grounds for Denying the Charter Petition

Staff recommends that the Board deny the Petition on the following grounds, pursuant to Education Code section 47605:

- 1. The Charter School presents an unsound educational program for the students to be enrolled in the Charter School. (Ed. Code § 47605(b)(1).)
- 2. The Petitioners are demonstrably unlikely to successfully implement the program set forth in the Petition. (Ed. Code § 47605(b)(2).)
- 3. The Petition does not contain the number of signatures required by Education Code section 47605, subdivision (a)(1)(A) or (a)(1)(B).
- 4. The Petition does not contain reasonably comprehensive descriptions of certain required elements set forth in Education Code section 47605, subdivisions (b)(5)(A-P).

In order to deny the Petition on the grounds set forth above, Education Code section 47605, subdivision (b), requires the Governing Board to make "written factual findings, specific to the particular Petition, setting forth specific facts to support one or more" of the grounds for denying the charter. Staff recommends that the Board adopt the proposed

findings of fact, set forth below, as its own findings. Staff further recommends that the Board deny the Petition.

Please note that these findings of fact have been grouped for convenience under the aforementioned grounds for denial of a charter petition however, certain findings of fact may support more than one ground for denial.

Proposed Findings of Fact

Finding 1: Shining Crescent Presents an Unsound Educational Program for Pupils to be Enrolled at the Charter School

As noted above, Petitioners intend that the Charter School's "target population" will be "children from Africa, the Middle East and South Asia: India-Pakistan-Afghanistan-Bangladesh and surrounding areas." (Petition, p. 13.) Based upon the District's experience, the Charter School should expect that the student population that will be enrolled in the Charter School will present a wide range of learning abilities and skills, including low-achieving students, high-achieving students, special education students and English Language Learner ("ELL") students. However, as described below, the Petition fails to adequately describe or address the specific educational interests, backgrounds, or challenges of the diverse student population it proposes to educate. Specifically, the Charter School presents an unsound educational program for the students to be enrolled at the Charter School, for the following reasons:

- A. The Petition does not sufficiently describe the proposed curriculum or teaching methods to be employed at the Charter School.
- B. The Petition does not include detailed plans for low achieving and at-risk students.
- C. The Petition does not include a detailed plan for meeting the needs of its high-achieving students.
- D. The Petition does not adequately address how the Charter School will modify its educational program to educate ELL students.
- E. The Petition does not address how the Charter School's educational program will serve special education students.
- A. The Petition does not sufficiently describe the proposed curriculum or teaching methods to be employed at the Charter School.

The description of the educational program of the Charter School should include the instructional approach that the charter school will utilize including, but not limited to the curriculum and teaching methods. (Ed. Code § 47605(b)(5).) The Petition fails to

present an adequate educational program for both its general program and its programs for special groups such as special education students and ELL students, as described in detail below.

Classrooms, Class Sizes, Number of Teaching Staff. From the scant information presented in the Petition, it is not possible to determine how many classrooms the proposed Charter School will have, what the student-teacher ratio in each classroom will be, or how class assignments would be made for the 19 certificated teachers that Petitioners intend to hire in the first year of the Charter School's operation. (Petition, p.14) A table at page 14 appears to show 302 students distributed over nine grade levels, but fails to indicate how many classrooms at each grade level the Charter School is proposing to operate. For example, it is unclear whether Petitioners are proposing a single Kindergarten class of 48 students, or if Petitioners intend to have two or more classes at the K through 3 grade levels in order to comply with Class Size Reduction enrollment limits. If that is the case, the Charter School may be proposing a school with 13 classrooms (two each at grades K though 3, and a single classroom for grades 4 through 8.) This calculation still does not account for the need to hire 19 certificated teachers. Perhaps Petitioners intend to hire single-subject teachers for the upper grades? Without a clear description of the classrooms, student-teacher ratios, and the distribution of teaching assignments, it is not possible for the District to adequately evaluate the Charter School's proposed instructional program.

Further confusion is presented in the Petition with regard to the proposed bell schedule and instructional periods. At page 10, Petitioners state that "[e]ach subject matter will be taught in a two-hour time block. However, this contradicts the information regarding the bell schedule as described in Appendix O, which shows eight fifty-minute periods each day. Furthermore, there is no weekly schedule that provides information as to what subjects will be taught at each grade level for each school day.

2. Instructional Program, Curriculum, Teaching Strategies. The Petition appears to propose an educational program that blends "the teaching methodologies of eastern culture with modern, western teaching techniques." (Petition, p.11.) The Petition includes descriptions of various educational systems throughout the world emphasizing concepts such as respect, discipline, and self-control. (Petition, p. 11.) This discussion would perhaps have been more appropriately included in the "Educational Philosophy" portion of the Petition at page 13; unfortunately the narrative does little to shed light on the proposed instructional program at the Charter School or explain how teachers will implement the various pedagogical approaches described in the Petition.

Further the Petition does not explain how teaching staff will develop and implement specific lesson plans and curriculum. No sample lesson plans are included, and other than frequent references to Recommended Literature, Kindergarten through Twelfth Grade, no teaching materials are identified. (Petition, Appendix F) Petitioners state that "curriculums are and will be based on the California State Frameworks and Academic Content Standards of California Public Schools". (Petition, Appendix F.) However, a list of academic content standards by grade levels does not indicate how standards will be

linked to instructional practices in order to ensure mastery of each core curricular area. The Petition should, at a minimum, identify the proposed teaching materials and include an outline of the curriculum for each core academic subject area at one or more grade levels.

With regard to foreign language instruction, Petitioners propose to teach Arabic, Punjabi, and Urdu/Hindi. (Petition, p. 12.) Petitioners further assert that the Charter School "will be the first in the District, rather in the State to introduce new foreign languages <u>at an early stage</u>." (Petition, p. 12.) However, other than citing from a series of studies supporting the early introduction of foreign language study, the Petition contains no description of its proposed language programs. Petitioners do not indicate at what grade level foreign language instruction will begin, how often foreign language will be taught during the regular school week, or what qualifications the Charter School will require of foreign language staff. Again, no teaching materials or instructional methodologies for teaching languages are identified in the Petition and no sample language lessons are provided.

In sum, the instructional and curricular components of the Charter School, as described in the Petition, present an unsound educational program for the students to be enrolled in the school.

B. The Petition does not include detailed plans for serving low-achieving or at-risk students.

The Petition notes that the Charter School intends to "maintain a culture of high expectations for all students" and will "work to ensure that no individual student falls behind." (Petition, p. 18.) However, the Petition fails to adequately describe how the Charter School will identify and respond to the needs of pupils who are not achieving at expected levels.

The Petition provides that a student will be designated as "low-achieving" if the student "falls below the 50th percentile on the adopted standardized test and/or falls below learning behavior, language acquisition, and fine and gross motor skills in comparison with the peer group." (Petition, p.19.) This approach for identifying low-achieving students is problematic. First, the Petition does not indicate which standardized test is the "adopted standardized test" that the Charter School intends to use. Additionally, there is no information provided as to when students will be designated as low-achieving on the basis of standardized tests as opposed to, or in addition to "learning behavior, language acquisition, and fine and gross motor skills in comparison with the peer group." Likewise, the Petition indicates that the Charter School will identify "at-risk" students as those students "who achieve at or below the 40th percentile on adopted state tests, who may or may not qualify for special education, and whose achievement potential is not being realized." (Petition, p. 19.) Again, the Petition does not identify the testing measures that will be used to identify at-risk students, and does not set out any method by which it intends to determine whether a student's achievement potential is being realized. (Petition, p. 19.)

The Petition broadly states that the Charter School will use cooperative learning in flexible groups and will emphasize students of all abilities working closely together in group settings. (Petition, p. 19.) Despite its well-meaning intentions, the Petition only briefly references any other specific behavioral interventions or services that the Charter School plans to employ in order to assist low-achieving and at-risk students, and does not describe those interventions or services in any detail. Moreover, the Petition makes no reference to scaffold instruction, types of learning materials, pre-teaching, re-teaching, or any of the other standard learning strategies used to address the needs of low performing students.

Although Petitioners note that low-achieving or at-risk students will be served through a Student Study Team ("SST") process, the Petition does not include any information regarding what specific assessments and observations will be conducted through that SST process, who will conduct them, what extra attention or intervention services identified students may receive, who will provide the services, how often the services will be provided, what curriculum will be used, or how it will be determined whether interventions are effective. (Petition, p. 19.)

In sum, the Petition fails to present a sound educational program for low-achieving and at-risk students.

C. The Petition does not include a detailed plan for meeting the needs of its high-achieving students.

While the Petition identifies broad intentions to provide opportunities for high-achieving students, it does not include any descriptions of particular services or programs that will be available to high-achieving students, or how such services or programs will be implemented. (Petition, p.19; Appendix E.) Specifically, the Petition refers to GATEidentified students; however, there is no information on how students will be so identified. (Petition, p.19; Appendix E.) Moreover, the Petition indicates that flexible groupings and after-school enrichment opportunities will be available to GATE-identified students, but does not describe those programs or opportunities in any depth. Moreover, the budget included in the Petition is so deficient, that it is not possible to determine whether it includes funding for GATE programs. The Petition does not include any sample lesson plans or examples of how the Charter School will modify its curriculum to meet the needs of high-achieving students. Based on the scant information provided, the District is left to guess at what Petitioners mean when they assert that teachers will provide gifted students with a "qualitatively differentiated curriculum that stresses higher-order thinking, concept learning, and cross-curricular study." (Petition, p. 19.) Without further information, the District cannot adequately assess whether Petitioners will be able to meet the needs of high-achieving students.

D. The Petition does not adequately address how the Charter School will educate ELL students.

According to the California Department of Education, all federal requirements and some state requirements for English Language Learner ("ELL") programs apply to charter schools. Reviews under the State's Categorical Program Monitoring process are conducted in the same manner for charter schools as for other public schools. Overall, charter schools are not exempt from meeting the educational needs of ELL students. Moreover, Petitioners must have a plan for achieving "a racial and ethnic balance among its students that is reflective of the general population residing within the territorial jurisdiction of the school district to which the charter petition is submitted." (Ed. Code § 47605(b) (5)(G).)

A review of demographic data for the District shows that, for the 2009-2010 school year, 9,821, or 33% of District's students were English Language Learners. Accordingly, Petitioners should reasonably expect a similar percentage of ELL students to be enrolled in the Charter School. Given their projected first year enrollment of 302 students, the Charter School should be prepared to meet the needs of approximately 100 ELL students. However, other than a general assertion that the Charter School "will meet all applicable legal requirements" for ELL students (Petition, p.19), the Petition lacks any substantive discussion of the programs and services that the Charter School intends to offer to its ELL students and how Petitioners intend to meet their legal obligations in educating those students. (Petition, pp.19-20.) Specifically, the information provided in the Petition raises the following areas of concern regarding the Charter School's plan for educating its ELL students:

- 1. *Identification*. In identifying ELL students, the Petition indicates that the California English Language Development Test ("CELDT") will be administered to students with a home language other than English, but does not indicate what score on that assessment identifies the student as an English Learner. Further, the Charter School's plan for identification, placement, and reassessment of ELLs includes no formative assessment tools. Neither does the Petition describe the different levels of English Language placement or the services and/or programs that will be available to ELL students at each of the levels.
- 2. Reclassification. With regard to its proposed process for the reclassification of ELL students, the Petition provides that the Charter School will utilize "one or more" of the listed reclassification criteria; however, state regulations require that all listed criteria be used. Further, the reclassification criteria do not indicate which measurement of basic skills will be used. (Petition, p. 20.)

Additionally, it does not appear that the Charter School intends to conduct its ELL reclassification and annual reviews using a Language Review Team ("LRT") process, which is required under state and federal Categorical Program Review, if the Charter School intends to apply for federal Title III-NCLB funding, or state Economic Impact Aid--Limited English Proficiency ("EIA-LEP") funding.¹ Specifically, the LRT process

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¹ We note that the budget provided by Petitioners does not indicate whether the Charter School intends to apply for funding available through participation in federal programming, including Title I and Title III/LEP. (Petition, Appendix N)

is designed to ensure that each ELL student is making appropriate progress and is appropriately placed. Reclassified Fluent English Proficient ("RFEP") students must also be evaluated twice each year, for two years following their RFEP designation, to ensure that they are receiving adequate support for transitioning into the mainstream classroom after termination of targeted ELD support. Finally, those elements of the Petition describing "Measurable Student Outcomes" and "Methods of Assessment of Student Outcomes" (Petition, p. 21-24) do not address how English Language Learners' progress towards fluency or growth in academic subject areas will be measured.

3. Curriculum and Instruction. The Petition fails to describe any specialized curriculum, or other specialized materials that would be available to ELL. Moreover, there is no discussion in the Petition as to how ELD instruction will be delivered to students. With regard to staffing needs for ELLs, the Petition makes no mention of requiring special competency or certification, such as CLAD or BCLAD, to meet the needs of English Language Learners. It is not clear whether classroom teachers must be qualified to provide English Language Development ("ELD") instruction, and if so, how ELD will be delivered in the classroom setting. Although the Petition states that classroom teachers will be required to have training in Specifically Designed Academic Instruction in English ("SDAIE") strategies, it does not provide any specific examples of how SDAIE or other strategies will be implemented throughout the day by classroom teachers (Petition, p. 40.) Lastly, the Petition does not address how ELL students will be provided the necessary support in their core curriculum classes such as English Language Arts, Math, Science, and History.

Overall, Petitioners provide an insufficient description of how English Language Learners will be supported and do not have a sound and realistic plan for meeting their legal obligations to this subgroup of learners.

- E. The Petition does not address how the Charter School's educational program will serve special education students.
- 1. Overview. Other than broad statements that Petitioners intend to comply with all applicable laws regarding the provision of special education to Charter School students, the Petition does not describe the Charter School's plan for ensuring that Charter School students receive all special education and related services to which they are entitled. (Petition, pp. 21.) The absence of any substantive plan for special education in the Petition is strong evidence that the Charter School's founders do not have a sound and realistic plan for meeting their legal responsibilities under both the Individuals with Disabilities Education Improvement Act of 2004 ("IDEA") and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 ("Section 504").

As an initial example of Petitioners' misunderstanding of special education law, the Petition states that the Charter School has "become an independent LEA and joined the Contra Costa County SELPA pursuant to Education Code Section 47641(a)." (Petition, p. 21) This is not the case. SELPA administrators have indicated that they are

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unacquainted with Petitioners and have never been approached by Charter School representatives concerning an application for SELPA membership. The Charter School's intentions with regard to the provision of special education services are further confused by language elsewhere in the Petition stating that "after becoming an independent LEA [the Charter School] will join the Contra Costa County SELPA pursuant to Education Code Section 47641(a)." (Petition, p. 20) These contradictory statements suggest that Petitioners are unaware of the distinction between a charter school that is deemed a public school of the district for the purposes of special education, and a charter school that operates as its own LEA pursuant to Education Code section 47641. This threshold determination is critical for establishing how responsibility for the provision of special education will be allocated between a charter school and its chartering agency. Petitioners' confusion regarding this fundamental distinction is troubling.

2. Delineation of Duties; Funding; Staffing. Of related concern, the Petition does not describe how it proposes to allocate the actual responsibility for the provision of special education and related services between the District and the Charter School and does not identify the specific funding mechanisms that it is proposing. There is no indication that Petitioners understand how funding will occur, or how the Charter School intends to work collaboratively with the District to ensure that all eligible pupils are provided with a free appropriate public education ("FAPE").

It is unclear whether Petitioners intend to take over responsibility for providing special education services to eligible pupils with its own staff. If that is the intention, the Petition does not describe how the Charter School would attract, recruit, and hire appropriately trained and credentialed personnel to provide special education to children with disabilities. Moreover, the Petition does not include job descriptions for special education teachers, special education aides, speech and language pathologists, school psychologists, occupational therapists, or any other special education staff.

3. *Identification; Referral; Assessment.* The Petition does not include any substantive discussion as to how students are referred for possible special education eligibility or any indication that Petitioners are cognizant of the requirements in state and federal law related to assessments for special education eligibility. Specifically, there is no mention of how, or if, Petitioners intend to ensure that appropriate special education assessments are timely conducted by qualified assessors, in accordance with state and federal law. Petitioners also fail to include any provision in the Petition describing the Charter School's obligations to timely refer students for mental health assessments. Petitioners do not describe any of the legal timelines mandated for referral, development of an assessment plan, and convening an IEP team meeting following assessment. The Petition's almost complete lack of discussion as to its duties and obligations with regard to the identification, referral, and assessment of students who may be eligible for special education and related services raises serious concern that Petitioners cannot ensure that Charter School pupils will receive the services to which they are legally entitled under federal and state special education law.

- 4. Extended School Year. Although the Petition indicates that the Charter School will operate an "extended school day, extended school year, and extended summer break" for students who do not meet grade level standards and requirements (Petition, p. 12), the Petition fails to discuss the Charter School's obligation to provide extended school year ("ESY") services for an eligible student as determined by the student's IEP team. It is not clear if the Charter School intends the District to provide those services, and if so, where they are to be provided during the ESY period. The Charter School cannot rely on the District to provide these services unless an agreement is reached regarding same.
- 5. Development of IEPs. Further demonstrating Petitioners' lack of familiarity with the IDEA, there is no indication in the Petition that they are aware of state and federal requirements regarding a properly noticed and convened IEP team meeting. Neither is there any language establishing that Petitioners are aware that an IEP requires programmatic decisions that are individualized to the student, and designed to meet the student's unique needs, based on input from his/her IEP team. (Ed. Code §§ 56323, and 56329.) Further, there is no description of the Charter School's duties and obligations with regard to development of an appropriate IEP for each eligible student, and no discussion of the relevant timelines set out in state and federal law concerning development of an initial IEP, or annual and triennial IEP team review meetings.

Additionally, the Petition fails to identify or discuss the Charter School's responsibility to provide an interim placement and/or comparable services when a student with an IEP enters the Charter School during the academic school year. Petitioners appear to be unaware that under Education Code section 56325, the Charter School may be required to provide "comparable services" for up to thirty days.

- 6. Additional Missing Special Education Program Elements. The Petition also fails to describe the following special education program elements: the implementation of eligibility criteria; how the Charter School will respond to requests for Independent Educational Evaluations; how the Charter School will timely refer students with special needs for reevaluations and behavioral assessments; how the Charter School will comply with Least Restrictive Environment mandates; the method by which the Charter School's special education program will comply with independent study law; or the method by which the Charter School will address filings for due process.
- 7. Section 504. Other than asserting an intent to comply with the law, the Petition otherwise fails to discuss the provision of services to Charter School students pursuant to Section 504 of the federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973 ("Section 504") (Petition, p. 21) The Charter School's duties and obligations for the provision of special education and related services pursuant to the IDEA are separate and distinct from its responsibilities under Section 504. Without a clear and complete description of the Charter School's plan for the provision of Section 504 services and accommodations, the District cannot adequately assess Petitioners' understanding of its obligations under the law.

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In sum, the foregoing provisions do not demonstrate that Petitioners understand the scope and nature of their duties and responsibilities under state and federal special education law.

Finding 2: The Petitioners are Demonstrably Unlikely to Successfully Implement the Program Set Forth in the Petition.

In order to successfully implement the educational program described in the Petition, the Petition must demonstrate that its policies and procedures are consistent with the educational program. Based upon the information provided in the Petition, the Petitioners are demonstrably unlikely to successfully implement the educational program for the following reasons:

- A. The employee qualifications described in the Petition are inconsistent with the educational program.
- B. The Petition presents an inadequate and unrealistic financial and operational plan for the proposed charter school.
- C. The Petition fails to provide certain policies and procedures described in the Petition that are necessary to confirm that the program can be implemented.

A. The employee qualifications described in the Petition are inconsistent with the educational program.

As noted above, Petitioners have not indicated how they intend to assure that ELLs are provided with sufficient ELD instruction in the classroom to enable them to progress to measurable fluency in English. Moreover, other than indicating that teachers must hold appropriate California teaching credentials, the job qualifications included in the Petition do not actually require teachers to have either a CLAD or BCLAD credential, despite the anticipated ELL student population. Because the Petition does not describe how classes will be assigned to teaching staff, it is not possible to determine how many teachers at each grade level Petitioners intend to hire, and if they propose to hire separate teachers for each subject area in the upper grades.

Additionally, the employment qualifications for teachers of non-core classes are vague as presented in the Petition. Specifically, the Petition states that the Charter School intends to hire instructors for non-core curriculum subjects including music, art, foreign languages, and physical education. (Petition, p. 33) Petitioners state that these non-credentialed instructors will have subject matter expertise, professional experience and the demonstrated ability to engage students "as determined by the School." (Petition, p. 33) However, the Petition does not describe how the Charter School will determine what constitutes sufficient expertise or experience. While charter schools have "flexibility" for hiring instructors for non-core classes, the qualifications for these positions should be high and clearly articulated.

In light of the student population proposed to be served by the Charter School, the teacher qualifications described in the Petition are inconsistent with the educational program and therefore, Petitioners are unlikely to successfully implement the proposed educational program.

B. The Petition presents an inadequate and unrealistic financial and operational plan for the proposed charter school.

A review of the Charter School's proposed Budget and Budget Narrative and multi-year plan (Petition, Appendix N) raises several significant concerns, including the following:

- 1. As noted above, the Petition must include a three year projected operational budget. (Ed. Code § 47605(g).) However, no first year operational budget was submitted by Petitioners. Instead, the Petition includes only the budget narrative and a "multi-year planning budget." (Petition, Appendix N.)
- 2. Cash flow statements submitted by Petitioners for the first two years of the Charter School's operation did not meet generally accepted accounting principles ("GAAP"); the submitted documents did not detail revenue on a monthly basis and did not list any expenses.
- 3. The Charter School's multi-year planning budget lists no sources for: "other revenue" in the amount of \$30, 985; "start-up capital" in the amount of \$5,000, and "other verifiable fund raising" in the amount of \$100,000. No sources of supplemental working capital are provided.
- 4. Start-up revenues of \$510,985 is less than start-up costs of \$658,173—a difference of \$147,188.
- 5. The multi-year projection does not include special education expenses, resulting in miscalculation of the 3% reserve in the submitted multi-year projections. When special education expenses are added to expenditures, the Charter School's fund balance is negative in Years 1 and 2, and the ending balance in Years 3-5 will leave the charter school with little or no reserves. This projection is particularly worrisome in light of expected mid-year cuts.
- 6. The insurance calculation appears to be lower than would be expected for a charter school, and Petitioners have not provided any information as to how they have calculated this amount.
- 7. No expenditures are identified for legal expenses.

- 8. Petitioners have indicated that they expect 20% participation in federal Free and Reduced Lunch programs; however, the Petition does not indicate how Petitioners arrived at this calculation.
- 9. An average certificated salary for the Charter School's first year is listed as \$52,000. Again, there is no explanation as to how this figure was determined, or how it, or the administrative, clerical, maintenance, food service and classified salaries included in the Petition, compare to District salaries, or certificated salaries at other local charter schools.
- 10. The budget and multi-year plan do not include the costs of hiring a certificated school nurse or contracting with a private agency for health and nursing services.

In addition, the Petition does not provide a description of the annual budget development, implementation and review process, including the process by which the Charter School leadership will monitor and report regarding the continued financial solvency of the Charter School. As a result of the foregoing financial issues, Petitioners are demonstrably unlikely to successfully implement the proposed program.

- C. The Petition fails to provide certain policies and procedures described in the Petition that are necessary to confirm that the program can be implemented.
- 1. Health and Safety Policies and Procedures. Education Code section 47605(b)(5)(F) requires the Petition to include "the procedures that the school will follow to ensure the health and safety of pupils and staff." Petitioners have indicated that they plan to "adopt and implement full health and safety procedures" for the Charter School and have included copies of draft health and safety policies at Appendix H. (Petition, p. 35-36, 70-78.) These draft policies appears to be boilerplate language lifted verbatim from several other charter petitions submitted around the state and provide little insight into how Petitioners actually plan to implement the policies.

Of particular concern is language assigning primary responsibility for the administration of medication to students during the school day to "the parent/guardian, student and medical profession." (Petition, p. 75.) The Petition further states that the school will "endeavor to provide for the administration of prescribed medication" only if the student is unable to self-administer his or her medication. (Petition, p. 75.) Petitioners misunderstand their obligations in this regard. In fact, pursuant to both the IDEA and Section 504, if a student requires health or nursing services while at school to access his or her education, the school must provide those services. (34 C.F.R § 300.34(c)(13); 34 C.F.R. § 104.4.) A parent/guardian or a student cannot be required to administer necessary medication. Additionally, with the exception of emergency doses of glucagon and epinephrine, no provision in California law permits unlicensed school personnel to administer any medication to students at school. (Ed. Code §§ 49423; 5 C.C.R. §§ 601-610.) However, nowhere in the Petition is there any indication that Petitioners will hire a certificated school nurse or contract with an agency for nursing services, and the proposed budget submitted with the Petition does not include any description of funding

reserved for such expenses. Given that a single student with diabetes may need substantial nursing services, including the administration of insulin multiple times during the school day, these omissions suggests that Petitioners are not familiar with the legally-mandated requirements and costs for the provision of health and nursing services to students who require such services to access their educational program.

Of further concern, Petitioners have indicated that they intend to adopt a sexual harassment policy (Petition, p. 26), but no draft policy is included in the Petition.

In sum, without additional information, copies of the required policies and procedures, and a realistic assessment of staffing and budget projections needed to provide for the health and safety of its students, the District cannot evaluate whether those policies will sufficiently protect the health and safety of pupils and staff, thereby facilitating successful implementation of the Charter School program. Petitioners' failure to develop comprehensive health and safety policies again demonstrates that they are demonstrably unlikely to successfully implement the Charter School's program.

2. Free Speech and Expression Rights. Recently enacted Senate Bill ("SB") 438 amends Education Code section 48907 to require charter schools to give their students freedom of the press and expression in what they say, wear, and write in official school publications. Section 48907 further requires charter schools to adopt a written policy that includes reasonable restrictions for conducting such activities. The Petition does not include the required policy and its absence suggests that Petitioners may not be aware of current law related to charter schools.

Finding 3: The Petition Does Not Contain the Number of Signatures Required by Law.

As noted above, a charter petition may be denied on the grounds that the petition does not contain the number of signatures required by Education Code section 47605, subdivision (a)(1)(A) or (a)(1)(B). In this case, Petitioners have submitted a petition from parents, which means that the petition must be signed by a number of parents or legal guardians of pupils that is equivalent to at least one-half of the number of pupils that the Charter School estimates will enroll in the school for its first year of operation. (Ed. Code § 47605(a)(1)(B).)

In this case, Petitioners anticipate an enrollment of 302 students in the Charter School for the 2011-2012 school year, thereby requiring a minimum of 151 signatures on the Petition. (Petition, p. 14) At Appendix P, the Petition includes a list of names of persons who "certify that they are meaningfully interested in having their children attend the Shining Crescent Charter School." However, the submitted list does not include sufficient signatures to meet the requirements of the law. Even assuming that each name or signature contained in the Petition is valid and can be counted toward the 151 required signatures, there are only 114 signatures included at Appendix P. Moreover, some signatures appear to be duplicates, or appear to be the signatures of members of the same family residing at the same address. Other signatures are not accompanied by any

contact information. In some cases, pages of the Petition include a list of names in the same handwriting, some of which do not include a signature. (Petition, Appendix P.) Moreover, none of the parties who have signed the petition have indicated how many children they have, or the ages or grade levels of those children. Without this information, the District cannot tell how many parents are truly "meaningfully interested" in having their children enrolled in the Charter School during its first year of operation.

Finding 4: The Petition Does Not Contain Reasonably Comprehensive Descriptions of Certain Required Elements

The Petition does not contain reasonably comprehensive descriptions of certain elements set forth in Education Code section 47605, subdivisions (b)(5)(A-P), as set forth below.

A. <u>Governance Structure: Family Participation (Petition, p. 32.)</u>

Pursuant to Education Code section 47605(b)(5)(D), a charter petition must include a reasonably comprehensive description of the governance structure of the school, including, but not limited to, the process to be followed by the school to ensure parental involvement. The Charter School's plan for ensuring parental participation does not meet this standard.

Petitioners first acknowledge that family involvement in the education process is an important factor in student success, but it fails to identify how the Charter School intends to promote parental involvement, or what specific opportunities parents will have to participate in the governance or activities of the school. (Petition, p. 32) There is no indication as to whether the Charter School anticipates that parents will serve as tutors or provide other classroom support, and if so, what qualifications for those positions will be required. No mention is made of the Charter School's obligation, if it intends to apply for Title I funding, to develop an English Language Advisory Council ("ELAC") or a School Site Council ("SSC"), both of which provide important opportunities for parental participation.

Additionally, the Petition indicates that the Charter School will utilize "family and community volunteers to enhance and extend all aspects of the School's education program." (Petition, p. 32) While this reflects a laudable goal, it is not apparent from the Petition the extent to which the Charter School will rely on these parent and community volunteers. The Petition does not indicate what program elements will benefit from parent participation, and how parents and other volunteers will be supervised. No information is provided as to whether parents serving in certain roles will be, like the employees described in the Petition, required to submit to criminal background checks and furnish criminal record summaries.

B. Governance Structure: Dispute Resolution Process.

A charter petition must include the procedures to be followed by the charter school and the entity granting the charter to resolve disputes relating to the provision of the charter.

(Ed. Code § 47605(b)(5)(N).) However, Petitioners appear to have received little guidance in this respect, as evidenced by the fact that they have included in the Petition a process for resolving disputes between a charter school and the <u>State Board of Education</u>, rather than a local chartering district. As with other major elements of the Petition, Petitioners appear to have lifted their dispute resolution plan from another charter petition. This sort of shortcut might be acceptable if it was clear from the body of the Petition that Petitioners truly understood the requirements under the law for a dispute resolution process. Without a complete and thorough description of a process for resolution of disputes between the charter school and the District, this element of the Petition is insufficient.

C. Governance Structure: Conflicts of Interest

As a "local government agency" for the purposes of compliance with the Political Reform Act ("PRA"), charter schools are required to adopt and maintain a conflict-of-interest code or comply with the chartering district's code. (Gov. Code § 87300; FPPC Advice Letter A-02-223, 2002 WL 31299660 (Sept. 26, 2002).) However, nowhere in the Petition have Petitioners indicated that they intend to comply with the PRA. No Conflicts of Interest policy is included in the Petition, and Petitioners do not otherwise indicate their intent to comply with the District's conflicts code.

D. Racial and Ethnic Balance (Petition, pp. 41.)

The Petition must include a reasonably comprehensive description of the means by which the Charter School will achieve a racial and ethnic balance among its students that is reflective of the general population residing within the territorial jurisdiction of the school district to which the charter petition is submitted. (Ed. Code § 47605(b)(5)(G).) However, Petitioners' plan for achieving the required racial and ethnic balance at the Charter School as set out in the Petition is squarely at odds with their stated intention of targeting "children from Africa, the Middle East and South Asia: India-Pakistan-Afghanistan-Bangladesh and surrounding areas." (Petition, p.13.) Elsewhere in the Petition, Petitioners further state that they intend to serve families residing within the District, "with a particular emphasis on the targeted community." (Petition, p. 41.)

Review of demographic data for the District, shows that for the 2009-2010 school year, the District's student population reflected the following percentages of student population groups:

Hispanic /Latino of any Race:	48%
American Indian/Alaska Native:	<1%
Asian:	11%
Pacific Islander:	1%
Filipino:	6%
African American:	23%
White:	12%
Multiple Races/No Response:	<1%

Accordingly, Petitioners must present a plan for achieving a racial/ethnic balance that reflects a student body that is almost half Hispanic/Latino students. However, no elements of the Charter School's outreach plans describe any specific efforts to recruit and enroll Hispanic/Latino students. (Petition, p. 41.) Specifically, Petitioners do not indicate whether fliers, brochures, and other recruitment materials will be in Spanish. Instead, Petitioners simply assert that recruitment materials will be distributed in English and other languages (the primary languages of the families in the surrounding neighborhood.) It is unclear what "surrounding neighborhood" Petitioners are referencing. (Petition, p. 41.) Moreover, although Petitioners anticipate a start-up date for the Charter School in August 2011, none of the proposed strategies for achieving a racial/ethnic balance among the Charter School's students have yet been developed or implemented. Coupled with Petitioners' repeated statements indicating that they intend to target "children from Africa, the Middle East and South Asia: India-Pakistan-Afghanistan-Bangladesh and surrounding areas." (Petition, p. 13.) Petitioners' skeletal description of its recruitment plan strongly suggests that they expect to forego any genuine efforts to achieve a racial/ethnic balance that reflects the District as a whole.

Lastly, it is important to note that targeting recruitment only to students of a particular race, ethnicity or nationality can potentially be challenged as discriminatory. The Charter School may not overtly or directly make students eligible for enrollment solely on the basis of race, ethnicity or nationality, or discriminate against other groups of students solely on the basis of not being "children from Africa, the Middle East and South Asia: India-Pakistan-Afghanistan-Bangladesh and surrounding areas." (Cal. Const., Art. I, §31(a); Ed. Code § 220; American Civil Rights Foundation v. Berkeley Unified School District (2009) 172 Cal.App.4th 207.) Petitioners' outreach plan should ensure that all children in the District are made aware of the Charter School. The more the Charter School appears to single out one group of students, the more likely it is that the Charter School will be susceptible to a successful legal challenge.

E. Suspension and Expulsion Procedures (Petition, pp.40, 76-86.)

The Petition does not sufficiently describe the procedures by which pupils can be suspended or expelled. (Petition, pp. 76-86.) In the body of the Petition, Petitioners state that the Charter School's Board will develop a suspension and expulsion policy and procedure, suggesting that no such policy exists at this time. (Petition, p. 40.) However, Appendix I describes "Pupil Suspension and Expulsion Procedures." As with other sections of the Petition and its appendices, it appears that Petitioners may have lifted this policy wholesale from another charter petition.

Charter Schools are not required to follow the Education Code when disciplining students, but they are required to comply with the due process rights of students assured under the federal and state constitutions. (Goss v. Lopez (1975) 419 U.S. 565; Wood v. Strickland (1975) 421 U.S. 921.) This includes providing students with prior notice of any disciplinary procedures that will be followed. Close examination of the Charter's School statements regarding student discipline and the attached policy and procedures

indicate that Petitioners lack a clear understanding of the due process rights that must be afforded to students facing disciplinary proceedings. Of particular concern, the proposed suspension and expulsion policy notes that the list of offenses supporting suspension and expulsion "is not exhaustive and depending on the offense, a pupil may be suspended or expelled for misconduct not specified above." (Petition, p. 82.) That is not the case. Due process requires that students be notified of the specific offenses that may result in discipline.

In addition, the Petition makes broad, general statements regarding disciplinary procedures, but lacks specificity as to types of behavior warranting discipline, nor does it reference the degree of discipline appropriate for particular offenses. The Petition makes frequent reference to disciplinary action for failure to meet certain undefined "academic or behavioral expectations." (Petition, p. 40.) Again, due process requires that students be notified as to what academic and behavioral standards they are expected to meet, if violation of such standards would result in disciplinary action.

The Petition states no standard upon which an expulsion panel may expel a student, as opposed to simply suspending the student or imposing a remediation agreement. It does not specify the number of violations that would require a meeting and/or remediation agreement. The Petition further does not clarify what constitutes an immediate threat to health and safety that would warrant immediate suspension and eventual expulsion. (Petition, p. 40.)

Additional Comments

As noted in the Introduction to these findings, Petitioners make several references to the difficulty that families from the targeted populations (i.e., Africa, South Asia, and the Middle East) have in adjusting to an American society which permits "the free mixing of the sexes" and the particular problems faced by children transitioning "from segregated societies to integrated societies." (Petition, p. 9) Petitioners note that "this is especially difficult for children when they become teenagers and hormones start creating problems." (Petition, p.9) These comments, as well as Petitioners' description of the use of student groupings defined by "such factors as skills, ability, age, gender, and interest" (Petition, p. 17), suggest that as a remedy to family concerns regarding the mixing of the sexes, Petitioners may be contemplating the establishment of single-sex classrooms at the Charter School. If that is Petitioners' intent, the Petition must clearly describe its plan for meeting the legal requirements set out in Title IX and its implementing regulations regarding the provision of single-sex instruction. (See 34 C.F.R. § 106.34.) In sum, if Petitioners intent is to segregate the sexes, the Petition's lack of specificity as to how Petitioners would structure such a program in compliance with the law, presents both an unsound educational program as well as one that Petitioners are demonstrably unlikely to successfully implement.

Recommendation of Denial of Petition

Based on the foregoing, staff makes the following recommendations:

- 1. That the Petition be denied for reasons including, but not limited to, the failure of the Petitioners to present a sound educational program.
- 2. That the Petition be denied for reasons because it is demonstrably unlikely that the Petitioners will successfully implement the program set forth in the Petition.
- 3. That the Petition be denied because, as described above, it does not contain reasonably comprehensive descriptions of all of the items required by Education Code section 47605, subdivision (b)(5).
- 4. That the Petition be denied because it does not contain reasonably comprehensive descriptions of certain required elements set forth in Education Code section 47605, subdivisions (b)(5)(A-P).

In order to deny the Petition on the grounds set forth above, Education Code section 47605, subdivision (b), requires the Governing Board to make "written factual findings, specific to the particular petition, setting forth specific facts to support one or more" grounds for denying the Petition. District staff recommends that the Board adopt these final findings of fact as its own, should the Board decide to deny the Petition.
