#### \*CI C.5 Enterprise Resource Planning/System Software

#### Comment:

The District's Enterprise Resource Planning/ System software includes the functionality for Human Resources, Budget, Accounting, Payroll, Purchasing as well as site level access for reports and automated purchase requisitions. It became clear in the Fall of 2010 that the current system used by the District, Bi-Tech, was going to have undergo some major upgrades which would amount to a system conversion. (Bi-tech has since notified the District that it will no longer be supporting the software currently in use.) With that in mind a Stakeholder User Team, composed of fifteen users each representing a major functional area, was formed to examine options and the team determined that since a system conversion was necessary a request for proposal (RFP) should be developed. The RFP includes requirements for each area for which the District already maintains software solutions as well as for areas the team wishes to expand the potential for the District to implement additional software solutions. For instance, the team is interested in expanding software to include an improved employee timekeeping, leave and benefits module as well as applicant tracking and employee/applicant self-service portals. Through a series of work sessions and multiple edits the team prepared and published an RFP in April of 2011. RFP submissions were accepted through June 24, 2011. Four RFPs were submitted.

The Stakeholder User Team reviewed each RFP against the requested components and determined that three vendors would move into the product demonstration phase. The product demonstrations were held at Harding Elementary School during the end of July and beginning of August 2011. Every department had strong attendance at the demonstrations and provided feedback regarding the software proposals. The Stakeholder User Team then arranged to have the top ranked vendor, Tyler-Munis, provide a handson demonstration in the District's technology lab over the course of a week. Each department was able to send attendees for a more in depth examination of the software during the product demonstration.

Tyler-Munis is the vendor which provides Enterprise Resource Planning/ System software to the City of Richmond, San Jose Unified School District as well as other school districts, and is currently in a phased implementation project with fifteen of the eighteen districts within Contra Costa County. As a result of the large scale implementation within the county the District can leverage the negotiation for implementation using the Contra Costa County of Education pricing afforded the fifteen districts in the process of conversion. Staff is in the process of making inquiries to reference districts regarding the implementation process as well as follow up questions regarding specific functionality for certain departmental functions. Once that is done staff proposes to begin negotiations for final pricing and then engage in project planning. Staff is requesting that the Board authorize staff to negotiate terms for the software, hosting and implementation of the Enterprise Software System. Once staff has finalized the contract negotiation the contract will be placed on the Board's agenda for ratification.

### \* F.2 Parcel Tax Renewal / Extension Resolution No. 90-1112

#### Comment:

In 2004, the voters approved a parcel tax that has helped to fund reduced class sizes, counselors, librarians, custodial services, and athletics. This parcel tax, which annually brings \$9.6 million into the district, was renewed in 2008 with 79% of voters supporting it. Over the past four years, the District has spent the parcel revenue prudently and in alignment with the measure with fully accountability through annual audits and review by the Community Budget Advisory Committee.

Since the approval in 2008, the State of California has dramatically reduced funding for K-12 education. By statute the per pupil revenue limit for 2012-13 should be \$6,742 but due to the financial crisis and the Legislature's inability to fund public education in California, West Contra Costa Unified School District will receive only \$4,911. The total loss of revenue to WCCUSD is more than \$40 million. The Board has demonstrated financial stewardship in making expenditure reductions including closing schools, capping employee health benefits, requiring employees to take furlough days, raising class sizes, and reducing or eliminating many programs that had served the students of the District. In adopting a budget for 2011-12, the Board used several one-time funding sources such as the Federal Stimulus money to keep essential programs and services. Yet, the District faces a deficit of \$4.7 million for 2012-13 as well as the loss of one-time federal stimulus funds.

At the November 16, 2011 meeting, Bryan Godbe from Godbe Research presented the results of a survey that the Board had authorized in September 2011. The survey results show the voters are willing to support a renewal of the current parcel tax and small increase that would help the District continue to fund key programs and services to get through the current financial hardship.

#### Recommendation:

That the Board approve ballot language and Resolution No. 90-1112 authorizing a parcel tax renewal / extension on the June 5, 2012 ballot.

Clerk Antonio Medrano called the meeting to order at 5:00 P.M. The Board recessed into Closed Session. Clerk Antonio Medrano called the Public Session to order at 6:37 P.M.

#### **Board Comment:**

Elaine Merriweather asked about Mr. Jungherr's previous appointments to the committee. Superintendent Harter responded. Mr. Jungherr was invited to the podium to address questions regarding his original appointments by the City of Hercules, Board Member Audrey Miles and Superintendent Harter. Ms. Merriweather continued with questions about rules to address the accusations made against Mr. Jungherr. Superintendent Harter responded with information about the Board's governing policy and a new administrative regulation addressing committee member conduct. The committee now has its own bylaws that describe member discipline and/or removal.

Ms. Kronenberg spoke about her time in service on the committee while Mr. Jungherr also served. She continued to speak about the purpose of the committee and the need for committee members to work together without disruption of the process. Ms. Kronenberg said that she would support the staff recommendation to decline the appointment. Clerk Medrano spoke about his time serving on the committee, Roberts Rules of Order and the majority of the committee members.

Mr. Thurmond thanked Mr. Jungherr for his interest in serving and spoke of this as an unusual circumstance. Superintendent Harter provided information regarding the Contra Costa Taxpayer Association, actions seen as a violation of integrity, and cost to taxpayers. He further spoke about conferring with the leadership of the CBOC and approving the staff recommendation to decline the appointment of Mr. Jungherr, asking the Tax Payer Committee to make another appointment.

Mr. Jungherr commented on his actions regarding a letter to the county superintendent.

Mr. Thurmond asked questions about the governing policies for the Board regarding nominations from stakeholder groups and representatives on the CBOC. Superintendent Harter responded that all nominations have to come to the Board for acceptance or disapproval.

Mr. Thurmond expressed concern about Mr. Jungherr's previous appointments followed by resignations and why a third term would be granted.

Clerk Medrano spoke about the voice of criticism needed and a danger of damaging the District's reputation before the public.

MOTION: Ms. Kronenberg moved approval of the recommendation to decline to appoint Anton Jungherr and request that the Taxpayers Association nominate another individual. Mr. Thurmond seconded. A roll call vote was taken with Ms. Kronenberg and Mr. Thurmond voting yes, Clerk Medrano and Ms. Merriweather voting no, with no abstentions and President Ramsey absent. Student Representative Enrique Cornejo did not vote because of the tie. Motion failed 2-2-0-1.

Superintendent Harter said that the Board will have to take action in the future or take a different direction of action. Discussion continued about how the Board might address a separate motion on this item at another time. Ms. Merriweather said she would like to hear Mr. Ramsey's opinion.

#### D.2 Budget Update

Ms. Gamba reported on the effects of the Governor's January budget, mid-year triggers and the 2011-12 and 2012-13 budgets.

#### **Public Comment:**

None

#### **Board Comment:**

Ms. Merriweather asked about placing Transitional Kindergarten (TK) on the list of priorities. She spoke about information from the state regarding growth money for new average daily attendance (ADA). Ms. Gamba responded. Mr. Thurmond said TK should be made a priority and the District should act to implement the program in the coming school year as funding comes available. He continued with discussion on the 2012-13 projections and use of the special reserve funds. Ms. Gamba responded with comment about the required 3% reserve and a projected \$4.7 million deficit in the first year following state loan payoff.

Mr. Thurmond continued with additional questions about funding TK. Ms. Gamba responded with information regarding the reduction of students at each school site who might transfer to a TK site, but no corresponding reduction of staff at those sites' regular kindergarten programs, in effect losing ADA.

President Ramsey arrived at the meeting at 8:05 p.m.

Ms. Gamba suggested that a solution will be forthcoming from the Department of Education and will have more information for the second interim report.

Ms. Merriweather spoke about TK at certain schools rather than at all sites. Discussion continued regarding the budget.

Mr. Ramsey spoke about an anticipated opinion regarding declaratory relief, a legal opinion about BiTech system upgrades, and recommendations for ending state receivership. He said he supported adding the TK program to the priority list.

Ms. Kronenberg spoke about the importance of TK as a priority.

Mr. Thurmond asked questions about the SB81 transportation cuts proposed by the state legislature. Ms. Gamba responded.

Ms. Gamba concluded her presentation with information about the second interim report coming to the Board by March 21. She further concluded that she will add the TK on the list of Board budget priorities that await funding.

Clerk Medrano passed the gavel to President Ramsey who presided over the remainder of the meeting.

President Ramsey said that he would like to revisit C.11 Contra Costa Taxpayers Association Recommendation for the Citizens Bond Oversight Committee and address comments.

#### C.11 Contra Costa Taxpayers Association Recommendation for the Citizens Bond Oversight Committee

Ms. Gamba recommended that the maker of the motion revise the original motion due to the tie vote.

Mr. Thurmond asked procedurally about re-voting and the intent of the discussion to address comments and action on the previous motion. President Ramsey stated that since the agenda was not closed, the Board could address the tie vote. He said that he was able to listen to the public comment previously presented.

Mr. Thurmond commented that it is unusual to revote in the same meeting, and urged caution stating that the procedural process be in order so that any action is valid. President Ramsey said it is also possible to reaffirm vote at a later time.

Ms. Gamba suggested taking a vote by the Board to re-deliberate on the matter. Subsequent to that approval, take a vote to reconcile the matter due to the tie vote. Discussion continued.

Motion: Ms. Kronenberg moved to re-deliberate on the matter at this meeting. Ms. Merriweather seconded. Ms. Kronenberg, Ms. Merriweather, Mr. Thurmond and President Ramsey voted yes, Mr. Medrano voted no, with no abstentions and no absences. Motion carried 4-1-0-0.

President Ramsey said he wanted to address Ms. Merriweather's comments. He also said he agreed with Mr. Medrano that dissent is important but that disruptive behavior is not productive. President Ramsey continued to discuss comments made earlier regarding this item.

Mr. Thurmond said that his decision to support the staff recommendation is based on Mr. Jungherr's prior service appointments and failure to complete those terms.

Ms. Merriweather said she appreciated a thorough explanation to address her concerns and felt more comfortable voting.

MOTION: Ms. Kronenberg moved approval of the recommendation to decline to appoint Anton Jungherr and request that the Taxpayers Association nominate another individual. Mr. Thurmond seconded. A roll call vote was taken with Ms. Kronenberg, Ms. Merriweather, Mr. Thurmond and President Ramsey voting yes, Mr. Medrano voting no, with no abstentions and no absences. Motion carried 4-1-0-0.

#### D.3 Standing Reports

**United Teachers of Richmond.** Diane Brown spoke about the KEYs partnership and teachers at Stewart, highlighting their training and shared professional development. She said she would like to see monthly reports regarding the KEYs implementation throughout the District. She asked for clarification about a waiver to the Department of Education regarding an ESEA Waiver. Superintendent Harter provided clarification. Ms. Brown concluded by issuing an invitation to the unveiling of the new California State Standards in English, Language Arts and Mathematics on March 6, 2012.

School Supervisors Association. Sandra Falk spoke about the appropriateness of re-deliberating and stressed the validity of the revote due to the tie vote. She also asked that the Board clarify that the conduct of Mr. Jungherr was the concern, not his character. She continued by stressing the importance of uniting the community and labor unions in support of the District's upcoming parcel tax as well as the Governor's November tax. She concluded by asking that employees be added to the budget priority list.

Ivy League Connection. Don Gosney provided an update of activities and interviews for the summer cohorts. He said that 144 applicants have interviewed with more deadlines still to come. Mr. Gosney spoke about the variety of volunteers from the community who serve on the interview panels demonstrating the ILC's intent to model giving back to the community.

Citizens Bond Oversight Committee. Robert Studdiford provided a report from the last meeting where building projects were reviewed as well as the capital assets management plan. He also spoke of the ongoing program of tutorials for the executive committee and discussion of retention fees. He said that minutes were reviewed and discussed as well as the West Bay Builders issue. He said the committee looked forward to the Ford Elementary move in to the new facility.

Community Budget Advisory Committee. Ms. Gamba spoke of the community meeting presentations and that the next committee meeting will be held in March.

**Bayside PTA**. Mr. Thurmond spoke on behalf of Ms. Ramos and a recent hearing held by Assembly Member Swanson about districts under state control and supervision. He spoke about her testimony in relating the impact of the state takeover on staff, students and families.

**Safety Committee.** Mr. Thurmond announced the next meeting for February 8, 6:00 PM at Kennedy. Topics will include efforts to suppress gang activity, preventing drugs on campus, and updates to promote disaster preparedness.

**Youth Commission**. Mr. Thurmond said the students have asked for a joint meeting with the Board and would like to address matters such as budget priorities, achievement gap and middle school math. The next meeting is planned for February 13th.

**Academic Subcommittee.** Ms. Kronenberg reported that the next meeting is scheduled for February 14, 6:30 PM at Helms Middle School where discussion will include the middle school math initiative.

Facilities Subcommittee. The next meeting is scheduled for February 14, 2012.

**Select Committee on High Schools.** President Ramsey said the committee will meet on February 9 at Pinole Valley High School.

### **Background Information:**

The District's Enterprise Resource Planning/ System software includes the functionality for Human Resources, Budget, Accounting, Payroll, Purchasing as well as site level access for reports and automated purchase requisitions. It became clear in the Fall of 2010 that the current system used by the District, Bi-Tech, was going to have undergo some major upgrades which would amount to a system conversion. (Bi-tech has since notified the District that it will no longer be supporting the software currently in use.) With that in mind a Stakeholder User Team, composed of fifteen users each representing a major functional area, was formed to examine options and the team determined that since a system conversion was necessary a request for proposal (RFP) should be developed. The RFP includes requirements for each area for which the District already maintains software solutions as well as for areas the team wishes to expand the potential for the District to implement additional software solutions. For instance, the team is interested in expanding software to include an improved employee timekeeping, leave and benefits module as well as applicant tracking and employee/applicant self- service portals. Through a series of work sessions and multiple edits the team prepared and published an RFP in April of 2011. RFP submissions were accepted through June 24, 2011. Four RFPs were submitted.

The Stakeholder User Team reviewed each RFP against the requested components and determined that three vendors would move into the product demonstration phase. The product demonstrations were held at Harding Elementary School during the end of July and beginning of August 2011. Every department had strong attendance at the demonstrations and provided feedback regarding the software proposals. The Stakeholder User Team then arranged to have the top ranked vendor, Tyler-Munis, provide a hands-on demonstration in the District's technology lab over the course of a week. Each department was able to send attendees for a more in depth examination of the software during the product demonstration.

Tyler-Munis is the vendor which provides Enterprise Resource Planning/ System software to the City of Richmond, San Jose Unified School District as well as other school districts, and is currently in a phased implementation project with fifteen of the eighteen districts within Contra Costa County. As a result of the large scale implementation within the county the District can leverage the negotiation for implementation using the Contra Costa County of Education pricing

afforded the fifteen districts in the process of conversion. Staff is in the process of making inquiries to reference districts regarding the implementation process as well as follow up questions regarding specific functionality for certain departmental functions. Once that is done staff proposes to begin negotiations for final pricing and then engage in project planning. Staff is requesting that the Board authorize staff to negotiate terms for the software, hosting and implementation of the Enterprise Software System. Once staff has finalized the contract negotiation the contract will be placed on the Board's agenda for ratification.

**Recommendation:** Approve the negotiation of a contract for implementation of the Enterprise Software System.

**Fiscal Impact:** Two year project budget estimate including internal staff resources; \$2.7 million. \$2.2 million Technology/Measure D Bond, and \$500,000 Special Reserve.

## RESOLUTION OF INTENTION TO REDUCE OR ELIMINATE PARTICULAR KINDS OF SERVICES

WHEREAS, the Governing Board of the West Contra Costa Unified School District has determined that it shall be necessary to reduce or discontinue the particular kinds of services of the District, as itemized in Exhibit "A," at the close of the current school year; and

WHEREAS, it shall be necessary to terminate at the end of the 2012-2013 school year the employment of certain certificated employees of the District as a result of this reduction or discontinuance in particular kinds of services;

WHEREAS, pursuant to Education Code section 44955 (b) the District may deviate from terminating or reappointing a certificated employee in order of least seniority to fill a demonstrated specific need for fully credentialed personnel and for personnel with the experience/competency to teach a specific course or course of study which others with more seniority do not possess. Deviation from terminating or reappointing in order of least seniority will include, but not be limited to:

- 1. Teachers who currently hold a BCLAD authorization or prior equivalent and are currently assigned to teach in a bilingual classroom.
- 2. Teachers with at least one year of experience in the District in the last five years in the subject matter to be assumed.
- 3. Teachers and other certificated staff members serving in the District's "Turnaround Schools," Lincoln Elementary, Helms Middle School, De Anza High School. These schools are state-identified Tier 1 and Tier II persistently lowest-achieving schools within the District. It would be extremely harmful to the students of these schools to layoff teachers who have received extensive professional development and curriculum training to work with students, developed relationships with students and who are devoted to this particular population of students.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Superintendent is directed to send appropriate notices to all employees whose services shall be terminated by virtue of this action. Nothing herein shall be deemed to confer any status or rights upon temporary or categorically funded project certificated employees in addition to those specifically granted to them by statute.

Subject: Parcel Tax Renewal / Extension Resolution No. 90-1112

#### **Background Information:**

In 2004, the voters approved a parcel tax that has helped to fund reduced class sizes, counselors, librarians, custodial services, and athletics. This parcel tax, which annually brings \$9.6 million into the district, was renewed in 2008 with 79% of voters supporting it. Over the past four years, the District has spent the parcel revenue prudently and in alignment with the measure with fully accountability through annual audits and review by the Community Budget Advisory Committee.

Since the approval in 2008, the State of California has dramatically reduced funding for K-12 education. By statute the per pupil revenue limit for 2012-13 should be \$6,742 but due to the financial crisis and the Legislature's inability to fund public education in California, West Contra Costa Unified School District will receive only \$4,911. The total loss of revenue to WCCUSD is more than \$40 million. The Board has demonstrated financial stewardship in making expenditure reductions including closing schools, capping employee health benefits, requiring employees to take furlough days, raising class sizes, and reducing or eliminating many programs that had served the students of the District. In adopting a budget for 2011-12, the Board used several one-time funding sources such as the Federal Stimulus money to keep essential programs and services. Yet, the District faces a deficit of \$4.7 million for 2012-13 as well as the loss of one-time federal stimulus funds.

At the November 16, 2011 meeting, Bryan Godbe from Godbe Research presented the results of a survey that the Board had authorized in September 2011. The survey results show the voters are willing to support a renewal of the current parcel tax and small increase that would help the District continue to fund key programs and services to get through the current financial hardship.

#### **Recommendation:**

That the Board approve ballot language and Resolution No. 90-1112 authorizing a parcel tax renewal / extension on the June 5, 2012 ballot.

**Fiscal Impact:** Provide \$13.6 million each year for 5 years for programs and services to students.

# RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE WEST CONTRA COSTA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT CALLING AN ELECTION, ESTABLISHING SPECIFICATIONS OF THE ELECTION ORDER, AND REQUESTING CONSOLIDATION WITH OTHER ELECTIONS OCCURRING ON JUNE 5, 2012

WHEREAS, the West Contra Costa Unified School District ("District") is committed to offering a high-quality educational program to all students in the District, and due to inadequate state funding, increased local revenues are necessary to meet this goal; and

WHEREAS, California Constitution, Article XIIIA, Section 4 and Government Code Section 50075 *et seq.* authorize school districts, upon approval of 2/3rds of the electorate, to levy qualified special taxes on property in the District for the purposes of providing quality educational programs in the District and other lawful purposes of the District; and

WHEREAS, an adequately funded and well-developed public education program provides numerous benefits and advantages to all of the residents of the community; and

WHEREAS, in the judgment of this Board, following public hearing and comment, it is advisable to request that the Contra Costa County Registrar of Voters call an election and submit to the voters of the District the question whether the District shall levy a special tax within the District for the purpose of raising additional revenue for the District; and

**WHEREAS**, the purpose of the special tax shall be to improve the quality of education in the District by supporting the following programs:

- maintaining core academic programs such as math, science, reading and writing,
- preparing students for college and the workforce,
- supporting science laboratories, materials and activities,
- attracting and retaining quality teachers and counselors,
- supporting libraries, arts and music,
- maintaining reduced class sizes for the youngest children,
- improving technology and computer training for all students,
- reducing class sizes for middle school and high school students,
- improving safety on and around our campuses,
- supporting after-school programs to keep kids away from gangs and drugs,
- maintaining high school athletic programs,
- maintaining summer school programs to allow students to catch up,

- purchasing textbooks and other student materials and supplies,
- maintaining safe and clean schools.

**WHEREAS**, pursuant to Education Code Section 5342 and Elections Code Sections 10400, 10402, and 10403, such election may be completely or partially consolidated with any other election held on the same day and in the same territory or in territory that is in part the same.

WHEREAS, under approval received from the voters on November 4, 2008, the District currently collects a qualified special tax of 7.2 cents per square foot of total building area on each parcel of taxable property or a tax of \$7.20 per unimproved parcel of taxable property per year, which tax would expire on June 30, 2014; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education of the District (the "Board") believes that in order to continue meeting the educational needs of all of the District's students it is necessary to increase the special tax by 3 cents per square foot of total building area on each parcel of taxable property and \$3.00 per unimproved parcel of taxable property per year, such tax to be collected for five years beginning July 1, 2012; and

#### NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AS FOLLOWS:

**Section 1. Resolution Constitutes Order of Election.** That this resolution shall constitute an order of election pursuant to Education Code Section 5320 *et seq.* 

Section 2. Date and Purpose of Measure. Pursuant to Section 4 of Article XIIIA of the California Constitution and Government Code Section 50077, an election shall be held within the boundaries of the District on Tuesday, June 5, 2012 for the purpose of voting on a proposition, a copy of which is attached hereto and marked Exhibit A, containing the question of whether the District shall increase and extend the parcel tax as described and for the purposes stated therein. In addition, the full text of the ballot proposition (the "Full Ballot Text") attached hereto and marked Exhibit B shall appear in the ballot pamphlet. The parcel tax shall be established at an amount equal to 10.2 cents per square foot of total building area on each parcel of taxable property within the District or a tax of \$10.20 per unimproved parcel of taxable real property. The District shall provide the Contra Costa County Treasurer-Tax Collector a report indicating the parcel number and amount of tax for each parcel of taxable real property. The number of square feet of total building area on improved real property shall be obtained from the Contra Costa County Tax Assessor. If that information is missing from the tax assessor's records, the number of square feet of total building area shall be based upon the records of the building department for the applicable jurisdiction. The parcel tax shall be collected by the Contra Costa County Treasurer-Tax Collector at the same time, in the same manner, and subject to the same penalties as ad valorem property taxes collected by the Treasurer-Tax Collector. Unpaid taxes shall bear interest at the same rate as the rate for unpaid ad valorem property taxes until paid. The collection of the parcel tax shall not decrease the funds available from other sources of the District in any period from the effective date hereof.

The District's Superintendent, or designee, is hereby authorized and directed to make any changes to the text of the measure, or to the abbreviated form of the measure, as may be

convenient or necessary to comply with the intent of this Resolution, the requirements of elections, officials, and requirements of law.

"Parcel of taxable real property" shall be defined as any unit of real property in the District that receives a separate tax bill for *ad valorem* property taxes from the Contra Costa County Treasurer-Tax Collector's Office. All property that is otherwise exempt from or on which are levied no *ad valorem* property taxes in any year shall also be exempt from the parcel tax in such year. Parcels owned and occupied by eligible persons 65 years of age or older or who receive Supplemental Security Income for a disability, regardless of age, who apply to the District pursuant to an administrative review process are exempt from the parcel tax.

The District shall annually provide a list of parcels that the District has approved for a Senior Citizen Exemption or the SSI Exemption from the parcel tax as described above to the Contra Costa County tax collection officials. The Contra Costa County Tax Assessor's determination of exemption or relief of any parcel from taxation for any reason other than the Senior Citizen Exemption or SSI Exemption shall be final and binding for the purposes of the parcel tax. Taxpayers wishing to challenge the County Assessor's determination must do so under the procedures for correcting a misclassification of property pursuant to Section 4876.5 of the California Revenue and Taxation Code or other applicable procedures. Taxpayers seeking a refund of parcel taxes paid shall follow the procedures applicable to property tax refunds pursuant to the California Revenue and Taxation Code.

- **Section 3. Authority for Ordering Election.** That the authority for ordering the election is contained in Section 50075 *et seq.* of the Government Code and Section 4 of Article XIIIA of the California Constitution.
- **Section 4. Authority for Specifications.** That the authority for the specification of this election order is contained in Section 5322 of the Education Code.
- Section 5. Resolution to County Registrar and Clerk and County Superintendent of Schools. That the Clerk of the Board is hereby directed to cause certified copies of this Resolution and Order to be delivered not later than March 7, 2012, to the Contra Costa County Superintendent of Schools and not later than March 7, 2012, to the Contra Costa County Registrar of Voters (the "County Registrar"), as the officer conducting the election, and to the Contra Costa County Clerk of the Board of Supervisors (the "County Clerk").
- **Section 6. Formal Notice.** That the Contra Costa County Superintendent of Schools is hereby requested to prepare and execute a Formal Notice of Parcel Tax Election and consolidation order in substantially the form attached hereto as Exhibit C (the "Formal Notice"), and to call the election by causing the Formal Notice to be posted pursuant to Section 5362 of the Education Code by March 7, 2012, or to otherwise cause the notice to be published as permitted by law. The Clerk of the Board, on behalf of and as may be requested by the County Superintendent of Schools, is authorized to cause all notices required by law in connection herewith to be published and posted, as the case may be.

- **Section 7. Full Ballot Text.** That the Board hereby determines to include within the ballot pamphlet the Full Ballot Text attached hereto as Exhibit B, which is hereby approved and adopted by the Board.
- **Section 8. Conduct of Election.** (a) *Request to Registrar of Voters.* Pursuant to Section 5303 of the Education Code, the Registrar of Voters is requested to take all steps to hold the election in accordance with law and these specifications.
- (b) *Voter Pamphlet*. That the Registrar of Voters is hereby requested to reprint the measure in its entirety (the Full Ballot Text located in Exhibit B attached hereto) in the voter information pamphlet to be distributed to voters pursuant to Section 13307 of the Elections Code. In the event the Full Ballot Text of the measure will not be reprinted in the voter information pamphlet in its entirety, the Registrar of Voters is hereby requested to print, immediately below the impartial analysis of the measure, in no less than 10-point boldface type, a legend substantially as follows:

The above statement is an impartial analysis of Measure \_\_\_\_. If you desire a copy of the measure, please call the Contra Costa County Registrar of Voters at (phone number) and a copy will be mailed at no cost to you.

- (c) Consolidation. That the County Registrar and the Contra Costa County Board of Supervisors are hereby requested to consolidate the election ordered hereby with any and all other elections to be held on June 5, 2012, within the District.
- (d) Canvass of Results. That the Board of Supervisors of the County is authorized to canvass the returns of the election pursuant to Section 10411 of the Elections Code.
- **Section 9. Appropriations Limit.** That the Board of Education shall provide in each year (pursuant to Section 7902.1 of the Government Code or any successor provision of law) for any increase in the District's appropriations limit as shall be necessary to ensure that proceeds of the parcel tax may be spent for the authorized purposes.
- **Section 10. Notice and Hearing.** Subject to two-thirds voter approval and prior to adoption of a resolution levying the qualified special tax in any given year, this Board shall have conducted a public hearing on the matter. Notice of the time, date, and place of hearing shall have been published pursuant to California Government Code Section 54954.6. Following said hearing this Board may adopt a resolution fixing the amount of tax to be raised and the rates for each type of property. Any tax levied shall become a lien upon the properties against which taxes are assessed and collectible.
- **Section 11. Ballot Arguments.** That the President of this Board and/or her designees are hereby authorized to prepare and file with the Registrar of Voters a ballot argument in favor of the proposition contained in Exhibit A hereto, or act as an author of any ballot argument prepared in connection with the election, including a rebuttal argument, each within the time established by the Registrar of Voters, which shall be considered the official ballot arguments of this Board as sponsor of the proposition.

**Section 12. Official Actions.** That the Superintendent, President of the Board, or their designees are hereby authorized to execute any other document and to perform all acts necessary to amend the tax measure on the ballot including making alterations in the ballot language stated in Exhibits A and B hereto to comply with requirements of law and election officials.

Section 13. Effective Date. That this resolution shall take effect from and after its adoption.

#### **FULL BALLOT TEXT**

The following is the full ballot text of the proposition to be presented to the voters by the West Contra Costa Unified School District in the ballot pamphlet:

- maintaining reduced class sizes for the youngest children,
- retaining quality teachers,
- supporting libraries,
- improving campus safety,
- preparing students for college/workforce;

shall West Contra Costa Unified School District renew its existing parcel tax for five years, increasing it by three cents/square foot of building area (to 10.2 cents/square foot) or three dollars/vacant parcel (to 10.2 dollars/vacant parcel), with no funds for administrator salaries, exempting seniors and requiring citizen oversight?

The purpose of the special tax is to improve the quality of education in the District by supporting the following programs:

- maintaining core academic programs such as math, science, reading and writing,
- preparing students for college and the workforce,
- supporting science laboratories, materials and activities,
- attracting and retaining quality teachers and counselors,
- supporting libraries, arts and music,
- maintaining reduced class sizes for the youngest children,
- improving technology and computer training for all students,
- reducing class sizes for middle school and high school students,
- improving safety on and around our campuses,
- supporting after-school programs to keep kids away from gangs and drugs,
- maintaining high school athletic programs,

- maintaining summer school programs to allow students to catch up,
- purchasing textbooks and other student materials and supplies,
- maintaining safe and clean schools.

An exemption shall be granted annually on any single family residential parcel or multifamily dwelling unit owned by one or more persons 65 years of age or older or persons who receive Supplemental Security Income for a disability, regardless of age, who occupies said parcel or unit as a principal residence, upon annual application to the District for exemption.

Pursuant to California Constitution Article XIIIB and applicable laws, the appropriations limit for the District will be adjusted periodically by the aggregate sum collected by levy of this special tax.

#### Accountability

The proceeds of the special tax shall be applied only for the specific purposes identified above. The proceeds of the special tax shall be deposited into an account, which shall be kept separate and apart from other accounts of the District. No later than January 1 of each year while the tax is in effect, commencing January 1, 2013, the chief fiscal officer of the District shall prepare and file with the Board of Education a report detailing the amount of funds collected and expended during the prior fiscal year, and the status of any project or description of any programs authorized to be funded by this measure. Parcel Tax funds shall also be subject to an annual independent financial audit which shall be made public, including oversight by the Community Budget Advisory Committee and posting on the District's website.

#### **Basis of Tax**

The current parcel tax shall be increased to an annual tax of 10.2 cents per square foot of total building area on each parcel of taxable real property within the District or a tax of \$10.20 per unimproved parcel of taxable real property. The District shall provide the Contra Costa County Treasurer-Tax Collector a report indicating the parcel number and amount of tax for each parcel of taxable real property. The number of square feet of total building area on improved real property shall be obtained from the Contra Costa County Tax Assessor. If that information is missing from the tax assessor's records, the number of square feet of total building area shall be based upon the records of the building department for the applicable jurisdiction.

#### **Definition of Parcel of Taxable Real Property**

"Parcel of taxable real property" shall be defined as any unit of real property in the District that receives a separate tax bill for *ad valorem* property taxes from the Contra Costa County Treasurer-Tax Collector's Office. All property that is otherwise exempt from or on which are levied no *ad valorem* property taxes in any year shall also be exempt from the parcel tax in such year. Parcels owned and occupied by persons 65 years of age or older or persons receiving Supplemental Security Income for a disability regardless of age, may be exempt from the parcel tax, subject to annual application, as described above.

For purposes of this special tax, any such "Parcels" which are (i) contiguous, (ii) used solely for owner-occupied, single-family residential purposes, and (iii) held under identical ownership may, by annually submitting an application of the owners thereof by July 1 of any year to the Board of Education be treated as a single "parcel" for purposes of the levy of this education parcel tax.

#### Severability

The Board of Education hereby declares, and the voters by approving this measure concur, that every section and part of this measure has independent value, and the Board of Education and the voters would have adopted each provision hereof regardless of every other provision hereof. Upon approval of this measure by the voters, should any part be found by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid for any reason, all remaining parts hereof shall remain in full force and effect to the fullest extent allowed by law.

- supporting libraries,
- improving campus safety,
- preparing students for college/workforce;

shall West Contra Costa Unified School District renew its existing parcel tax for five years, increasing it by three cents/square foot of building area or three dollars/vacant parcel, with no funds for administrator salaries, exempting seniors and requiring citizen oversight?
