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|  | HHS is a 4-year comprehensive high school. The High School enrollment is 865 including 225 <br> seniors. The school day is seven periods of 58 minutes each. All classes meet five days a week <br> during two 18-week semesters. Hercules High School offers a college preparatory program <br> including 14 AP and 3 Honors courses. |

Student Body: Hercules High School reflects the community's rich cultural diversity. Our ethnic make up is: 27\% African American; 21\% Asian; 23\% Filipino; 20\% Hispanic/Latino; 7\% Caucasian. Approximately $9 \%$ of our high school students are English Language Learners; $42 \%$ qualify for free or reduced lunch. The student/counselor ratio is 433:1.

Community Characteristics:

The city of Hercules is located in the western portion of Contra Costa County along the I-80 corridor that runs through the San Francisco Bay Area. It is within thirty minutes of San Francisco and sixty minutes from Sacramento. The population of Hercules is 25,500 . It continues to grow in population but still maintains an abundance of open space giving it a country/suburban feeling.

School
Programs:

- Hercules High School students have the opportunity to concurrently enroll in Contra Costa, Diablo Valley, or other Community College courses.
- Students are encouraged to start or join one or more of the many clubs on campus. Clubs include: Interact, Journalism, GSA, Mock Trial, Robotics, MESA.
- Hercules High School offers a Publications/yearbook class that has produced our award winning Yearbook.
- Award winning music programs include: Orchestra and Advanced Orchestra, Symphonic Band and Concert Choir.
- Hercules High School offers two pathways including Computer Science and Medical Careers. The Computer Science pathway includes courses in Computer Essentials, Computer Programming, and AP Computer Science Principles. The Medical Careers pathway includes courses in Medical Careers, Anatomy and Physiology, and Rehabilitation Therapies/Sports Medicine.

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## Graduation Requirements:

Students must earn a minimum of 225 credits, specified by category below. Five units per semester are granted in all courses when a passing grade of $D$ - or above is earned. Seniors at all district high schools must complete a Service Learning Project which includes 20 hours of community service in addition to a written project in order to receive a diploma.

## Grading:

Letter grades are assigned a numerical value as follows:

The lowest passing grade is a D-. The cumulative GPA is the average of all courses since the beginning of the ninth grade, including non-college preparatory classes, such as PE. Honors courses are designated [H] and Advanced Placement courses are designated [AP]. College preparatory courses are indicated on the transcript with a "P" and meet the University of California A-G requirements. Plus and Minus signs appear on the transcript but are not used in computing grade point averages. Final transcripts reflect weighted and unweighted averages. AP, Honors and some community college courses are assigned an extra grade point for C or better work. Class rank is computed by the weighted GPA of 10th-11th grades.
