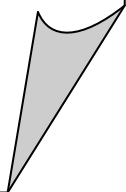

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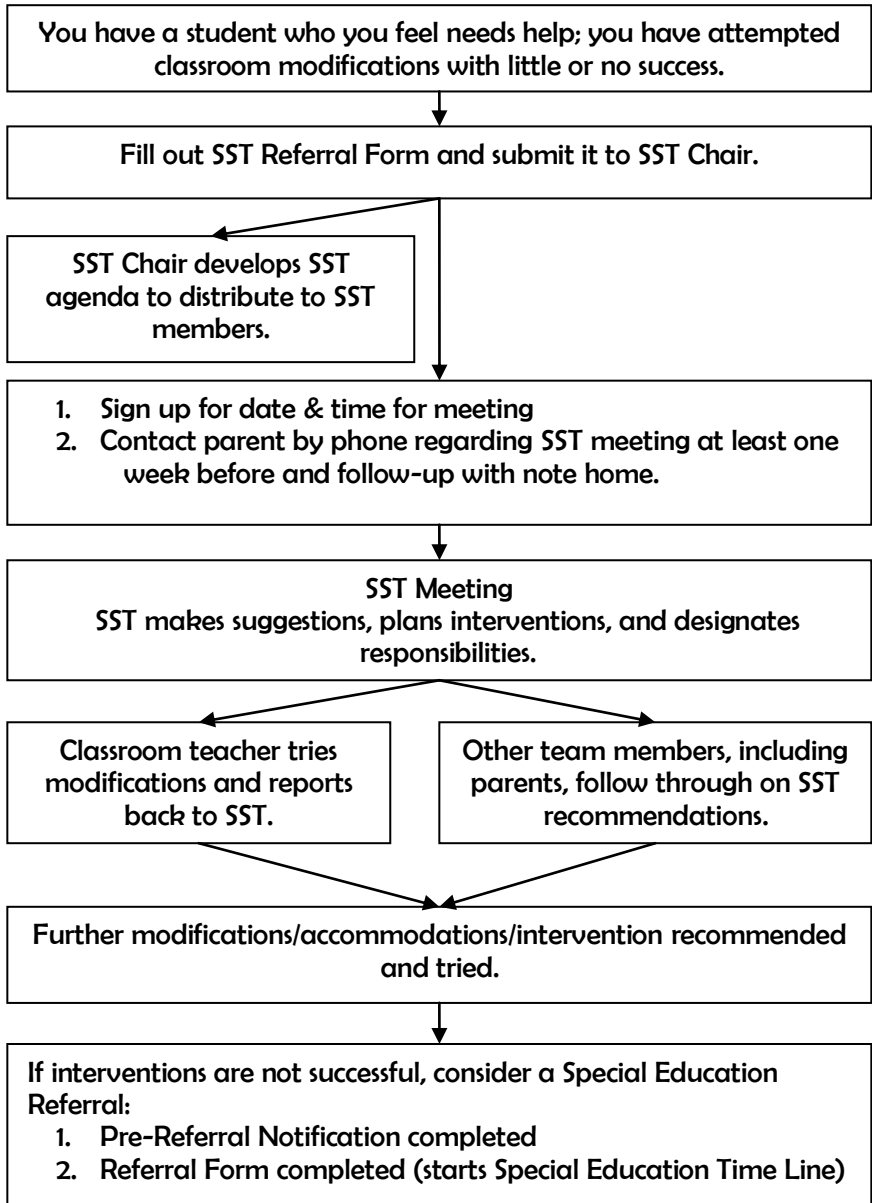

School-Based Health Centers

What is a school-based health center?

School-based health centers are health clinics located on school campuses. They encompass a variety of models – from large secondary school clinics with full-time medical and mental health staff to smaller part-time clinics offering a limited set of services. In some cases, health services are provided on campus by mobile vans.

What types of services do school-based health centers provide?

School-based health centers offer a range of services including

- mental health counseling
- reproductive health services
- comprehensive sex education
- medical services (off-campus or mobile vans)
- crisis communication
- condom availability program

WCCUSD California State Preschool Program

The WCCUSD State Preschool Program, funded by the California Department of Child Development division, is a preschool program for children from 3 and 5 years old who are from low-income families. Enrollment priority is given to 4-year-olds. As a child-centered program, WCCUSD State Preschool adds to a joyful childhood and is filled with inviting, developmental learning experiences. Parent education and involvement is supported and encouraged. In partnership with parents, children are prepared for success in school and community.

Highlights

- A free clean, safe supportive environment at multiple sites
- A state licensed center
- Child/adult ratio of 8:1
- Lunch for morning and afternoon sessions
- Parent education classes
- Kindergarten transition support

Who is eligible?

- Families that meet the low-income eligibility scale set by the State of California

Foster Children and Youth

Who are foster youth?

Foster children may live in foster homes, group homes, shelters, or transitional housing. They are wards of the state or emancipated minors.

What are their rights? Some of their rights are outlined below.

The right to live in a safe, comfortable home with

- enough clothes and healthy food
- their own place to store their things
- an allowance, if living in a group home
- a phone that they can use to make confidential calls*

The right to

- be treated with respect
- go to religious services and activities of their choice
- send and receive unopened mail*
- contact people who are not in the foster care system
- make contact with people involved in their case
- be told about their placement by a caseworker
- go to court and talk to the judge
- see and get a copy of their court report and case plan
- keep their court records private*
- be told about any changes in their case plan or placement
- see a doctor, dentist, eye doctor if needed
- talk to a counselor if needed
- refuse to take medicines, vitamins or herbs*
- go to school every day
- go to age-appropriate after-school activities
- visit and contact their brothers and sisters*
- contact parents and other family members*

* unless a judge has ruled differently for that individual

Homeless Children and Youth

Who is "homeless"?

Students who

- lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence
- are temporarily living with friends or relatives due to loss of housing or economic hardship
- are staying in a shelter, transitional housing, motel, vehicle, or campground
- are not in the physical custody of a parent or guardian

Types of assistance

Assistance available to homeless children and youth through the WCCUSD Families in Transition Office:

- Transportation assistance for students who reside a mile or more from their school, and for one parent if the child is in 3rd grade or below
- School supplies
- Assistance with school enrollment
- Referrals to community agencies

WCCUSD Student Bus Transportation Programs

Access to free student transportation is limited in West County. However, there are several programs available to specific categories of WCCUSD students.

The Student Bus Pass Program (SBPP) 510-307-4527

High school students who are part of the Free/Reduced Lunch Program qualify for the Student Bus Pass Program (SBPP), which provides a free AC Transit youth pass *or* a \$15.00 WestCAT ticket (good for 15 trips) each month of the school year.

The SBPP has funds for 2,000 bus passes per month and they are provided on a first-come, first-served basis until the funds run out. Students accepted into the SBPP program will receive a monthly pass as long as they maintain satisfactory attendance. Students who meet the criteria but submit late applications will be put on a waiting list.

How to sign up:

1. Complete a Free and Reduced Lunch Program application for this school year.
2. Complete an SBPP application for this year. These are available from school counselors or the SBPP office.

Clipper Card 510-817-1717

AC Transit is transitioning away from paper youth passes toward a multi-agency transit card. The Youth Clipper Card has a photo of the child. SBPP participants will eventually have their youth pass loaded onto the card each month by WCCUSD. Families not in the SBPP can take their child's Clipper Card to any Walgreen's and load a "Monthly Youth Pass" for \$15. NCLB Public School Choice bus passes

The law requires districts to identify schools that have not made adequate yearly academic growth for two consecutive years and to designate them as Program Improvement (PI) schools. Once a school has been identified, the district is required to provide students attending that school the option of transferring to another school within the district that is not identified for improvement and where there is space available. The district must provide or pay for transportation to the new school within certain budgetary restrictions. The district is required to provide transportation to the new school only as long as the student's original school remains in Program Improvement.

Under this program, students can receive a free bus pass from AC Transit and/or WestCat to the non-PI school he/she has transferred to. If the child is in grade 3 or below a parent may also be eligible for the free pass in order to accompany the child on the bus. Families in Transition Program

Students who lack permanent housing can receive bus passes if they reside a mile or more from their school. If the child is in 3rd grade or below, a parent can also receive a bus pass to accompany the child to and from school.

Student Transfer Policy & Process

Students wishing to transfer within WCCUSD must complete an Open Enrollment Application. Open enrollment transfers are subject to space availability at the requested site. Not all schools will have space for open enrollment requests. Open enrollment transfer requests will be considered according to the following priorities:

1. No Child Left Behind Act of 2001: A transfer may be requested by a student attending a school that has not made adequate yearly academic growth for two consecutive years as determined by the California Department of Education (schools in this position are referred to as being in Program Improvement or PI). The transfer must be to a school that is not in Program Improvement.
2. Safety transfer: A student may be given priority for attendance outside his/her current attendance area when special circumstances exist that may be harmful or dangerous to that particular student.
3. Program transfer: A high school student may transfer to participate in a program if the course is not offered at the high school of residence. Elementary students may transfer for bilingual programs.
4. Sibling transfer: A student may request to transfer to a school if a sibling will be attending the requested school at the same time.

Some transfer requests may not be granted if there is no space in the requested school. For more information about the Transfer Policy, please contact the Transfer Office at 510-307-4535 or email Transferoffice@wccusd.net.

Truancy Procedures

How is truancy defined?

According to Education Code 48260, a student is defined as a truant upon a third unexcused absence or tardy in excess of 30 minutes.

School Attendance Review Team (SART)

A school's SART, SST or other team may refer students with truancy problems to the SWAT.

Student Welfare and Attendance Team (SWAT)

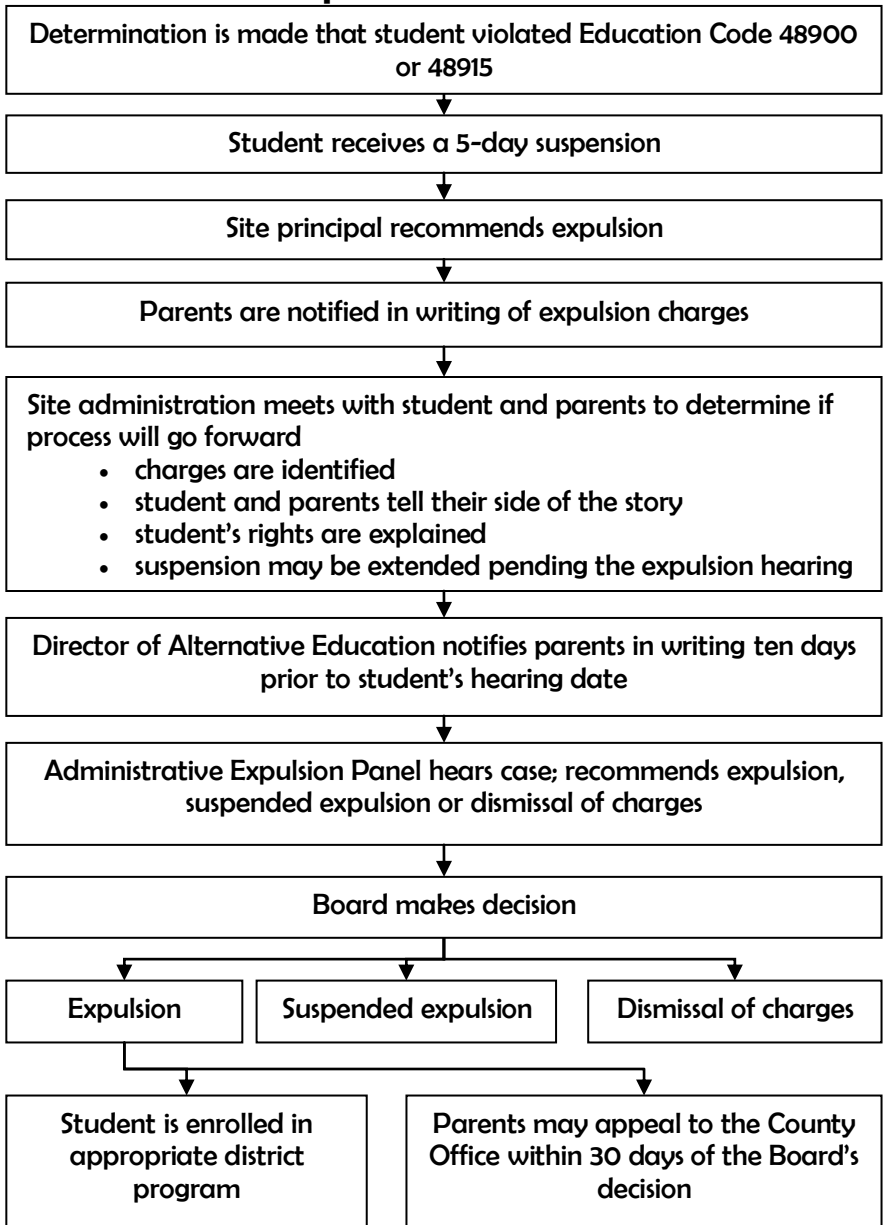

The SWAT is a truancy reduction program operated by WCCUSD in conjunction with city and county law enforcement agencies.

SWAT administers the School-Community Police Truant Recovery Program. Students out of school without a valid excuse may be detained and transported to the SWAT office. Parents will be called to pick up their child.

In addition to schools referring students, a parent or guardian who has problems with a son or daughter not attending school may contact SWAT for assistance by calling the number above.

Reporting Suspected Child Abuse

What is Child Abuse?

Child abuse is the non-accidental injury of a child. It includes physical, sexual, and emotional abuse, exploitation, and neglect.

Who are Mandated Reporters?

All district employees who work with children are “mandated reporters”—legally required to report if they know of or have “reasonable suspicion” of child abuse or neglect encountered in the scope of their employment. “Reasonable suspicion” may be formed through direct observation of an abusive act, a statement by a child describing the abuse, or observation of signs of possible abuse. The responsibility is to report—not investigate—suspected cases.

What Must a Mandated Reporter Do?

1. Call CPS as soon as possible to make a verbal report of “reasonable suspicion.” Provide
 - your name (as the mandated reporter)
 - the name and current location of the child
 - the nature and extent of the injury or neglect
2. Within 36 hours, submit a Suspected Child Abuse Report Form. California law requires that these forms be available at each school site. They are also available online.

Should an Administrator or Counselor Call for Me?

Reporting is an individual responsibility. No supervisor or administrator may interfere with the individual reporting responsibility nor may any mandated reporter be absolved of

responsibility by relying on a supervisor or administrator to meet his or her individual reporting responsibility.

The identity of the mandated reporter is kept confidential.

You may choose to share with your site administrator that CPS may be coming to campus. Sharing this is not required but could help to minimize disruption.

What Happens After a Referral is Made?

"Children's Protective Services is responsible for investigating the referral once it is made. The investigation may also involve the police or sheriff based upon the nature of the allegation. When abuse has occurred within a family, our emphasis is intervention to assure the safety of the child and then to provide services to keep the family together." — *Contra Costa County Children and Family Services*

Remember:

- Do not take it upon yourself to weigh the credibility of a child's account. Report any incident where a child claims abuse.
- You cannot be held liable for reporting suspected child abuse, even if investigation discloses that the child was not abused.
- Failure to report can result in a fine of \$1000, six months in jail, or both—plus possible revocation of your credential.
- If in doubt, report at once—a child's life may be at stake.

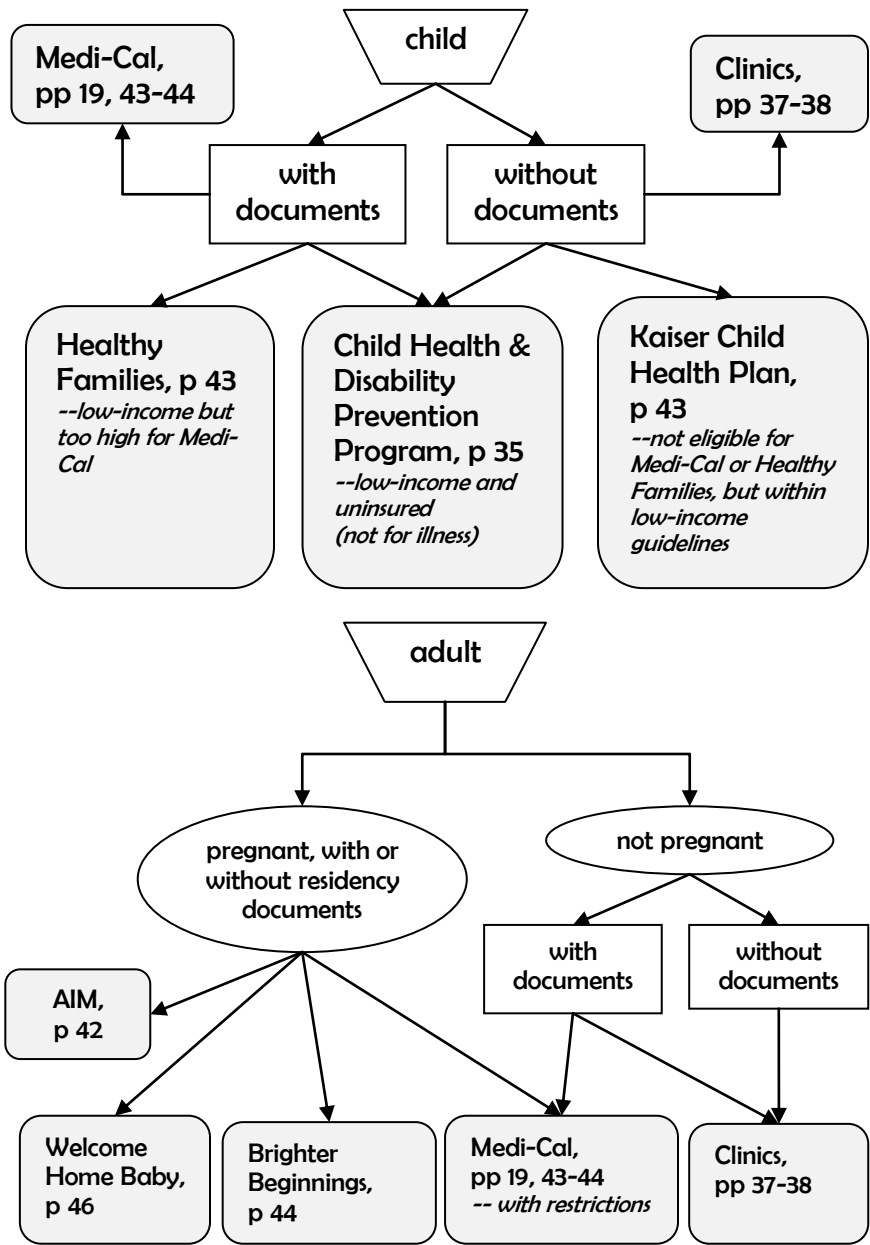

Pathways to Low-Cost Health Care



Medi-Cal

Medi-Cal provides medical, dental, and vision insurance to low-income families in California.

Who is eligible?

- Adults who are 65 years of age or older
- Adults who are parents or caretaker relatives with children under 21 years of age living with them
- Adults who are legally blind or disabled
- Children, birth through age 20
- Refugees in the country 12 months or less
- Pregnant women who cannot afford to pay for health care

For full-scope Medi-Cal, citizenship or legal residency is required. Undocumented children and young adults can receive coverage for emergency or pregnancy-related services.

How much does it cost?

Costs for Medi-Cal services vary. Some services are free.

How does someone apply?

Call toll-free in Contra Costa County. Be prepared to wait on hold for up to half an hour. When you call, an application packet will be sent to you. After the application is filled, it can be returned by mail or turned in to one of the offices. Be sure to get a receipt. Applications are sent to an eligibility worker who will determine which programs or services of Medi-Cal you are eligible for. You can call to check on the status of your application at any time. The process is currently taking 45-60 days.

California Work Opportunity & Responsibility to Kids (CalWORKS) is a welfare program that gives cash aid and services to eligible needy California families. If a family has little or no cash and needs housing, food, utilities, clothing or medical care, they may be eligible to receive immediate short-term help. Families that apply and qualify for ongoing assistance will receive money each month to help pay for housing, food and other necessities.

The amount that a family will get each month depends on a number of factors, including the number of people who are eligible and the special needs of any of those family members. The income of the family is considered in calculating the amount of cash aid the family receives.

How to apply:

1. Families requesting assistance must complete an application at one of the addresses below.
2. Next, the welfare office will set up an interview for you to obtain facts and verify eligibility. Applicants must provide:
 - proof of income /property
 - residence/shelter costs
 - citizenship status
 - work or school status
 - age
 - other information
 - social security number

Similar information may be requested for all of the people in the home. Additionally, adult family members must also be fingerprinted and photo imaged.

3. At the interview, the County will advise applicants of the rules that must be met to be eligible for CalWORKS.

Food Stamps

What is the Food Stamp Program?

The Food Stamp Program is a nutrition assistance program in which eligible low-income households can purchase food at participating grocery stores with the use of Electronic Benefit Transfer (EBT) cards that look like a credit card or bank debit card.

How much money can you have and still get food stamps?

Households may have no more than \$2,000 in assets (bank account, cash, etc.); households with at least one person age 60 or older can have \$3,000 in assets. Your house, personal belongings, and vehicles do not count. A household's gross monthly income cannot exceed 130% of the Federal poverty guidelines. For a household of three, this is \$1,984. A household's net monthly income cannot exceed 100% of the Federal poverty guidelines. For a household of three, this is \$1,526.

What can be purchased with food stamps?

Food stamps can be used to buy any food or food product that is produced for human consumption, including seeds and plants for use in home gardens to produce food. Hot foods or lunch counter items prepared or heated in the store are not eligible. Alcoholic beverages, tobacco, vitamins, medicines, pet food, soap, toilet paper, shampoo and other non-food items are also excluded.

If you know or suspect that child abuse or neglect has occurred, call the toll-free number. If the child is in immediate danger, call the police and Children and Family Services. A social worker will

talk with you confidentially and assess the degree of risk involved. If the child is in immediate danger, a visit will occur immediately. If not, a visit may occur within 10 days. When a situation is reported to CFS, resources to promote the future safety of the child are offered (i.e. counseling, parent education, respite care, transportation, parent aides, etc.)

California's Child Support Services Program works with parents - custodial and noncustodial - and guardians to ensure children and families receive court-ordered financial and medical support.

They can help establish court orders for paternity, child support, and medical coverage; locate the non-custodial parent and his/her assets to enforce the court order; collect and distribute support payments; maintain accounts of payments paid and due; modify court orders when appropriate; enforce court orders for child, family, spousal, and medical support. [Turbo Court](#) guides you through the child support application, completes and (optionally) electronically submits your forms, and keeps you informed of your case's progress. [Customer Connect](#) is an automated system designed to provide specific case information 24 hr/day.
