*CI C.13 Ratification and Approval of Negotiated Change Orders

Comment

Staff is seeking ratification of Change Orders on the following current District construction projects: Collins ES Fire Alarm, Kennedy HS Field Lighting, Ohlone Phase 1 Campus Replacement, De Anza HS Replacement Campus, Coronado ES Interim Campus, Pinole Valley HS Video Surveillance System, El Cerrito HS Multi-Use Sport Fields, and Nystrom Interim Housing/Site Package. Change Orders are fully executed by the District upon signature by the Superintendent's designee. Board ratification is the final step required under state law in order to complete payment and contract adjustment.

In addition to normal ratification, approval of the noted Change Orders for the Kennedy HS Field Lighting, and El Cerrito Multi-Use Sports Fields projects is required by the Board, with special findings as noted below, because these projects are in excess of the Public Contract Code limit of 10% of the original contract value. In accordance with Public Contract Code 20118.4, the Board, by approving and ratifying these Change Orders, finds that it would have been futile to publicly bid the work in question because of the tight time frames to complete this work without affecting the operations of the District, and that the public is best served by having this work completed by the contractor on the project.

*CI C.14 Resolution No. 24-1213: Level I Developer Fees

Comment:

Government Code Sections 65995 regarding School Facilities fees requires an analysis for School Facilities to be conducted annually to determine the amount charged for developer fees for Level I residential construction. Due to student generation factors and site acquisition costs, the Level I fee will increase from \$2.97 per square foot to \$3.20 per square foot for residential construction, and \$.51 per square foot for commercial and industrial construction. The mini-storage category of commercial/industrial construction will increase from \$0.03 per square foot to \$0.05. The new fee will go into effect December 10, 2012, if approved by the Board. If not approved by the Board, the District would be eligible to collect Level I fees at the current Level I rates of \$2.97 per square foot for residential construction, \$0.47 per square foot for commercial and industrial construction and \$0.03 for the mini-storage category. Level I fees would be charged for new residential construction as well as for additions. This analysis was conducted according to State guidelines.

A copy of the School Facilities analysis is available for review by the public in the Facilities Planning and Construction Department.

*CI C.15 Changes to Current Local Business Capacity Program for the District's Bond Construction Projects

Comment:

The District's Bond Construction Program currently has Local Hiring and Local Business Utilization programs in place to ensure that bonds support local businesses and encourage hiring local residents.

On September 15, 2010, urged by community members, the Board approved a mandatory program based on capacity on a project by project basis. Over the last two years, and after extensive review of the capacity available in our community and analyzing history of bid results, staff documented challenges of the mandatory local capacity program, as well as fiscal impact on our bond program. A presentation was made on September 11, 2012 to the Facilities Subcommittee recommending that we revert to using the previous good faith language for all upcoming projects, based on the lack of capacity by local firms to meet the minimum standards. The members of the Facilities Subcommittee voted and approved the recommendation.

In 2011-2012, CDE conducted a Federal Program Monitoring (FPM) Review of WCCUSD. The school level Title-I Parental Involvement Policies for Bayview, Helms, Kennedy High and Richmond High were found to be noncompliant due to missing key language. Schools rewrote their policies and redistributed them to families in May of 2012. The law requires the Governing Board to certify the policies and any subsequent revision.

*CI C.19 Richmond Charter Academy Middle School Material Revision of the Charter Petition

Comment:

On February 8, 2012, West Contra Costa Unified School District received a charter petition ("Petition") from Lead Petitioner Jorge Lopez proposing a charter school to be known as Richmond Charter Academy Middle School ("Charter School"). (Petitioners originally submitted a petition to establish the Charter School on November 29, 2011; however it was withdrawn prior to consideration by the District's Governing Board ("Board").)

According to the California Education Code, a school district governing board considering whether to grant a charter petition "shall be guided by the intent of the Legislature that charter schools are and should become an integral part of the California educational system and that establishment of charter schools should be encouraged." (Ed. Code, § 47605(b).) With this legislative intent in mind, the governing board must grant a charter "if it is satisfied that granting the charter is consistent with sound educational practice." (Ed. Code, § 47605(b).)

Upon receipt, components of the Petition were assigned to various staff members of the District for review and analysis based on individual areas of expertise.

Staff and legal counsel reviewed the Petition and prepared the *Staff Written Findings Regarding Richmond Charter Academy Middle School Petition* ("Findings"). The Findings also include Staff's Recommendation to the Board to approve the Petition with conditions.

A public hearing before the Board was scheduled to consider the level of support for the Petition. This Board meeting was held March 7, 2012. The Petitioner requested that the Board waives his right to a public presentation in accordance to Education Code section 47605(b). The Board honored the Petitioner's request.

On March 21, 2012, the Board adopted the Staff's Recommendation and granted a conditional approval dependent upon execution of an operational MOU and special education MOU between the Charter School and the District within 60 days. Conditions of the Petition approval were met on June 21, 2012.

As presented in the Petition, the Charter School will be governed by a nonprofit public benefit corporation, but the District will be responsible for oversight of the Charter School. The Charter School expects to serve approximately 75 students in grades 6 and 7 in its first year of operation (2012-2013 school year), increasing to a maximum of 175 students at full implementation in year five (2016-2017 school year).

Petitioners intend the Charter School to achieve a student population from underserved, low-income students in the South, Central Richmond areas, in particular, those that would typically attend De Jean Middle School, the established West Contra Costa Unified School District middle school in the South Richmond area. (Petition, p. 18.)

On September 21, 2012, the District received a request for the Board to approve a Material Revision ("Revision") to the recently-approved Petition. The Revision intends "to reconcile the lottery procedures to conform to both state and federal law for the submission of the Public Charter School Grant Program" by modifying the Admission Requirements for the Charter School.

Specifically, the Revision provides additional detail regarding the lottery process to be implemented when the number of applicants exceeds capacity for any grade level. Should such a situation exist at the end of the Charter School's open enrollment period, the Revision proposes a single random public lottery for admission. Children of Charter School founders and teaching staff (not to exceed 10% of total enrollment), and siblings of students already enrolled or admitted during the course of the random public lottery will be exempt from the lottery. In addition, a 2:1 preference will be granted to District residents in the form of two lottery numbers and cards instead of one. Once the student lists for each grade level is set, students still wishing to enroll will be placed on a rank-ordered wait list should space become available.

Pursuant to the Charter Schools Act of 1992 ("Act"), Education Code section 47600 *et seq.*, the Legislature has charged local school boards with the responsibility for reviewing and acting on petitions by charter schools. Revisions made to a charter petition are governed by the same standards and criteria set out for charter petitions in Education Code section 47605. (Ed. Code, § 47607, subd. (a)(2).) A Material Revision of the provisions of the Petition may be made only with the approval of the authority that granted the charter. (Ed. Code, § 47607, subd. (a)(1).) The changed Admission Requirements, as proposed by the Revision, constitutes a Material Revision to the Petition requiring Board approval.

Upon receipt, the Revision was assigned to various staff members of the District for review and analysis based on individual areas of expertise. Review of the proposed Revision was allocated as follows: Lyn Potter, Director of Educational Services; Steve Collins, Director of Special Education; Sonja Neely-Johnson, Coordinator of Educational Services; Nicole Joyner, Administrator; Linda Jackson, Executive Director, Emeritus; Legal/Operational, Shawn Olson-Brown and William F. Schuetz, Jr. Fagen Friedman & Fulfrost Attorneys at Law.

Staff have reviewed the Revision and prepared the *Staff Written Finding Regarding Richmond Charter Academy* revision to the Charter Petition ("Finding"), which is provided.

Recommendation:

Staff recommends that the Board approve the Charter School Material Revision and adopt the proposed Finding as its own.

*CI C.20 Resolution 27-1213: Full Service Community Schools

Comment:

The West Contra Costa Unified School District envisions a future in which all district students are healthy, highly educated and confident as they successfully pursue their postsecondary education and/or career. The Safety Committee has worked in collaboration with the City of San Pablo to improve the Health/Wellness, access and outcomes for WCCUSD students and San Pablo residents. Over the past two years, the Healthy Richmond collaborative has been meeting to think through how to best provide health and wellness services in Richmond. As with other initiatives within the community, WCCUSD schools are seen as places where the needs of young people and opportunities to provide services in the community can come together. The Safety Committee has reviewed and discussed the direction of the

full service community schools initiatives and is bringing a recommendation to the Board for adopting such a resolution. The resolution emphasizes creating schools to develop sets of general principles to guide their work and the work of WCCUSD in implementing Full Service Schools.

* F.1 Public Hearing: Grades K-12 Textbook and Instructional Materials Compliance for Fiscal Year 2012-2013

Comment:

California Education Code Section 60119 guidelines require the governing board of each California school district to hold a public hearing after which the Board will determine, through a resolution, as to whether each pupil in each school in the District has sufficient textbooks and instructional materials that are aligned with the academic content standards and are consistent with the content and cycles of the curriculum framework adopted by the State Board of Education in these subjects:

English/Language Arts, including English Language Development

Mathematics

Science

History/Social Science

Foreign Language (if the student is enrolled in a Foreign Language course)

Health (if the student is enrolled in a Health course)

The governing board shall also determine the availability of science laboratory equipment as applicable to science laboratory courses in Grades 9 through 12.

The "Ready Step" assessment will begin this school year 2012-13 for the eighth graders transitioning from to ninth grade.

West Contra Costa Unified School District is one of nine hundred districts partnered across the nation with a focus on the four components of Assessments, College and Career Readiness Resources, Advanced Placement and Professional Development. The College Board recognizes that these tools are needed to assist students to think about college early on.

The National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test uses the PSAT as the exam which determines students' scholarships.

Ms. Merriweather asked how students were recruited for the program. Ms. Williams-Hamp responded the Advance placement (AP) teacher and AP potential data would send letters to the students and their families to suggest that the student to see their school counselors.

The District's accounts receivable was \$57 million for the general fund, this was owed to the District from granting agencies in the State of California. Background Information:

Government Code Sections 65995 regarding School Facilities fees requires an analysis for School Facilities to be conducted annually to determine the amount charged for developer fees for Level I residential construction. Due to student generation factors and site acquisition costs, the Level I fee will increase from \$2.97 per square foot to \$3.20 per square foot for residential construction, and \$.51 per square foot for commercial and industrial construction. The mini-storage category of commercial/industrial construction will increase from \$0.03 per square foot to \$0.05. The new fee will go into effect December 10, 2012, if approved by the Board. If not approved by the Board, the District would be eligible to collect Level I fees at the current Level I rates of \$2.97 per square foot for residential construction, \$0.47 per square foot for commercial and industrial construction and \$0.03 for the mini-storage category. Level I fees would be charged for new residential construction as well as for additions. This analysis was conducted according to State guidelines.

A copy of the School Facilities analysis is available for review by the public in the Facilities Planning and Construction Department.

RESOLUTION NO. 24-1213 (October 10, 2012, Regular Meeting) A RESOLUTION OF THE GOVERNING BOARD OF THE WEST CONTRA COSTA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT INCREASING SCHOOL FACILITIES FEES AS AUTHORIZED BY GOVERNMENT CODE SECTION 65995 (b) 3

WHEREAS, Statute AB 2926 (Chapter 887/Statutes of 1986) authorizes the governing board of any school district to levy a fee, charge, dedication or other form of requirement against any development project for the reconstruction of school facilities; and,

WHEREAS, Government Code Section 65995 establishes a maximum amount of fee that may be charged against such development projects and authorizes the maximum amount set forth in said section to be adjusted for inflation every two years as set forth in the state-wide cost index for Class B construction as determined by the State Allocation Board at its January meeting; and,

WHEREAS, at its January 27, 2012, meeting, the State Allocation Board maintained the maximum fee authorized by Education Code Section 17620 to \$3.20 per square foot of residential construction described in Government Code Section 65995(b)(1) and \$.51 per square foot against commercial and industrial construction described in Government Code Section 65995(b)(2); and.

WHEREAS, the purpose of this Resolution is to approve and adopt fees on residential projects in the amount of \$3.20 per square foot as authorized by Education Code Section 17620; and,

WHEREAS, the purpose of this Resolution is to approve and adopt fees on commercial and industrial development projects in the amount of \$.51 per square foot as described in Government Code Section 65995(b)(2). The mini-storage category of commercial/industrial justification has less impact than the statutory \$.51 per square foot commercial/industrial justification and should be collected at the justified rate of \$0.05 per square foot.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED by the Governing Board of the West Contra Costa Unified School District as follows:

- 1. Procedure. This Board hereby finds that prior to the adoption of this Resolution, the Board conducted a public hearing at which oral and written presentations were made, as part of the Board's regularly scheduled October 10, 2012, meeting. Notice of the time and place of the meeting, including a general explanation of the matter to be considered, has been published twice in a newspaper in accordance with Government Code Section 54994.1, and a notice, including a statement that the data required by Government Code Section 54992 was available, was mailed at least 14 days prior to the meeting to any interested party who had filed a written request with the District for mailed notice of the meeting on new fees or service charges within the period specified by law. Additionally, at least 10 days prior to the meeting, the District made available to the public, data indicating the amount of the cost, or estimated cost, required to provide the service for which the fee or service charge is to be adjusted pursuant to this Resolution, and the revenue sources anticipated to provide this service. By way of such public meeting, the Board received oral and written presentations by District staff which are summarized and contained in the District's Developer Fee Implementation Study dated September 7, 2012, (hereinafter referred to as the "Plan") and which formed the basis for the action taken pursuant to this Resolution.
- 2. Findings. The Board has reviewed the Plan as it relates to proposed and potential development, the resulting school facilities needs, the cost thereof, and the available sources of revenue including the fees provided by this Resolution, and based thereon and upon all other written and oral presentations to the Board, hereby makes the following findings:

- A. Additional development projects within the District, whether new residential construction or residential reconstruction involving increases in assessable area greater than 500 square feet, or new commercial or industrial construction will increase the need for reconstruction of school facilities.
- B. Without reconstruction of present school facilities, any further residential development projects or commercial or industrial development projects within the District will result in a significant decrease in the quality of education presently offered by the District;
- C. The fees proposed in the Plan and the fees implemented pursuant to this Resolution are for the purposes of providing adequate school facilities to maintain the quality of education offered by the District;
- D. The fees proposed in the Plan and implemented pursuant to this Resolution will be used for the reconstruction of school facilities as identified in the Plan;
- E. The uses of the fees proposed in the Plan and implemented pursuant to this Resolution are reasonably related to the types of development projects on which the fees are imposed;
- F. The fees proposed in the Plan and implemented pursuant to this Resolution bear a reasonable relationship to the need for reconstructed school facilities created by the types of development projects on which the fees are imposed;
- G. The fees proposed in the Plan and implemented pursuant to this Resolution do not exceed the estimated amount required to provide funding for the reconstruction of school facilities for which the fees are levied; and in making this finding, the Board declares that it has considered the availability of revenue sources anticipated to provide such facilities, including general fund revenues;
- H. The fees imposed on commercial or industrial development bear a reasonable relationship and are limited to the needs of the community for schools and are reasonably related and limited to the need for reconstructed school facilities caused by the development:
- I. The fees will be collected for school facilities for which an account has been established and funds appropriated and for which the district has adopted a reconstruction schedule and/or to reimburse the District for expenditures previously made.
- 3. Fee. Based upon the foregoing findings, the Board hereby increases the previously levied fee to the amount of \$3.20 per square foot for assessable space for new residential construction and for residential reconstruction to the extent of the resulting increase in assessable areas; and to the amount of \$.51 per square foot for new commercial or industrial construction. The mini-storage category of commercial/industrial justification has less impact than the statutory \$.51 per square foot commercial/industrial justification and should be collected at the justified rate of \$0.05 per square foot.
- 4. Fee Adjustments and Limitation. The fees adjusted herewith shall be subject to the following:
 - A. The amount of the District's fees as authorized by Education Code Section 17620 shall be reviewed every two years to determine if a fee increase according to the adjustment for inflation set forth in the statewide cost index for Class B construction as determined by the State Allocation Board is justified.
 - B. Any development project for which a final map was approved and construction had commenced on or before September 1, 1986, is subject only to the fee, charge, dedication or other form of requirement in existence on that date and applicable to the project.

- C. The term "development project" as used herein is as defined by Section 65928 of the Government
- Additional Mitigation Methods. The policies set forth in this Resolution are not exclusive and the Board reserves the authority to undertake other or additional methods to finance school facilities including but not limited to the Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982 (Government Code Section 53311, et seq.) and such other funding mechanisms. This Board reserves the authority to substitute the dedication of land or other property or other form of requirement in lieu of the fees levied by way of this Resolution at its discretion, so long as the reasonable value of land to be dedicated does not exceed the maximum fee amounts contained herein or modified pursuant hereto.
- Implementation. For residential, commercial or industrial projects within the District, the Superintendent, or the Superintendent's designee, is authorized to issue Certificates of Compliance upon the payment of any fee levied under the authority of this Resolution.
- 7. California Environmental Quality Act. The Board hereby finds that the implementation of Developer Fees is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA).
- Commencement Date. The effective date of this Resolution shall be December 8 which is 60 days following its adoption by the Board.
- 9. Notification of Local Agencies. The Secretary of the Board is hereby directed to forward copies of this Resolution and a Map of the District to the Planning Commission and Board of Supervisors of Contra Costa County and to the Planning Commission and City Council of the Cities of Hercules, Pinole, Richmond, El Cerrito and San Pablo.
- 10. Severability. If any portion of this Resolution is found by a Court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such finding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Resolution. The Board hereby declares its intent to adopt this Resolution irrespective of the fact that one or more of its provisions may be declared invalid subsequent hereto.

At RHS the Title I parent involvement program is an important element of the ongoing weekly parent meetings and workshops. Our Parent Room is equipped with computers and other parent resources and open daily.

RHS sends home bilingual flyers and Connect Ed phone calls; display posters in the school, and make daily bilingual PA announcements.

RHS will ensure that all requests for parental involvement support are met by hiring a Bilingual Community Worker that will organize activities and act as a liasion between the parents and the school. The Community Worker will hold weekly Coffee Club meetings to receive input from parents.

Subject: Richmond Charter Academy Middle School Material Revision of the Charter Petition

Background Information:

On February 8, 2012, West Contra Costa Unified School District received a charter petition ("Petition") from Lead Petitioner Jorge Lopez proposing a charter school to be known as Richmond Charter Academy Middle School ("Charter School"). (Petitioners originally submitted a petition to establish the Charter School on November 29, 2011; however it was withdrawn prior to consideration by the District's Governing Board ("Board").)

According to the California Education Code, a school district governing board considering whether to grant a charter petition "shall be guided by the intent of the Legislature that charter schools are and should become an integral part of the California educational system and that establishment of charter schools should be encouraged." (Ed. Code, § 47605(b).) With this legislative intent in mind, the governing board must grant a charter "if it is satisfied that granting the charter is consistent with sound educational practice." (Ed. Code, § 47605(b).)

Upon receipt, components of the Petition were assigned to various staff members of the District for review and analysis based on individual areas of expertise.

Staff and legal counsel reviewed the Petition and prepared the *Staff Written Findings Regarding Richmond Charter Academy Middle School Petition* ("Findings"). The Findings also include Staff's Recommendation to the Board to approve the Petition with conditions.

A public hearing before the Board was scheduled to consider the level of support for the Petition. This Board meeting was held March 7, 2012. The Petitioner requested that the Board waives his right to a public presentation in accordance to Education Code section 47605(b). The Board honored the Petitioner's request.

On March 21, 2012, the Board adopted the Staff's Recommendation and granted a conditional approval dependent upon execution of an operational MOU and special education MOU between the Charter School and the District within 60 days. Conditions of the Petition approval were met on June 21, 2012.

As presented in the Petition, the Charter School will be governed by a nonprofit public benefit corporation, but the District will be responsible for oversight of the Charter School. The Charter School expects to serve approximately 75 students in grades 6 and 7 in its first year of operation (2012-2013 school year), increasing to a maximum of 175 students at full implementation in year five (2016-2017 school year).

Petitioners intend the Charter School to achieve a student population from underserved, low-income students in the South, Central Richmond areas, in particular, those that would typically attend De Jean Middle School, the established West Contra Costa Unified School District middle school in the South Richmond area. (Petition, p. 18.)

On September 21, 2012, the District received a request for the Board to approve a Material Revision ("Revision") to the recently-approved Petition. The Revision intends "to reconcile the lottery procedures to conform to both state and federal law for the submission of the Public Charter School Grant Program" by modifying the **Admission Requirements** for the Charter School.

Specifically, the Revision provides additional detail regarding the lottery process to be implemented when the number of applicants exceed capacity for any grade level. Should such a situation exist at the end of the Charter School's open enrollment period, the Revision proposes a single random public lottery for admission. Children of Charter School founders and teaching staff (not to exceed 10% of total enrollment), and siblings of students already enrolled or admitted during the course of the random public lottery will be exempt from the lottery. In addition, a 2:1 preference will be granted to District residents in the form of two lottery numbers and cards instead of one. Once the student lists for each grade level is set, students still wishing to enroll will be placed on a rank-ordered wait list should space become available.

Pursuant to the Charter Schools Act of 1992 ("Act"), Education Code section 47600 *et seq.*, the Legislature has charged local school boards with the responsibility for reviewing and acting on petitions by charter schools. Revisions made to a charter petition are governed by the same standards and criteria set out for charter petitions in Education Code section 47605. (Ed. Code, § 47607, subd. (a)(2).) A Material Revision of the provisions of the Petition may be made only with the approval of the authority that granted the charter. (Ed. Code, § 47607, subd. (a)(1).) The changed **Admission Requirements**, as proposed by the Revision, constitutes a Material Revision to the Petition requiring Board approval.

Upon receipt, the Revision was assigned to various staff members of the District for review and analysis based on individual areas of expertise. Review of the proposed Revision was allocated as follows: Lyn Potter, Director of Educational Services; Steve Collins, Director of Special Education; Sonja Neely- Johnson, Coordinator of Educational Services; Nicole Joyner, Administrator; Linda Jackson, Executive Director, Emeritus; Legal/Operational, Shawn Olson-Brown and William F. Schuetz, Jr. Fagen Friedman & Fulfrost Attorneys at Law.

Staff have reviewed the Revision and prepared the *Staff Written Finding Regarding Richmond Charter Academy* revision to the Charter Petition ("Finding"), which is attached.

Staff Written Findings Regarding Richmond Charter Academy Middle School Material Revision to the Charter Petition

Brief Summary

Children of Charter School founders and teaching staff (not to exceed 10% of total enrollment), and siblings of students already enrolled or admitted during the course of the random public lottery will be exempt from the lottery. In addition, a 2:1 preference will be granted to District residents in the form of two lottery numbers and cards instead of one. Once the student lists for each grade level is set, students still wishing to enroll will be placed on a rank-ordered wait list should space become available.

According to the California Education Code, a material revision should receive the same consideration as a newly submitted petition.

Material Revisions to Charter Petitions

Material revisions to charter petitions are governed by the same standards and criteria set out for charter petitions in Education Code section 47605. (Ed. Code, § 47607, subd. (a)(2).) A material revision of the provisions of the Petition may be made only with the approval of the authority that granted the charter. (Ed. Code, § 47607, subd. (a)(1).) The governing board may not deny a material revision to the Petition unless it sets forth specific facts to support one, or more, of the following five findings in section 47605, subdivision (b):

(1) The petitioners are demonstrably unlikely to successfully implement the program set forth in the petition.

- (2) The charter school presents an unsound educational program for the students to be enrolled in the charter school.
- (3) The petition does not contain the number of signatures required by Education Code section 47605, subdivision (a)(1)(A) or (a)(1)(B). Specifically, subdivision (a)(1)(A) requires that the petition be signed by a number of parents or guardians of students equal to at least one-half the number of students that the charter school estimates will enroll in the charter school for its first year of operation. In the alternative, subdivision (a)(1)(B) requires that the petition be signed by a number of teachers that is equivalent to at least one-half of the number of teachers that the charter school estimates will be employed at the school during the first year of operation.
- (4) The petition does not contain an affirmation of certain specific conditions set forth in Education Code section 47605, subdivision (d), including that the Charter School: (1) will be nonsectarian in its admission policies, employment practices, and all other operations; (2) will not charge tuition; and (3) will not discriminate against any student on the basis of the characteristics set forth in Education Code section 220.
- (5) The petition does not contain reasonably comprehensive descriptions of the following elements set forth in Education Code section 47605, subdivision (b)(5)(A-P), which constitute sixteen separate elements that must be addressed in every charter petition.
 - (A) A description of the educational program of the school, designed, among other things, to identify those whom the school is attempting to educate, what it means to be an "educated person" in the 21st century, and how learning best occurs. The goals identified in that program shall include the objective of enabling students to become self-motivated, competent, and lifelong learners.
 - (B) The measurable student outcomes identified for use by the charter school. "Student outcomes" means the extent to which all students of the school demonstrate that they have attained the skills, knowledge, and attitudes specified as goals in the school's educational program.
 - (C) The method by which student progress in meeting those student outcomes is to be measured.
 - (D) The governance structure of the school, including, but not limited to, the process to be followed by the school to ensure parental involvement.
 - (E) The qualifications to be met by individuals to be employed by the school.
 - (F) The procedures that the school will follow to ensure the health and safety of students and staff.

- (G) The means by which the school will achieve a racial and ethnic balance among its students that is reflective of the general population residing within the territorial jurisdiction of the school district to which the charter petition is submitted.
- (H) Admission requirements, if applicable.
- (I) The manner in which annual, independent, financial audits will be conducted, which will employ generally accepted accounting principles, and the manner in which audit exceptions and deficiencies will be resolved to the satisfaction of the chartering authority.
- (J) The procedures by which students can be suspended or expelled.
- (K) The manner by which staff members of the charter schools will be covered by the State Teachers' Retirement System, the Public Employees' Retirement System, or federal social security.
- (L) The public school attendance alternatives for students residing within the school district who choose not to attend charter schools.
- (M) A description of the rights of any employee of the school district upon leaving the employment of the school district to work in a charter school, and of any rights of return to the school district after employment at a charter school.
- (N) The procedures to be followed by the charter school and the entity granting the charter to resolve disputes relating to provisions of the charter.
- (O) A declaration whether or not the charter school will be deemed the exclusive public school employer of the employees of the charter school for the purposes of the Educational Employment Relations Act ("EERA" or "Rodda Act").
- (P) A description of the procedures to be used if the charter school closes. These procedures must ensure a final audit of the school to determine the disposition of all assets and liabilities of the charter school, including plans for disposing of any net assets and for the maintenance and transfer of student records.

Material revisions to a charter petition are also required to include discussion of the impact on the chartering district, including, the facilities to be utilized by the school, the manner in which administrative services will be provided, potential civil liabilities for the school district, and a three year projected operational budget. (Ed. Code, § 47605, subd.(g).)

Recommended Addendum Approval

The District Governing Board shall grant a charter material revision for the operation of a school if it is satisfied that granting the charter is consistent with sound educational practice. (Ed. Code, § 47605, subd.(b).) The Staff has reviewed the proposed Revision to the Petition and finds it to be consistent with sound educational practice. Staff recommends that the Board approve the Charter School Material Revision and adopt the proposed Finding as its own.

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA)

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) (20 U.S.C. § 1232g; 34 CFR Part 99) is a Federal law that protects the privacy of student education records. The law applies to all schools that receive funds under an applicable program of the U.S. Department of Education.

FERPA gives parents certain rights with respect to their children's education records, which can be in writing, print; or in the form of a video, or audio recording, film, microfilm, or microfiche. These rights transfer to the student when he or she reaches the age of 18 or attends a school beyond the high school level. Students to whom the rights have transferred are "eligible students."

Generally, the school must have written permission from the parent or eligible student in order to release any information from a student's education record. The school will use best judgment in accordance with the law on a case by case basis in regards to student information and written requests. Moreover, schools may disclose, without consent, "directory" information such as a student's name, address, telephone number, date and place of birth, honors and awards, and dates of attendance.

ELEMENT VII: RACIAL AND ETHNIC BALANCE

Governing Law - The means by which the school will achieve a racial and ethnic balance among its pupils that is reflective of the general population residing within the territorial jurisdiction of the school district to which the charter petition is submitted,

CA Education Code 47605 (b) (5) (G).

RCA shall strive to achieve a student population from South, Central Richmond, and the greater WCCUSD area that recognizes and values the schools mission and vision statements and is committed to the instructional and operational philosophy. No test or assessment shall be administered to students prior to acceptance and enrollment into the charter school.

As previously noted, students will be considered for admission without regard to ethnicity, national origin, gender, disability, sexual orientation, race, gender identity or achievement level. Recruitment strategy will be carried out throughout various communities to provide families with the opportunity to participate in the school. Richmond Charter Academy will work with various community organizations, churches, stores, merchant associations, bay area charter schools, and public schools within the West Contra Costa Unified School District boundaries to recruit a student population that reflects the community.

The application process is comprised of the following:

- Completion of a student interest form, which includes basic student and family identification information for the purposes of entry into public random drawing
- Upon selection for admission pursuant to public random drawing, the registration process will include the following:

- Student enrollment form which contains student name, address, and other identifying and demographic information
- Proof of Immunization
- Home Language Survey
- Completion of Emergency Medical Information Form
- Proof of minimum age requirements, e.g. birth certificate

Recruiting and Marketing

The school acknowledges that recruitment of students is the responsibility of the charter school. In compliance with federal law, the recruitment efforts of the school to target all populations within the area, regardless of race, disability, ethnicity, or gender. The school will explore as many avenues of outreach as possible to guarantee a broad spectrum of exposure during its recruitment process.

The school will implement a recruitment strategy that includes, but is not necessarily limited to, the following elements or strategies which focus on achieving and maintaining a racial and ethnic balance among students that is reflective of the general population residing within the territorial jurisdiction of West Contra Costa Unified School District.

The school will reach out to students and parents through a variety of methods, including:

- Attending elementary school, and middle school option fairs;
- Meeting with local Athletic Teams and leagues;
- Hosting open houses at the school and partnering campuses;
- Press releases and other communications with local news media;
- Posting of notices or banners in libraries and other public buildings and spaces, as well as with local businesses and religious institutions.
- Working with community organizations to reach families in the local area;
- Word of mouth among parents in the community; and
- Speaking or distributing flyers at local churches, recreation centers, and groups working with families

Outreach efforts and materials will be provided in Spanish, Vietnamese, Lao, Mien and Mandarin languages as needed. General information sheets, and other key documents, including the school vision and mission statement will be provided in the multiple languages as well. The goal is to have the majority of students enrolled by April 25th of the first school year. Summer school session will be set in coordination with charter petition timelines, and local elementary school schedules. Richmond Charter Academy will also host at minimum, two (2) community events to promote the opening of the school and to disperse applications and school informational.

The charter school shall maintain an accurate accounting of the ethnic and racial balance of students enrolled in the school, along with documentation of the efforts the school has made to achieve racial and ethnic balance in accordance with the charter petition and standards of charter legislation. Parents are responsible for completing a preliminary enrollment form and

submitting it before the set deadline. If the enrollment form is completed and turned in by the deadline, this will secure conditional acceptance. The enrollment phase will then begin and will be explained in the following section.

ELEMENT VIII: STUDENT ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Governing Law - Admission Requirements, if applicable —California Education Code Section 47605(b) (5) (H)

It is the policy of Richmond Charter Academy (RCA) to be nonsectarian in its programs, curriculum, admission policies, employment practices, and all other operations. RCA shall not charge tuition, and shall not discriminate against any pupil on the basis of ethnicity, national origin, gender, sex, religion, race or disability.

RCA will comply with the McKinney Vento Homeless Assistance Act for homeless children and ensure that each child of a homeless individual and each homeless youth have equal access to the same free, appropriate public education as provided to other children and youths.

The school also recognizes its responsibility to enroll and support students with disabilities who can benefit from its programs and who otherwise qualify for enrollment. All students will be given equal access to the school, regardless of disabilities, and the school will not discriminate against any students based on his or her disabilities

Enrollment Process

Formal recruitment of incoming students begins in the winter each year for the following school year. The proposed campus will have an open enrollment period extending from March 10 through March 25, 2012, or as appropriate within the approval of petition. Prior to this time, the school will advertise and host open houses to inform families in the community about the opportunities and expectations for prospective students and parents.

Enrollment/ Registration to the school require:

- 1. Completed 1-page application questionnaire.
- 2. School data card (family or guardian contact information).
- 3. Copy of student immunization records.
- 4. Signed copy of RCA student contract and agreement to participate and abide by school guidelines.
- 5. Attendance to Family Orientation Meeting.
- 6. Completed Enrollment/Registration forms and documents.

(See Sample Application Form as Attachment M in Appendix Section)

As per California Education Code, Richmond Charter Academy will determine enrollment based on a random public lottery should the number of pupils who <u>submitted completed</u> application packets during the open enrollment period and wish to attend RCA exceed capacity for any grade, and a waitlist of applicants at each grade level will also be

established to fill vacancies. After the first year of RCA's operations, existing students of RCA are not subject to the random public lottery.

Lottery Procedures

- Each applicant's name will be assigned a <u>number (or in the case of the preference described below, two numbers).</u>
- Each number will be put on a card.
- Each card will be equal in size and shape.
- The card will then be put into a container or lottery device that will randomly mix all cards.
- A random drawing will occur, and the first numbers <u>chosen for available seats by</u> grade level are accepted to the school.
- Once the student list has been set, a <u>rank-ordered</u> waiting list will be developed for those students still wishing to enroll should space become available.

Waitlist ranking

The student waitlist will be assigned in the order selected. Two separate observers will collect lottery cards and enter into an electronic database the results. The database will be double checked to the physical cards to ensure accuracy. The database will be made public as soon as practically possible, both online at Amethod Public Schools website and posted in public locations at the school site. Letters and follow up phone calls to families on the waiting list will also be made.

All lottery cards and databases will be kept on file by the school or at Amethod Public Schools headquarters.

During the school year if vacancies should arise, the school will notify families on the wait list to see if they would like to enroll. Typically 3 separate calls on 3 different days are made, with accompanying documentation; if families do not respond within 7 days, they are removed from the wait list and the next family is contacted.

Richmond Charter Academy anticipates that the open enrollment period will occur during the winter and spring of each year with the lottery taking place (if necessary), no later than June 30th. The lottery will be held at the school or a large community center, church, auditorium, or any public venue capable of seating all applicants comfortably. The lottery will take place on a weekday evening or weekend morning to ensure all interested parties will be able to attend.

RCA reserves the right to select more than 75 students for admission at the discretion of the School Director or Executive Director to ensure the school's overall enrollment is stable. For instance, if the RCA experiences greater than usual attrition in its upper grades, the director may elect to enroll 10 more 6th grade students, bringing the total incoming 6th grade class to 70 students. Should the Director elect to enroll greater than 75 students in the 6th -7th grade, an announcement will be made at the lottery and additional students will be enrolled based the lottery and the methods described above. Once admitted, registration forms for students who are admitted will also gather the following: proof of immunization; home language survey;

completion of emergency medical information form; proof of maximum age requirements, e.g. birth certificate; and release of records from previous school.

If the number of applicants, by grade level, exceeds the enrollment capacity for such grade level(s) at the end of the open enrollment period, a single random public lottery will be used for admission. Children of RCA founders and RCA teaching staff members will be exempt from the lottery and the sum of the students receiving these exemptions will not exceed 10% of total enrollment. Siblings of students already enrolled at RCA, or admitted during the course of the random public lottery, will be also exempt from the lottery. In addition, a 2:1 preference will be granted to in-district students (upon proof of residence); in other words, such in-district students will receive two numbers and cards. If a lottery is deemed necessary, the date of the lottery will be announced on the school website at the completion of the first enrollment phase. Neither student nor other family members are required to be present at the random selection drawing to secure a spot. The families of students that are selected to attend RCA by the lottery will be notified by phone and mail and asked to confirm enrollment within two weeks of notice.

ELEMENT IX: ANNUAL AUDIT

Governing Law: The manner in which an annual, independent financial audit shall be conducted, which shall employ generally accepted accounting principles, and the manner in which audit exceptions and deficiencies shall be resolved to the satisfaction of the chartering authority—California Education Code Section 47605(b)(5)(I).

The Governance Board and appointed Audit committee members shall oversee the selection of a state approved, reputable independent auditor and the completion of an annual audit of the schools financial books and records, including attendance. The Charter School audit committee will review the audit and report to the Charter Governance Board any deficiencies and recommendations on how to correct them. The Governance Board will report out any deficiencies that occurred and how they will be resolved.

This audit will be conducted in accordance with the applicable Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP), and will verify the accuracy of the schools financial statements (including their Balance Sheets, Income Statements and Cash Flow Statements), attendance and enrollment accounting practices, and review internal controls. To the extent required by law, the scope of this audit will be expanded to include any relevant items or processes identified by the Office of Management and Budget.

It is anticipated that annual audits will be completed within five months of the close of each school year, and consistent with AB 1994; a copy of the auditor's findings will then be forwarded to WCCUSD, Contra County Office of Education (CCOE), the State Controller's Office and the California Department of Education (CDE) by December 15th of the pending year. The Audit Committee, which is made up of Board members and community members will act upon these recommendations, and report its actions to the appropriate office in accordance to law. Exceptions and deficiencies will be resolved to the satisfaction of all parties

WHEREAS, the governing board is required to make a determination through resolution, as to whether each student, including English Learners, has sufficient textbooks, instructional materials, or both, aligned to the academic content standards in Mathematics, Science, History-Social Science, and English/Language Arts, including the English Language Development component of an adopted program, aligned to the academic content standards consistent with the cycles and content of the curriculum frameworks, and;

WHEREAS, the definition of "sufficient textbooks or instructional materials" means that each pupil has a textbook or instructional materials, or both, to use in class and to take home, and;

WHEREAS, the governing board is required to make a determination as to whether sufficient textbooks or instructional materials were provided to each pupil enrolled in Foreign Language or Health courses, consistent with the cycles and content of the curriculum frameworks, and;

WHEREAS, the governing board is required to determine the availability of laboratory science equipment for science laboratory classes offered in grades 9-12, inclusive;

WHEREAS, all necessary textbooks for meeting the requirements of this resolution and the associated Ed. Code have been purchased by the district.

THEREFORE, be it resolved that for the 2012-2013 school year, the West Contra Costa Unified School District held a public hearing on October 10, 2012, the public was noticed at least ten days in advance, and it was determined that the District has provided each pupil with sufficient textbooks and instructional materials aligned to the academic content standards and consistent with the cycles and content of the curriculum frameworks in each of the areas described above and that sufficient laboratory science equipment is available to students in grades 9-12.
