*CI C.8 Ratification and Approval of Engineering Services Contracts

Comment:

Contracts have been initiated by staff using previously qualified consulting, engineering, architectural, or landscape architectural firms to assist in completion of the referenced projects. Many of the firms are already under contract and the staff-initiated work may be an extension of the firm's existing contract with the District. Public contracting laws have been followed in initially qualifying and selecting these professionals.

*CI C.9 Ratification and Approval of Negotiated Change Orders

Comment:

Staff is seeking ratification of Change Orders on the following current District construction projects: New Gompers/LPS Richmond Schools; Pinole Valley HS Detention Basin; Ohlone ES Phase I New Classrooms; Pinole Valley HS Interim Campus – Portables Lease. Change Orders are fully executed by the District upon signature by the Superintendent's designee. Board ratification is the final step required under state law in order to complete payment and contract adjustment.

In accordance with Public Contract Code 20118.4, the Board, by ratifying these Change Orders, finds that it would have been futile to publicly bid the work in question because of the tight time frames to complete this work without affecting the operations of the District, and that the public is best served by having this work completed by the contractor on the project.

*CI C.10 Ratification of Staff Awarded Contract: Collins Elementary School Floor, Door and Hardware Replacement Project

Comment:

AE3 Partners has prepared plans and specifications for the project. Scope of work includes: removal of doors, hardware, sidelights and transom windows at Multipurpose Room, and replacement with new ADA accessible doors, hardware, sidelights and transom windows. Scope of work also includes removal of exterior doors and hardware at corridors, and replacement with new ADA accessible doors and hardware; removal of existing corridor floor tiles and base and replacement with new floor tiles and base.

The District conducted a public bid process for the project. Bids were opened on May 15, 2014. Seven contractors submitted bids, Hung Construction Builders, Inc. \$249,990; ERA Construction, Inc. \$286,845 (non-responsive); AM Woo Construction \$303,640; Mar Con Construction \$317,132 (non-responsive); Arthulia, Inc. \$323,200; Pinguelo Construction, Inc. \$338,335; CWS Construction \$345,335. Total bid is the sum of base bid and unit pricing. The lowest responsive, responsible bidder is Hung Construction Builders, Inc.

Determining the award is based on two components; the lump sum base bid and unit cost multiplied by quantities to be determined in the field. This benefits the District by locking in unit pricing to be used in negotiating future change orders. The contract award is only associated with the lump sum base bid.

*CI C.11 Ratification of Staff Awarded Contract: Helms Middle School Environmental and Recycling Center Project

Comment:

Baker Vilar Architects has prepared plans and specifications for the project. Scope of work includes: construction of new trash enclosure which includes demolition, cutting and patching of concrete paving and finishes, the relocation of utilities, construction of a masonry wall enclosure with gates and accessories.

The District will conduct a public bid process for the project. Bids will be opened on May 28, 2014.

Determining the award is based on two components; the lump sum base bid and unit cost multiplied by quantities to be determined in the field. This benefits the District by locking in unit pricing to be used in negotiating future change orders. The contract award is only associated with the lump sum base bid.

Recommendation:

Ratify the award to the lowest responsive, responsible bidder at the expiration of the bid protest period.

*CI C.12 Ratification of Staff Awarded Contract: Ohlone Elementary School Interim Housing Project

Comment:

Powell and Partners Architects has prepared plans and specifications for the project. Scope of work includes: site development, utility installations, and connections for eight modular buildings. The site development scope will include fencing, gates, a DSA approved shade structure, inclusive of site furnishings; utility installations for sanitary sewer, domestic water, secondary power and associated low voltage systems from the modular buildings to key points of connections on the existing campus. Scope of work also includes: trash enclosure, shade structure and picnic tables, fencing, completion of installation of utilities, entry gate to interim housing site, relocation of basketball courts and goals, exterior spot lights, asphalt at the toe of ramps, enclose face of ramps with plywood to prevent trash under ramps, and exterior drinking fountain.

The District will conduct a public bid process for the project. Bids were opened on May 22, 2014.

Recommendation:

Ratify the award to the lowest responsive, responsible bidder at the expiration of the bid protest period.

*CI C.13 Ratification of Staff Awarded Contract: Olinda Elementary School Miscellaneous Repairs Project

Comment:

AE3 Parnters has prepared plans and specifications for the project. Scope of work includes: renovation of Boy's and Girl's restrooms in Main Building including floor and wall finishes replacement, toilet fixtures and toilet accessories replacement, replacement of glazing in existing window frames, relocation of exhaust fans to roof, and installation of electric hand dryers. Scope of work also includes glazing and selective door replacement in Multi-Purpose Building.

The District conducted a public bid process for the project. Bids were opened on May 15, 2014. Four contractors submitted bids, Streamline Builders \$95,315; Hung Construction Builders, Inc. \$117,900 (non-responsive); AM Woo Construction, Inc. \$157,830; Pinguelo Construction, Inc. \$427,389. Total bid is the sum of base bid and unit pricing. The lowest responsive, responsible bidder is Streamline Builders.

Determining the award is based on two components; the lump sum base bid and unit cost multiplied by quantities to be determined in the field. This benefits the District by locking in unit pricing to be used in negotiating future change orders. The contract award is only associated with the lump sum base bid.

Recommendation:

Ratify the award to the lowest responsive, responsible bidder: Streamline Builders.

*CI C.14 Ratification of Staff Awarded Contract: Shannon Elementary School Miscellaneous Repairs Project

Scope of work includes: renovation of Boy's and Girl's restrooms in Main Building including miscellaneous floor and wall tile replacement, toilet fixtures and toilet accessories replacement, framing and dry wall over existing window openings, and installation of electric hand dryers.

The District will conduct a public bid process for the project. Bids were opened on May 22, 2014.

Determining the award is based on two components; the lump sum base bid and unit cost multiplied by quantities to be determined in the field. This benefits the District by locking in unit pricing to be used in negotiating future change orders. The contract award is only associated with the lump sum base bid.

* D.3 Recognition of Crespi Middle School Science Team Participation in the Garrett Morgan Sustainable Energy Project

Comment:

Juan Crespi Middle School Science team participated in the Garrett Morgan Sustainable Energy Project. They presented their project, "Star Transportation Inc. Ride-Share App". They developed an app to facilitate a ride-share program to reduce the number of cars on the road and the emissions from those cars to buy time while alternative fuel sources are developed. They competed with other middle and high schools across the nation. The team won 1st place in the competition and will receive a \$500.00 cash award. Their work was sponsored by Caltrans District 4. The team was under the direction of Mr. Sherrill.

* D.4 Class of 2014 Ed Fund Scholars

Comment:

Between 2005 and 2013, The Ed. Fund awarded over \$900,000 to 315 scholarship winners from WCCUSD. In 2014, thanks to generous support from our donors, including the College Access Foundation of California, the Irene S. Scully Family Foundation, the Irvine Foundation, Norma & Arthur Schroeder and the Whittier Foundation, the Ed Fund will be awarding over \$225,000 in scholarships. 2014 will mark over one million dollars in scholarships awarded by the Ed Fund thus far.

Our 76 scholars hail from 7 different public high schools located in WCCUSD. A list of high schools represented and the number of Ed Fund Scholars from each school is as follows:

DeAnza High School: 9 El Cerrito High School: 14 Hercules High School: 8 Kennedy High School: 12 Middle College High School: 5 Pinole Valley High School: 9 Richmond High School: 19

Scholarships will range from \$1,000 to \$5,000 depending on the finalist's individual need.

All Ed Fund scholars were chosen for their vision to succeed in college and dedication to community service and leadership. They are also involved in a wide range of extracurricular activities which have made them well-rounded individuals. The Ed Fund believes these students will return to our community to serve as leaders and role models.

* D.5 Financial Aid Cup Winner

Comment:

For the second year, the Ed Fund has partnered with WCCUSD to carry out a district-wide campaign to increase completion of applications for public aid to support students going to college. The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is the primary application that students complete in order to be eligible to receive financial aid for college. Knowing that many students never get the opportunity to attend college because their families believe they can't afford the tuition, the Ed Fund's goal was to ensure that all students in the District had the opportunity to complete the FAFSA or the California

Dream Application (for undocumented students). Recent studies indicate that increasing FAFSA completion can result in increased college-going rates for a district. Further, low-income California students have been missing out on hundreds of millions of student aid dollars.

In 2012, 33% of District students completed the FAFSA by the March 2nd priority deadline. Through a coordinated effort of WCCUSD and the West County College Access Network, a collaborative of community based organizations focused on college access, the six comprehensive high schools in the District saw a tremendous increase in application completions in 2014. **Sixty-six percent of District seniors completed their FAFSA or California Dream Application by the priority deadline.**

Our Financial Aid Cup winner for the 2013-2104 school year goes to Kennedy High School. With a completion rate of 26% in 2012, Kennedy's completion rate has grown by 49% over 2 years. Seventy-five percent of seniors completed their financial aid applications by the Cal Grant priority deadline.

F. ACTION ITEMS

* F.1 Public Hearing on the Local Control Accountability Plan

Comment:

In 2013, Governor Brown signed bills that created the Local Control Funding Formula – the greatest change to public school finance in 40 years. Part of that law requires that all districts create a Local Control Accountability Plan to engage communities in determining how the additional funds will be spent and how the District will be accountable to creating a position impact for the needlest students. In January and February the District held six community meetings that involved more than 600 people in reviewing how the District Plan Report and LCAP could come together and better serve students. The Board held

two workshop sessions on the LCAP in February and March. The District Local Control Accountability Committee was created by Board action in January and the committee members were appointed in March. That committee held four meetings in March, April and May to review a draft of the LCAP which was updated throughout the process.

Recommendation:

That the Board hold the first of three public hearings on the District Local Control Accountability Plan.

Fiscal Impact:

LCFF brings substantial resources to the District over 8 years including an estimated \$24 million for 2014-15.

* F.2 Resolution No. 80-1314: Regarding Education Protection Account (EPA) and Spending Plan for the 2014-15 School Year

Comment:

After the passage of Proposition 30, the Schools and Local Public Safety Protection Act of 2012, schools and community college campuses across California have begun receiving funds through a new Education Protection Account (EPA) which was established by voter initiative. The legislation requires that each district establish a special fund to account for these deposits and restricts the use of the funding to school service expenditures only. An accounting of these funds is located on the District website. The District anticipates receiving \$26.8 million earmarked for the EPA fund reporting as a part of the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) entitlement. For accounting purposes, all secondary school instructional expenses related to staff have been placed in the EPA fund for 2013-14 and ongoing in the budget for 2014-15. EPA funds are not separate from the LCFF formula, rather a means of funding it.

Recommendation:

Recommend approval of this resolution for the EPA Spending Plan for the 2014-15 School Year.

* F.3 Amended Resolution No. 77-1314: Declaration to Hire 30-Day Substitutes on CBEST Waivers

Comment:

There is a statewide shortage of qualified substitutes. The Commission on Teacher Credentialing require each 30-day substitute CBEST waiver request be approved by the Board of Education before the waiver request is submitted has been relaxed by the Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CCTC). This declaration need be approved only once for all CBEST waiver requested in 2014-15. This item shall be included in the Board agenda, and shall not be adopted by the Board as a part of a consent calendar.

The Human Resources Department will continue to recruit and search for fully credentialed teachers while using this assignment option. A plan will be brought before the Board on July 23, 2014 to update our efforts on substitute recruitment and placement.

Comment:

Pursuant to California Code of Regulations Section 80026 (e)(1) of Title 5, pertaining to Declaration of Need for Fully Qualified Educators by a school district shall be adopted by the governing board in a regularly-scheduled, public meeting of the board. The entire Declaration of Need for Fully Qualified Educators shall be included in the board agenda, and shall not be adopted by the board as a part of a consent calendar.

The board and the public must have the opportunity to see the number of Emergency and Limited Assignment permits that the district reasonable expects to request in each category and to understand the reasons for such requests. This resolution will provide the District with assignment options of a temporary nature when a teacher with an appropriate credential is not available to the district.

The options are only available to teachers who hold a current basic credential.

Background Information:

For the second year, the Ed Fund has partnered with WCCUSD to carry out a district-wide campaign to increase completion of applications for public aid to support students going to college. The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is the primary application that students complete in order to be eligible to receive financial aid for college. Knowing that many students never get the opportunity to attend college because their families believe they can't afford the tuition, the Ed Fund's goal was to ensure that all students in the district had the opportunity to complete the FAFSA or the California Dream Application (for undocumented students). Recent studies indicate that increasing FAFSA completion can result in increased college-going rates for a district. Further, low-income California students have been missing out on hundreds of millions of student aid dollars.

In 2012, 33% of district students completed the FAFSA by the March 2nd priority deadline. Through a coordinated effort of WCCUSD and the West County College Access Network, a collaborative of community based organizations focused on college access, the six comprehensive high schools in the district saw a tremendous increase in application completions in 2014. Sixty-six percent of district seniors completed their FAFSA or California Dream Application by the priority deadline.

Our Financial Aid Cup winner for the 2013-2104 school year goes to Kennedy High School. With a completion rate of 26% in 2012, Kennedy's completion rate has grown by 49% over 2 years. Seventy-five percent of seniors completed their financial aid applications by the Cal Grant priority deadline.

Foster youth (for county offices of education only): coordination of services, including working with the county child welfare agency to share information, responding to the needs of the juvenile court system, and ensuring transfer of health and education records. (Priority 10)

B. Pupil Outcomes:

Pupil achievement: performance on standardized tests, score on Academic Performance Index, share of pupils that are college and career ready, share of English learners that become English proficient, English learner reclassification rate, share of pupils that pass Advanced Placement exams with 3 or higher, share of pupils determined prepared for college by the Early Assessment Program. (Priority 4)

Other pupil outcomes: pupil outcomes in the subject areas described in Education Code section 51210 and subdivisions (a) to (i), inclusive, of Education Code section 51220, as applicable. (Priority 8)

C. Engagement:

Parent involvement: efforts to seek parent input in decision making, promotion of parent participation in programs for unduplicated pupils and special need subgroups. (Priority 3)

Pupil engagement: school attendance rates, chronic absenteeism rates, middle school dropout rates, high school dropout rates, high school graduations rates. (Priority 5)

School climate: pupil suspension rates, pupil expulsion rates, other local measures including surveys of pupils, parents and teachers on the sense of safety and school connectedness. (Priority 6)

A portion of supplemental and concentration funds were allocated to all schools for school site level decision making based upon each school's percentage of students qualifying.

EDUCATION PROTECTION ACCOUNT (EPA) AND SPENDING PLAN FOR THE 2014-15 SCHOOL YEAR

WHEREAS, the voters approved Proposition 30 on November 6, 2012;

WHEREAS, Proposition 30 added Article XIII, Section 36 to the California Constitution effective November 7, 2012;

WHEREAS, the provisions of Article XIII, Section 36(e) create in the state General Fund an Education Protection Account to receive and disburse the revenues derived from the incremental increases in taxes imposed by Article XIII, Section 36(f);

WHEREAS, before June 30th of each year, the State's Director of Finance shall estimate the total amount of additional revenues, less refunds that will be derived from the incremental increases in tax rates made pursuant to Article XIII, Section 36(f) that will be available for transfer into the Education Protection Account during the next fiscal year;

WHEREAS, if the sum determined by the State Controller is positive, the State Controller shall transfer the amount calculated into the Education Protection Account within ten days preceding the end of the fiscal year;

WHEREAS, all monies in the Education Protection Account are hereby continuously appropriated for the support of school districts, county offices of education, charter schools and community college districts;

WHEREAS, monies deposited in the Education Protection Account shall not be used to pay any costs incurred by the Legislature, the Governor or any agency of state government;

WHEREAS, a community college district, county office of education, school district, or charter school shall have the sole authority to determine how the monies received from the Education Protection Account are spent in the school or schools within its jurisdiction;

WHEREAS, the governing board of the district shall make the spending determinations with respect to monies received from the Education Protection Account in open session of a public meeting of the governing board;

WHEREAS, the monies received from the Education Protection Account shall not be used for salaries or benefits for administrators or any other administrative cost;

WHEREAS, each community college district, county office of education, school district and charter school shall annually publish on its Internet website an accounting of how much money was received from the Education Protection Account and how that money was spent;

WHEREAS, the annual independent financial and compliance audit required of community college districts, county offices of education, school districts and charter schools shall ascertain and verify whether the funds provided from the Education Protection Account have been properly disbursed and expended as required by Article XIII, Section 36 of the California Constitution;

WHEREAS, expenses incurred by community college districts, county offices of education, school districts and charter schools to comply with the additional audit requirements of Article XIII, Section 36 may be paid with funding from the Education Protection Act and shall not be considered administrative costs for purposes of Article XIII, Section 36.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that, monies received from the Education Protection Account shall be spent as required by Article XIII, Section 36 and the spending determinations on how the money will be spent, the West Contra Costa Unified School District adopts this Resolution approving the proposed uses of the funds, paying for secondary school instructional expenses.

RESOLUTION NO. 78-1314

CREDENTIAL ASSIGNMENT OPTIONS

WHEREAS, the Commission on Teacher Credentialing provides employing districts with assignment options of a temporary nature in which a teacher with an appropriate credential is not available to the school district. Listed below are summaries of these options, which require the consent of the teacher and Board approval.

- Ed Code 44263 allows the holder of a teaching credential to serve in a departmentalized class if the teacher has completed 18 semester hours of course work, or 9 semester hours of upper division of graduate course work, in the subject to be taught.
- Title 5 Section 80027 allows for the issuance of a Limited Assignment Option to any teacher employed by the district who holds a credential based on a bachelor's degree and student teaching. Six semester hours of appropriate course work are required for renewal.
- Ed Code 44256 (b) allows the Governing Board of a school district to authorize the holder of a multiple subject teaching credential or a standard elementary credential to teach any subject in departmentalized classes to a given class or group of students below grade nine, provided that the teacher has completed 12 total semester units, or 6 upper division or graduate units of course work at an accredited institution in each subject to be taught.
- Ed Code 44258.2 allows the Governing Board of a school district to assign the holder of a single subject or standard secondary teaching credential, with his or her consent, to teach classes in grades 5 through 8 in a middle school provided the teacher has a minimum of twelve semester units, or six upper division or graduate semester units of course work at an accredited institution in the subject to be taught.
- Ed Code 44285.3 allows the Governing Board of a school district to authorize the holder of a multiple subject; standard elementary, single subject or standard secondary, with his or her consent, to teach departmental classes in grades K-12 provided the teacher has adequate knowledge of subject matter.
- Ed Code 44258.7 (c)(d) Allows the Committee on Assignments to authorize the holder of a multiple subject or single subject credential to teach a course outside of their credential area that is considered to be an elective in the grades K-12.
- Ed Code 44328 (a) Unless the commission determines that substantial evidence exists that a person is unqualified to teach, upon the completion of successful service as a district intern pursuant to subdivision (b) of Section 44325, and upon the recommendation of the school district governing board, the commission shall award preliminary credentials to district interns in the same manner as applicants recommended for credentials by institutions that operate approved programs of professional preparation.

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF WEST CONTRA COSTA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT DIRECTING ACTIONS IN SUPPORT OF AN APPLICATION FOR A WAIVER FROM THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION RELATIVE TO STATUTORY GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND DEBT LIMITATIONS, AS PROVIDED BY SECTIONS 15106 AND 15270 OF THE EDUCATION CODE

WHEREAS, a duly called election was held in the West Contra Costa Unified School District (the "District"), Contra Costa County (the "County"), State of California, on November 8, 2005 (the "2005 Election") at which there was submitted to the qualified electors of the District a question as to the issuance and sale of general obligation bonds of the District ("Bonds") for various purposes set forth in the ballot submitted to the voters, in the maximum amount of \$400,000,000, payable from the levy of an *ad valorem* tax against the taxable property in the District (the "2005 Bond Measure"); and

WHEREAS, a duly called election was held in the District on June 8, 2010 (the "2010 Election") at which there was submitted to the qualified electors of the District a question as to the issuance and sale of Bonds for various purposes set forth in the ballot submitted to the voters, in the maximum amount of \$380,000,000, payable from the levy of an *ad valorem* tax against the taxable property in the District (the "2010 Bond Measure"); and

WHEREAS, a duly called election will be held on June 3, 2014 (the "2014 Election"), at which there will be submitted to the qualified electors of the District a question as to the issuance and sale of Bonds for various purposes set forth in the ballot submitted to the voters, in the maximum amount of \$270,000,000, payable from the levy of an *ad valorem* tax against the taxable property in the District (the "2014 Bond Measure"); and

WHEREAS, Sections 15106 and 15270 of the Education Code of the State of California (the "Education Code") establish a limit on the total principal amount of debt that the District may have outstanding at any time, being, in the case of a unified school district, 2.5% of the total assessed value (the "Assessed Value") of all taxable real property within the boundaries of said district (the "Bonding Capacity"); and

WHEREAS, Section 33050 of the Education Code of the State of California (the "Education Code") authorizes the State Board of Education (the "SBE") to waive certain provisions of the Education Code following a public hearing conducted and an application by a school district; and

WHEREAS, the provisions of the Education Code cited above, establishing the maximum Bonding Capacity for the District, are subject to such a waiver (each, a "Waiver"); and

WHEREAS, the District has heretofore obtained a number of Waivers from the SBE, including a Waiver granted on May 7, 2009, establishing a Bonding Capacity limit of 3.5% for Bonds issued pursuant to the 2005 Bond Measure, which Waiver expired on May 7, 2014, and a Waiver granted on March 18, 2011, establishing a Bonding Capacity limit of 5.0% for Bonds issued pursuant to the 2010 Bond Measure, which Waiver has an expiration date of December 31, 2021; and

WHEREAS, based on the current Assessed Value of taxable real property within the District, and taking into consideration the Waivers from the SBE currently in effect, the District nonetheless lacks sufficient Bonding Capacity to continue the bond construction program within the District, providing necessary facilities and equipment to students and teachers (the "Bond Construction Program"); and

WHEREAS, this Board of Education (the "Board") has determined the need to issue Bonds pursuant to the authorizations that were granted at the 2005 Election and that may be granted at the 2014 Election in order to continue the Bond Construction Program; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the policies of the SBE, in order to qualify for a Waiver, the District must: (a) consult with the exclusive representatives of District employees, including the United Teachers of Richmond, the Public Employees Union Local 1, the School Supervisors Association and the West Contra Costa Administrators Association (collectively, the "Employee Representatives"); (b) invite public input on the Waiver and conduct a properly noticed public hearing thereon; (c) consult with appropriate school site councils or advisory committees, including the District's Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee (collectively, the "Advisory Committees"); and (d) submit an explanation of the need for a Waiver to the SBE for consideration at a regularly scheduled meeting of the SBE;

NOW THEREFORE, IT IS RESOLVED, DETERMINED AND ORDERED by the Board of Education of the West Contra Costa Unified School District as follows:

SECTION 1. Actions in Furtherance of an Application for a Waiver. In connection with the authorization of the 2005 Bond Measure and the 2010 Bond Measure, and in the event of approval by the District's voters of the 2014 Bond Measure by more than 55% of the qualified electors of the District voting at the 2014 Election, and pursuant to Section 33050 of the Education Code, District staff are directed to (a) consult with the Employee Representatives; (b) prepare or cause to be prepared a notice of public hearing, to be published in a newspaper of general circulation within the District no less than one time per week for two weeks prior to the Board's June 11, 2014, meeting, (c) consult with the Advisory Committees; and (d) prepare, in consultation with KNN Public Finance, the Financial Advisor to the District, Nixon Peabody LLP as the District's Bond Counsel, and Piper Jaffray & Co., Backstrom McCarley Berry & Co., LLC, and Stifel Nicolaus & Company, Incorporated, as Underwriters of the District's Bonds, an application for a Waiver to the SBE with respect to the Bond authorizations described herein, including all materials in support thereof required by the policies of the SBE.

SECTION 2. Approval of Actions; Miscellaneous. The Superintendent, the Executive Director of Business Services (Bonds), and the Associate Superintendent, Business Services are hereby authorized and directed, jointly and severally, to do any and all things and to execute and deliver any and all documents which they may deem necessary or advisable in order to proceed with the application for a Waiver and to give effect to and comply with the terms and intent of this Resolution. Such actions heretofore taken by officers, officials and staff of the District are hereby ratified, confirmed.

SECTION 3. <u>Effective Date</u>. This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.
