#### PAASSS Program Video – Nia Rashidchi

#### Expanded Learning Program/Data – Nia Rashidchi

During the August 9 Board of Education meeting, staff was asked to provide data and background information on our Expanded Learning programs. Below is a summary of the Expanded Learning program, as well as a some data points and a link to the 2015-16 evaluation report. The final draft of the 2016-17 evaluation report will be available in November 2017.

West Contra Costa Unified School District (WCCUSD) operates 28 school-based Expanded Learning Programs throughout West Contra Costa Unified School District, including 24 elementary schools (grades K-6) and four middle schools (grades 7-8). School-based Expanded Learning Programs are supported by the WCCUSD Expanded Learning Program Office. The WCCUSD Expanded Learning Programs are open to all students at the host school at no cost to families. In some cases, schools may determine specific criteria for priority student enrollment, such as low academic performance or social needs.

The WCCUSD Expanded Learning Programs begin upon the end of the traditional school day and operate until 6:00 p.m. every day throughout the school year. Each program offers three

daily components: Academic Support, Enrichment Activities, and Supper. The Academic Support component includes skill building activities, English Language Development, targeted interventions, tutoring, and homework support. The Enrichment component includes visual and performing arts, organized sports, leadership activities, social and emotional learning activities, and technology. All students participating in the WCCUSD Expanded Learning Programs receive a meal provided by the WCCUSD Food Services Department before going home.


During the school year WCCUSD Expanded Learning Programs serve an average of 3,900 students every day school is in session.

The 28 site-based Expanded Learning Programs operate in partnership with community-based organizations selected through our annual Request For Qualifications (RFQ) process. The Lead Agencies work in close partnership with the WCCUSD Expanded Learning office and the school community to design and implement high quality programs for WCCUSD students. Our 2017-18 Lead Agency partners are Bay Area Community Resources (BACR), Love.Learn.Success (LLS), and the YMCA of the East Bay. In addition to our three lead agency partners, the Expanded Learning office collaborates with twelve community based organizations that provide in-kind and fee for service specialized enrichment activities in our programs.

WCCUSD Expanded Learning Programs share a basic staffing pattern across all sites, though specific staff duties may somewhat vary from site to site. Shared features include a full-time Site Director, a Lead Teacher, and Group Leaders. Many programs also work with additional enrichment providers and some may rely on regular volunteer assistance as well. At some sites, certificated teachers provide targeted academic assistance and academic enrichment activities for program participants through extended work hours.

The Lead Teachers are certificated school day teachers who promote alignment between the Expanded Learning Program and the school day. The Lead Teachers support the program planning process, the selection of academic activities, review academic outcome data of participating students, and encourage ongoing communication between the program and the school day staff. The WCCUSD Expanded Learning Office convenes a monthly Lead Teacher meeting.

**Theory of Action:** Students who participate in high quality Expanded Learning Programs on a regular basis will expand their horizons through new experiences, feel engaged with their school, and master both academic and social / emotional learning (SEL) skills.



The Expanded Learning Office measures quality using the Program Quality Assessment (PQA) Tools and accompanying Youth Program Quality Intervention (YPQI) supports developed by the Weikart Center for Youth Program Quality. The PQAs are a set of research validated observational tools that measure program quality across four domains: safe environment, supportive environment, interaction and engagement.

The WCCUSD Expanded Learning Office partners with an external evaluator, Public Profit, to track service quality and outcomes for participating students and their families. The annual evaluation is a comprehensive mixed methods evaluation that combines program attendance, site visit observations, youth, parent and school staff surveys, student academic data and demographics as well as focus groups to measure program impact. The Expanded Learning Office utilizes the data from our annual external evaluation report to identify student needs, student interests, and areas for program quality improvement, which then informs professional development, curricula, and projects. - During the 2015-16 school year elementary participants attended the WCCUSD Expanded Learning Programs an average of 124 days.
- Program quality scores improved between the fall and the spring. Elementary schools' overall PQA score increased from 3.35 to 3.87, a +0.52 difference. Middle schools' overall PQA score increased from 2.92 to 3.07, a +0.15 difference.
- Program participants attended school at a higher rate than their non-participant peers, 95.4% compared to 93.7%.
- Program participants were re-designated at a higher rate than non-participating peers at their school sites, 9.3%, were re-designated compared to 6.9% of their non-participating peers.

• Participants achieved a slight improvement on their SBAC ELA Achievement Level: an average 0.16 increase compared to a 0.12 for non-participants. This improvement was even greater for English Learners, an average 0.21 of a step for English Learner participants compared to 0.15 for non-participants.

The Expanded Learning Office facilitates a quarterly collaborative meeting with all stakeholders to inform and coordinate services and efforts across the 28 Expanded Learning Programs in WCCUSD. The goal of the collaborative meeting is to share the program mission, vision, goals, and program outcome data. The quarterly collaborative meeting provides an opportunity for all stakeholders to be engaged in the continuous cycle of quality improvement. Evaluation results are a cornerstone of sustainability efforts, providing concrete evidence to funders and key stakeholders of the value and importance of an investment in the District's Expanded Learning Programs.

#### Maintenance: Getting Our Schools Ready for the First Day of School – Lisa LeBlanc

As a follow-up to Trustee Phillips' inquiry at the August 9 Board meeting, our Maintenance and Operations team has been hard at work during our summer break to clean the floors. The following items are focused on during the summer:

- Tiled floors are stripped, sealed and waxed, and baseboards are cleaned
- Glass is cleaned
- Carpeted areas are shampooed
- Walls and other surfaces are cleaned
- Spot painting and larger painting projects are completed
- Lockers are cleaned and have their codes reset, and in some cases, are spot painted
- Many of our landscaped areas faced stress during the drought. The District is working to revitalize our grounds by increasing watering and lawn care at our school sites, particularly the last few weeks. In addition, the team is working hard to remove weeds. This area has been a challenge due to the extraordinary amount of weed growth this year compared to prior years. Grounds staff is trying their best to address the sites needing attention.

#### Solar Project Update – Lisa LeBlanc

The next phase of the solar project will begin construction at the following sites: Coronado, Ford, Harding, Helms, Grant, Sheldon, Lupine Hills, King, Hercules High School and Mira Vista. The construction of these projects is expected to be 6-8 weeks. Also, the District is finalizing construction at Bayview, DeAnza, El Cerrito High School, Ellerhorst, Ohlone and Tara Hills. It is anticipated that the construction at these six schools will be completed in approximately four months.

As previously communicated, the solar panels will not only provide energy savings for the district, they will provide student shade areas (Ellerhorst, Ford, Helms, Lupine Hills, Ohlone, Mira Vista and Tara Hills) and covered parking (Grant, Harding, Hercules High School, DeAnza, El Cerrito High School and Sheldon). Some of the schools are receiving rooftop solar (Coronado, King and Nystrom).

The District's Executive Director of Maintenance, Julio Arroyo, has been working with the sites regarding their concerns of impacts on school opening. Mr. Arroyo has communicated with each site to develop alternative parking plans where needed, along with playground fencing, to minimize disruptions.

#### Conscious Kitchen Update at Madera and Peres Elementary Schools – Lisa LeBlanc

On May 24, 2017, WCCUSD Board approved the request for consulting services for Conscious Kitchen and the approval to fundraise to cover costs incurred to pilot scratch cooking at both Peres and Madera schools this coming school year. A stakeholders team comprised of an architect, kitchen designer, a mechanical engineer and others interested in this pilot program met during the summer to develop plans as to how to transition the current kitchen at Peres to enable all meals to be able to be cooked from scratch. The current kitchen was designed to receive meals prepared by the district's central kitchen and warmed at the school site just prior to service. Conscious Kitchen has also initiated outreach relationships with key community stakeholders to support the district's Health and Wellness policy. It is also working on fundraising support by writing and submitting grants, soliciting donations, planning partnerships, and organizing a major donor dinner to support their efforts to create a new model for school food service. At this time, the programs at Madera and Peres are being targeted to begin later in the school year. We will keep the Board apprised of the start date, which is contingent upon successful fundraising efforts.


**Food Services Celebrates a Successful Summer Meal Program at 70 sites – Lisa LeBlanc** On June 12, 2017 Food Services kicked off its summer meals program with a special BBQ lunch, and also included educational activities for the children and tours of its state of the art central kitchen. Over 400 meals were served that day to children and information given to families on where to access meals during the summer months. Many of our students rely on meals during the regular school year and just because it is summer, their hunger does not take a vacation. Throughout the district, seventy sites, in eligible areas, offered meals to children this summer and over 300,000 meals were served. June and July saw an increase in the number of meals served from 2016. On August 15, 2017 Food Services joined the El Sobrante library with its last BBQ of the summer and to kick off the coming 2017/18 school year. A healthy BBQ meal was offered to families, with over 300 children served meals during this event. Information was also given to families on the importance of reading and education, taste tests conducted for possible new breakfast items for the coming year, vision tests and eyeglasses offered and much more. This is in an effort to help children and their families succeed.

The Summer Meal program was a great success with more meals served to even more children this summer. A special thank you to Patrice Chamberlain, Director of the California Summer Meal Coalition, Food Service Supervisors, Community organizations, Central Kitchen staff, Warehouse staff & drivers, the office staff, and all of our site staff who ensured that children got the necessary nutrition throughout the summer months in West Contra Costa because "Hunger does not take a Vacation".











# Communications Department Organizational Chart 2016 - 2017




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











## West Contra Costa Unified School District Business Services Division–Bond/Enrollment/Attendance
