# **School Facility Program Audits - Tony Wold (Margarita Romo)**

Staff will be taking a contract for School Facilities Program Audits to the Facilities Committee on Friday, February 12th. Education Code 41024 has pushed the responsibility for School Facility Program audits from the Office of Public School Construction (OPSC) to CPA firms. The District has four projects that are ready to undergo school facilities program audits. Three are due to the state on October 20, 2021 and the fourth is due on December 4, 2021. Christy White, the CPA firm that performs the district financial audit, bond financial audit, and parcel tax audit, can perform these audits for the district and has provided a contract for these services. Staff will ask for direction from the committee regarding this contract before it's taken to the board for approval. If approved the School Facilities Program Audits would not exceed \$20,000 from the operations budget within the general fund.

#### Bond Financial Audit - Tony Wold (Margarita Romo)

The district's 2019-20 Bond Financial Audit is in the process of being finalized by Christy White. The Citizen's Bond Oversight Committee is scheduled to review the draft report as part of the audit exit conference on Monday, February 8th and the Facilities Committee on the 12th. The draft audit report shows the district received an unmodified opinion which is the best opinion an auditor can give. The district is scheduled to take the final report to the board on March 24th.

# Literacy Intervention for 3rd-6th grade English Learner starts in late February - Rubén Aurelio (Christi Roscigno & team)

#### Goals

1. Practice reading, writing, and speaking English, using hard copies of books that were sent to students' homes already.

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2. Students connect with other multilingual students through books!

#### Overview

- Two 4 week cycles of clubs: February 22nd-March 26th OR April 12-May 14th
- Clubs meet on Tuesdays and Thursdays, from 3-3:45 pm (1.5 hours per week)
- Clubs will be led by credentialed WCCUSD teachers

# Curriculum, Instruction & Assessment - Rubén Aurelio (Gabriel Chilcott & team) High School Science (John Iwawaki & Team)

To align with the <u>2016 California Science Framework's Three Course Model</u>, WCCUSD has begun phasing out old high school science courses, and will be creating new course titles with new course descriptions:

Biology --> The Living Earth,

Chemistry --> Chemistry of the Earth System,

Physics --> Physics of the Universe.

Each of these courses integrates the core subject with elements of Earth & Space Science, as well as Engineering. This change provides the opportunity for students to access every NGSS standard from the four domains in only three years, and better prepares them for the content in the California Science Test (CAST). It also lays the groundwork for the upcoming adoption of new instructional materials in the three courses.

#### Math (Mark Lobaco & Team)

The Math Department continues to work to align our middle school curriculum to state recommendations. To that end, we are prioritizing the three middle school math classes and will not offer on site Algebra for the 21-22 school year. Here is a letter that explains the rationale and advancement pathways for students who wish to accelerate their math instruction. This is an update on information included in the August 14, 2020 Friday Memo.

The midyear window for district math assessments in grades K-8 comes to a close prior to Presidents' Week break. K-1 assessments this year are site-determined and data is not collected centrally. A district-provided, standards-aligned, distance learning-friendly assessment has been created by the Math Department to support teachers in collecting and analyzing data to determine intervention needs. Grades 2-8 are using the Star Math assessment this year, and after this testing window, growth data can begin to be analyzed to celebrate successes and identifying needs. The Math Department has provided an informational slide deck on Star Math's growth reports with suggested actions for teachers and administrators.

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# 2020 AP Computer Science Female Diversity Award - Rubén Aurelio (Allison Huie & team)

Recently, we were notified that Pinole Valley High School has been awarded the College Board's AP Computer Science Female Diversity Award for expanding young women's access to the AP Computer Science Principles course.



This award acknowledges 1,119 schools for their work toward equal gender representation during the 2019-2020 school year - nearly 37% more than the 818 schools recognized last year.
