



The West County Mandarin School (WCMS)—a West County Unified School District (WCCUSD) Mandarin immersion school in Pinole—celebrated Hispanic Heritage Month and a Mid-Autumn Festival Fri., Sept. 29 while also throwing their community's first Night Market.

The school community events were a fusion of different cultures coming together during the special night. "Students and families [had] the opportunity to be exposed to the beauty of diversity because of the school's values and mission," according to organizers.

Organizers relayed a number of the family-friendly activities people enjoyed Friday night, including mooncake and lantern making—as well as mooncake tasting—playing the game Loteria and taking in a "breath-taking and impressive" performance by Danza Azteca Guadalupana, a local dance troupe.

Legislative Updates:

New California law cuts local school board control over educational content

(The Center Square) California governor Gavin Newsom signed a new bill into law that would significantly reduce the ability of local school boards to shape local curriculums, even within previous state educational guidelines, and stop their removal of any books from school libraries if they "provide inclusive and diverse perspectives," no matter how questionable the content may be for a library serving a more limited age group.

"Rather than limiting access to education and flat-out banning books like other states, we are embracing and expanding opportunities for knowledge and education, because that's the California way," said California State Superintendent Tony Thurmond, who sponsored the bill, in a public statement celebrating the new law. Thurmond recently announced his decision to run to succeed Newsom when he either terms out or potentially runs for higher office.

Teacher retirement benefits protection bill signed by Gov. Newsom

The governor on Friday signed Senate Bill 432, proposed by Sen. Dave Cortese, D-San Jose, ensuring retired teachers will have legal protection against penalties arising from errors made by the California State Teachers' Retirement System or CalSTRS.

SB 432 ensures that retired teachers will be informed about these errors, and the bill shields their monthly retirement payments from penalties when the mistake is not their fault.
